

SILENT VOTE TO GO TO ROOSEVELT

New York Man Predicts a Tremendous Vote for the Colonel.

(Staff Correspondence) Mackay, Idaho Oct. 30.—The great silent vote of the United States will go to Colonel Roosevelt for president on election day, Nov. 5," said one of the New York owners of a large copper mine in this part of Idaho, who is in Mackay looking after his large mining interests. He made an open statement to parties here that he is supporting Roosevelt for president; and as far as he knew, all the members of his company in New York are doing the same thing.

"It will be found on election day," he continued, "that the great majority of voters in the United States who are not saying anything and who seem to be quiet are, like myself, going to vote for Roosevelt.

"The reason this great mass of voters are so quiet is that being members of the old parties, they do not care to advertise their position of apparently breaking away from the old parties. I am finding that those who are thus keeping quiet, in a very large measure will vote for Roosevelt for president."

IDAHO COUNTY IN LINE FOR BORAH

THE SETTLERS BE DAMNED.

Progressive State Chairman Gipson Strikes Them a Blow Between the Eyes.

Candidate G. H. Martin shed crocodile tears over the condition of the Carey act settlers and appealed to them for votes to right their wrongs.

Now comes Little Jimmie Gipson, rattling around as a campaign manager, and acting singly and alone—but hearkening to some voice—and gives his official indorsement as state chairman of the Progressive party to Miss Grace M. Shepherd for re-election as a member of the state land board!

So neglectful has been Miss Shepherd's course as a member of the land board and so indifferent has she been to the needs of the Carey act settlers, that representatives of ten water users' associations, acting in behalf of 3000 settlers, have unanimously indorsed her opponent, Miss Mary Z. Harper!

Great concern has Candidate Martin and Chairman Jimmie Gipson for the Carey act settlers when such an indorsement is given to the one member of the land board who is responsible for the delay in the settlement of the disputes between the settlers and the companies at King Hill and on the North Side tract!

And with this indorsement of Miss Shepherd by Gipson comes also fulsome praise of her candidacy from Major Fred R. Reed, representative of the company with whom the settlers are in dispute.

WHAT'S HAPPENED TO BORAH?

Why Does He Not Meet Friends and Neighbors of His Home City.

Is William E. Borah ASHAMED to face a Boise audience, or has the Republican state central committee informed him that his services are not needed?

The time was when Borah night was the great event of a Republican campaign in Idaho, but now either the senator has cold feet and is really ASHAMED to face his neighbors and friends—or else his course is such that the Republican committee is ASHAMED of him.

Shepherd he did not realize that he was striking a blow at every Carey act settler in Idaho who has had business before the state land board—for what Little Jimmie doesn't know about the Carey act settlers and their contentions would fill several big volumes. Is he going to let his indorsement stand in the light of full knowledge of the situation? Oh, yes, for Jimmie isn't big enough to ever admit a mistake—and then he was taking orders, as usual, from some source or other—some source or other. Perhaps the same old source!

Whoop-la! Here comes the Capital News and asserts there is a deal on between the Republican party and the sheep barons and timber lords by which the state lands are to be sold to these interests; and, hoop-la again, for this self-same righteous Capital News is whooping it up for every Republican legislative candidate from Dan to Bersheba!
