

EULOGY OF BORAH BY JUDGE BUDGE

Glowing Tribute Paid Senator at the Meeting at Montpelier.

Judge Alfred Budge in introducing Senator Borah at Montpelier this week delivered one of the greatest eulogies on the distinguished senator that has been pronounced during the campaign.

Ladies and gentlemen, I esteem it an honor to be privileged to act as your chairman upon this occasion, and for the opportunity of introducing to you the speaker of the evening.

There are few men in public life today who enjoy a wider national acquaintance, or who is more familiar with the needs of our country, or who has striven harder to assist in bringing to the people that happiness and prosperity to which American citizenship is heir.

Idaho was at first excluded, but by reason of his untiring efforts we were added to the list of the favored states. The act providing for the homestead period from five to three years, and the act providing for the issuance of patent to homesteaders and desert land entry-men on reclamation projects at the end of the homestead residence period, and the amendment thereto, leaving it optional with the homesteader to determine himself whether he will prove up under the old or the new law, must be placed to the credit of our senior senator.

We, here in Bear Lake county, are more particularly interested in the benefits derived from the enlarged homestead act, and the act shortening the homestead period from five to three years, and tender to our senator upon this occasion our sincere appreciation for his tireless efforts in making it possible for the people in this county to secure additional lands and patent to lands upon which they have located within a reasonable time.

the records in the public land office at Blackfoot show the following splendid results:

Effect of Borah's Homestead Laws. In 1911, during the month of October, the Blackfoot office had 79 homestead proofs. In 1912, during the month of October, this office had 251 homestead proofs. This already shows the great effect of the three-year homestead bill, passed through congress by Borah, and signed June 6, 1912.

As to Borah's enlarged homestead bill, passed by him through congress about two years ago through the Blackfoot land office there have already been taken up and put under cultivation in excess of 250,000 acres of dry farm lands.

There are in Idaho five public land offices, and the above showing already made in the office at Blackfoot is only an illustration of what is being accomplished at the other four Idaho land offices, as a result of the effective and beneficial public land legislation pushed through congress by Idaho's great statesman, Senator Borah.
