

WILL ORGANIZE FOR THE BATTLE TO SAVE ALFALFA

Commercial Clubs of State Asked to Join in Movement for Protection of Idaho Hay.

The commercial clubs of the state have been called upon by R. W. Childs, secretary of the Boise club, to fall in line behind the farmers in a whirlwind fight for the alfalfa of Idaho.

The Boise secretary has sent out letters to all of the commercial organizations of the state appealing to them to take some action that will assist in lifting the California quarantine or that will give this state adequate laws to protect itself against such detrimental quarantines in the future.

He asks the clubs to urge their legislative delegations to work for a law that will give John U. McPherson, state horticultural inspector, strong enough powers to take whatever steps are necessary for the stamping out of disease wherever it appears among the agricultural crops as he now can do with disease in horticultural crops of the state.

The letter to the clubs follows: To the Commercial Clubs of Idaho, Gentlemen:

We are informed by J. U. McPherson, state horticulturist, that Lieutenant Governor Wallace and State Horticultural Inspector Cook of California have, without due notice and without giving a hearing, declared a quarantine on all alfalfa from the state of Idaho.

We understand that one county, and possibly two, have been affected by the alfalfa weevil. Letters of protest have been sent by Governor Hawley, the state horticultural department and the Boise Commercial club, and we urge your body to immediately send a protest to Lieutenant Governor Wallace, Sacramento, Cal., and ask that a hearing be given on the matter. We also urge your organization to pass resolutions requesting your legislative representatives to favor the passing of a law, which will give the state horticultural department the right to maintain the same rigid inspection over the agricultural side of farming as is now maintained over the horticultural lines, giving it the authority to inspect, reject or destroy grains, grasses and potatoes, raised or imported into Idaho, when found to be diseased and a menace to agricultural communities.

State Officials Active. The fight for Idaho alfalfa is not to be abandoned. It will be waged by both the governor and the state horticultural inspector, John U. McPherson. Not only has the governor sent a telegram to the California authorities, but he has decided to become active along other lines to accomplish the same result. California has not as yet lifted its quarantine.

Governor Hawley states that immediately upon hearing from this matter if the answer is not satisfactory, he will again take it up with Governor Wallace, and also with the national authorities and have investigation made showing that weevil does not exist in any counties in Idaho excepting the two counties referred to in the telegram and only in these two counties to a limited extent. The governor says to quarantine against hay from Twin Falls and Lincoln and other counties where there is a large amount of hay ready for shipment would mean a loss of an immense amount of money to the farmers of this state, as the hay was raised for shipment and there was not sufficient stock in those sections to feed it to,

so it would likely be lost. Governor Hawley also states that he has no doubt but what the final outcome of this matter will be satisfactory for an action discriminating against Idaho hay to be taken now by the authorities of California, without it was absolutely for good cause, would mean a prejudice engendered on the part of the people of our state which would without doubt operate against the success of the Panama-Pacific exposition, in which California is so much interested and would undoubtedly be a reason prompting the incoming legislature to not make its liberal appropriations for Idaho's representation there, which all of our citizens believe to be necessary for properly advertising the resources of this state.

CLOSING RALLY IN COUNTY HELD BY BORAH CLUB

C. C. Cavanah and C. S. Polk Make Addresses at Meridian in Behalf of Legislative Ticket.

The final rally held in Ada county under the auspices of the Ada County Republican club took place last night at Meridian before one of the largest audiences that has packed into Wilson hall. The applause that greeted the addresses of C. C. Cavanah and C. S. Polk was enthusiastic showing the big audience was heartily with Senator Borah and the Republican legislative ticket pledged to support him in the next legislature.

In speaking of the senator's record Mr. Cavanah referred to the beneficial legislation he had enacted and then launched into a denunciation of the dastardly attempts that have been made in the present campaign to defeat him. He called his audience's attention to the signs that have been plainly evident in all parts of the state of the tainted Lorimer money used for that purpose and asked if the people of this state proposed to stand for this kind of politics. He took occasion to call his audience's attention to the cowardly trick resorted to by the enemies of Senator Borah in sending out a fake ballot, the purpose of which was to cut off the legislative vote. Mr. Cavanah said he believed he could name those lack of the scheme and responsible for the outrage but would refrain from doing so until he had the absolute facts to substantiate his claim. He declared it was not done by the Progressives and branded the attempt to take votes away from Senator Borah in this matter as a dastardly political trick. The warning given the voters at Meridian on this fake ballot was sufficient to place them on their guard.

Mr. Polk scored Governor Hawley for his taxation perpetration upon the people of the state and called him a candidate for two offices at the same time. He also pointed out the uncertainty of the Democrats in offering a candidate for United States senator, declaring that even the legislative candidates on the Democratic party do not know who the Democrats would pick for the United States senate. The Republican legislative ticket was represented at the meeting by Charles D. Storey, C. F. Koelsch, H. A. Lawson and T. H. McCormick. Special music was furnished on the violin and banjo.

LIEUT. GOVERNOR LOST HIS CHANCE TO NAME SENATOR

One Explanation for Hurdled Return of Hawley From North—Report of Scheme Discredited.

Did Lieutenant Governor L. H. Sweetser intend to appoint a United States senator for the recess appointment the minute Governor Hawley stepped over the boundary lines of the state and was that why the governor cancelled his Moscow date? If Lieutenant Governor Sweetser did, Governor Hawley was not aware of his designs. The Democratic state central committee managers declare the Moscow date was cancelled because that as the campaign drew to a close it was discovered the governor had not spoken in Adams and Washington counties and his itinerary was changed so he could do so.

"I do not believe Lieutenant Governor Sweetser had any such intention, nor would he in my opinion take advantage of my passing out of the state to fill the recess vacancy," declared Governor Hawley when the report was called to his attention yesterday afternoon just as he was leaving for Nampa to deliver his last campaign address last night. "The Moscow date was changed so that I could speak in Adams and Washington counties, into which I had not been. The report I did not speak in Malad is a mistake. I had a big meeting there. The state committee made the switch and I was too good a soldier not to follow my commander."

Secretary George D. Hill made the same explanation for the switch when his attention was called to the report. "We had an understanding as to the Moscow date that the governor should fill it if he could possibly finish his itinerary in the south to do so. The fact of the matter is Governor Hawley could not fill his southwestern Idaho dates and go north to We then decided that in view of the fact he had been north and had already spoken at Moscow it would be better for him to go into Adams, Washington and Canyon counties and the itinerary was therefore switched. The reason for the change was understood by the Moscow people."

According to the report in political circles, the passing of Governor Hawley from the state into another was to be the cue for Lieutenant Governor Sweetser to immediately name a United States senator for the recess appointment. Those who know Mr. Sweetser best here declare that the report was absolutely groundless for they did not believe that he would attempt to play that kind of politics just because the governor had passed from this state to another and immediately returned to Idaho, being forced to go over the boundary line to reach his destination. Party leaders, however, were interested in the report which added the unusual contest without one, relying on my knowledge of books to win.
