

HAWLEY READY TO CONCEDE DEFEAT; GIVES REASONS

Declares That His Taxation Policies Have Been Misunderstood but That They Will Prevail.

Governor Hawley, upon being approached this afternoon, by a representative of the Capital News and asked for his opinion as to the results of the election yesterday and the causes leading up to the defeat of himself and the

other Democratic candidates, said: "I have not made a careful analysis of the returns so far. I went to bed last night at half-past nine and slept until nearly seven, obtaining a much needed rest. I paid no attention to the returns, except taking the reports as printed in the morning papers and I am satisfied from them that, based upon the record of the votes counted in the southeastern part of the state, I as well as the other candidates on the Democratic ticket, are defeated. Some of my friends are loathe to admit this, but I quit chasing rainbows, even political rainbows, very many years ago, and can see no reasonable grounds for believing that either myself or any other candidate on our ticket has received a plurality of the votes. So far as I am concerned personally I feel no particular disappointment except the fact that defeat always leaves a certain sting, but our glorious national victory cures all the pain from that source. I regret more the defeat of others associated with me on the state ticket than I do my own. Having had all the honors of the office of gov-

ernor, and knowing from past experience that its duties involve double the labor attending my own business while the pay is but a small percentage of what I have heretofore received as a practicing lawyer, I feel that defeat is probably better for myself and my family than election would have been. "The reason for my defeat probably could be best expressed by simply saying that it was due to the fact of my not receiving votes enough. The reason for lack of votes, however, was standing on the part of many as to the effect of my taxation and revenue theories. These are matters, however, that have obtained such headway that my ideas are bound to be carried out and Idaho will receive a greater benefit from this effort of mine in the immediate future than from everything that has been done by all the governors of the state for the past twenty years. There was a systematic effort made to deceive the people in regard to this and other matters by my political opponents. This, combined with the fact that a small percentage of the mem-

bers of my own party for personal reasons withdrew their support, accounts I believe for my defeat. "I have the satisfaction of knowing that I made the most extended and vigorous campaign ever before made by a candidate for any office in the state of Idaho. I have spoken many more times and before greater audiences than ever before did a candidate in this state. Especially am I glad to be able to say that during this entire time I have never in any address uttered a sentence with reference to any candidate upon either of the other tickets that could not have been said before such candidate's own wife and children without bringing a flush of anger or a blush of shame to their cheeks, with the exception of the candidate on the Progressive ticket for the office to which I aspire, whose continued and persistent misstatement of facts and perversion of legal points led me to give him less generous treatment in this regard than I did to others opposing me. "I will leave the office of governor with the consciousness that the duties of my own office and of the offices whose incumbents I appointed have been fully performed and that I have labored for the best interests of Idaho and its entire citizenship."

Late Returns

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 6.—Nine precincts in Bonner county gave Wilson 453, Taft 398, Roosevelt 532, Debs, 393; Hawley 448, Haines 247, Martin 674; Mitchell 802, French 701, Smock 343, Pugmire 346, Smith 40.

Blackfoot, Nov. 6.—Twelve precincts in Bingham county give Taft 1162, Wilson 899, Roosevelt 210; French 1426, Smith 1391, Mitchell 691, Pugmire 636; Haines 1237, Hawley 666, Martin 126. Four of the precincts are in Blackfoot.

Spokane, Nov. 6.—Thirty precincts in Kootenai county give Wilson 2147, Taft 2273, Roosevelt 802; Hawley 2247, Haines 2173, Martin 710. All Republican legislators are elected.

Pocatello, Nov. 6.—Incomplete returns from Bannock, Bear Lake, Bonneville, Bingham and Owyhee counties indicate that southeastern Idaho will give Taft 2000 plurality, Haines 3000 over Hawley and a still greater majority for the Republican congressmen.

Pocatello, Nov. 6.—Eighteen of the 18 precincts in Bear Lake county show that Taft carried the county by 375 and Haines by 375. French leads Smith, who has about the same majority as Haines. The Republicans elect the entire legislative ticket and all but four of the county officers.

FIGHT HAS ONLY JUST BEGUN SAYS STATE CHAIRMAN

State Chairman J. H. Gipson of the Progressive state committee, in acknowledging defeat in the state, has issued a statement thanking and congratulating the people of the state and declaring that the party will go ahead as a permanent organization with full county and state tickets in the field two years from now. He declares that the Republican party has been annihilated. His statement is as follows:

"In the absence of complete returns, comment on the situation in the state is superfluous. The fact remains that the Progressive party has received a tremendous vote for its candidate for governor, and that citizens by the tens of thousands have resented the attempt to disfranchise them by writing in the names of Roosevelt electors on the ballot. Roosevelt has apparently carried every northern county, as well as the counties of Twin Falls, Lincoln, Ada and Canyon in the south, all by enormous pluralities, ranging from 300 in Lincoln to 1500 in Canyon. No greater tribute to the intelligence and patriotism of the voters of these great counties could be paid than to state this fact. I am naturally particularly pleased at the showing made by my home county of Canyon, where Martin leads Hawley by about 1500 and Haines by about 2500. Beyond the shadow of a doubt, Roosevelt would have carried Idaho had it not been necessary to write the names of our electors on the ballot. "The results in the nation indicate conclusively that the Republican party is not defeated; it is annihilated. From the ashes of defeat this year the Progressive party will arise strong and purified by adversity. Standing as it does for the rights of the plain people, with the program of social and industrial justice, its wonderful leaders, headed by Theodore Roosevelt, it can only grow in strength from day to day. The party has been firmly established as the Progressive party of the nation, and beyond any doubt we will sweep the elections of 1912 in the states and 1916 in the nation. "So far as our plans for the future go we will continue on the course we have outlined. We will have full county and legislative tickets in every county in the state for 1912, in addition to a complete state and congressional ticket. Idaho must be made Progressive."

BLAINE PLEASSED OVER THE RESULT IN THIS COUNTY

S. E. Blaine, chairman of the Ada county Republican central committee, today issued a statement expressing his appreciation of the support given to the county ticket by electors, the way in which the people rallied to the support of Senator W. E. Borah and condemning the tactics resorted to by the senator's enemies in an attempt to defeat the legislative ticket—an attempt severely rebuked through the vote given those candidates. "As chairman of the Ada county Republican central committee, I am very much gratified and elated over the large majority received by our candidates at yesterday's election," said Chairman Blaine. "Had it not been a cold and rainy day we would have had the largest majority ever cast in Ada county for any candidate. I wish to congratulate our Democratic friends for the fight they put up by their chairman, Mr. Smead, for

"I condemn most heartily the dastardly attempt made to strike at Senator Borah in the hope to defeat the Republican legislative candidate in this county through the late circulation of fraudulent ballots by vicious enemies of the senator. LEMHI COUNTY IS CARRIED BY HAWLEY

Salmon, Nov. 6.—Returns on head of the tickets are very incomplete from outlying districts. There is no change from early morning reports. The indications are that the Democrats have carried the county on state and national tickets. The Bull Moose vote was far below expectations. The Democratic legislative ticket was elected by an assured majority. Hawley may carry the county by over 200. There are no reports on the constitutional amendments, but they will be defeated.
