

SOUTHERN WOMEN IN CONVENTION AT WASHINGTON

Lay Cornerstone for Confederate Monument in Arlington Cemetery.

PRESERVE SPIRIT OF THE SOUTHLAND

Distribution of the Southern Cross of Honor by the Daughters of the Confederacy—Many Means Adopted to Keep Green the Memory of the Heroes of the South.

In Arlington national cemetery today the laying of the cornerstone of the Confederate monument that is to be the central feature of the Confederate section of the cemetery will mark the opening of the annual convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy to be held in the neighboring city of Washington.

The monument is now in process of construction in the studio of Sir Moses Ezekiel, the noted Italian sculptor, who has promised that it shall be completed in time for erection next June when its unveiling will be a fitting ceremony in connection with the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the battle of Gettysburg, which is a part of the 5-years' program of the jubilee celebration of 50 years of peace between the north and the south.

Four Days' Session. After the cornerstone-laying the real work of the convention will open and for four days these daughters from the south, who are now to be found in every state of the union, will give their attention to the promotion of the various lines of good work for which the order was established.

short a period, accomplished more genuine good. The United Daughters of the Confederacy had its origin in Nashville, Tenn., where it was the outgrowth of an effort of the women of that city to secure greater interest in preserving the spirit and historic achievements of the south.

One of the most important works of the organization has been in connection with the establishment of the Confederate museum in Richmond, Va., in the house which was occupied by Jefferson Davis while president of the Confederate states.

Distribution of Cross of Honor. An interesting work accomplished by the organization is the distribution of the Southern Cross of Honor. This is a medal of honor awarded to every soldier and sailor in the Confederate army and navy who served throughout the war, or was awarded honorable discharge.

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concluded since it is felt that all of those entitled to them have been supplied. In the matter of preserving the material and data for the history of the struggle between the two sections, the daughters have done much by erecting markers and monuments on the lesser fields of the great struggle, as well as by identifying for future generations the scenes of particular incidents of bravery and heroism.

In the matter of benevolence to those who were especially entitled to their aid, the daughters have always been most liberal. In fact, it was the women who composed the auxiliary connected with the Confederate Soldiers' home in Tennessee who first conceived the idea of a national organization of southern women, and there never has been any diminution of the generosity with which all of the wants of these old veterans have been supplied.

Monuments and Memorials. There have been numerous monuments and memorials erected to commemorate some special event or person connected with some location in the south. Sometimes they take the place of public drinking fountains and thus serve a two-fold good.

The Daughters of the Confederacy have also secured a number of scholarships which they award to pupils who desire a higher education. Miss Ruth Wilkins of Cartersville, Ga., lately has been sent to Vassar college under the auspices of the Georgia division of the Daughters of the Confederacy.

Although less than 20 years old the United Daughters of the Confederacy has become one of the most important women's organizations of the world. It now has over 1200 chapters representing almost every state in the union. There are 23 states having divisions numbering at least 3 chapters.

WILL BEGIN WORK ON NEW BUILDING

School Board to Advertise for Bids—Big Increase in High School.

The school board last night authorized C. B. Little to advertise at once for bids for the foundation for the new Lowell school to be built in Cruzen addition and Superintendent Meek reported that the mechanical draughting department of the high school, which is getting out the plans for the building, which will be similar to the new Washington school, had them about completed and bids for at least four rooms of the structure will be asked for within a short time.

Superintendent Meek proudly informed the board that Boise headed the list of all cities in the United States at the point of increased enrollment of the high school, the enrollment having increased 100 per cent during the past three years until it is now one-fifth of the total school enrollment in the city.
