

# DENUNCIATION OF SOCIALISM FROM DAVID GOLDSTEIN

Former Member of Organization Attacks Its Principles—Questions by Socialists Answered.

"To be a true Socialist is to be a free lover. To be a complete Socialist is to be an atheist."

In a scathing denunciation of Socialism, David Goldstein, at the Pinyan last night, between storms of applause and hisses, so declared and exposed the teachings of the greatest leaders of the organization, declaring that the ends and aims of the works by which the party stands are free love and atheism of the rankest sort.

Socialists were out in force last night. Interruptions of every nature occurred all through the evening but the speaker was equal to any emergency. He took the books written by the highest authorities of the organization, the records of their own meetings, the proceedings of their own conventions and he analyzed them in a way that brought hisses from the hundreds of Socialists that were in the audience.

In quoting from one section of a book, he declared that the Socialists believed that Christ was an agitator, a rebel, a waver of a red flag. The statement brought applause from nearly every member of the party in the well filled house.

Rising to his full height, the speaker shouted: "Let me tell you Socialists that to applaud a statement that Christ was an agitator, a rebel, a waver of a red flag is an insult in the

face of every Christian in this country. Let me tell you that Christ was the fulfillment of the Mosaic dispensation, that he was not the leader of a mere labor movement, that he was not an agitator, a rebel, nor the waver of a red flag."

Speaker Followed After Meeting. The argument continued long after the meeting was over. The Socialists followed the speaker down the street. Robert Marsh shouted as the speaker went down to his hotel: "You will never put bread in the mouths of the people by any such statements as you made tonight." At the order to move on, he again shouted: "I've got every bit as much temper as you have and I'm not afraid to match my muscle up against yours at any time."

Mr. Goldstein went through several of the best known books on socialism. He dispelled the idea that the Socialists were not responsible for the teachings in those books by proving that every local of the organization in the world distributed and circulated those books, that the greatest leaders of the party wrote those books and taught in them the principles of the most abject free love and rankest atheism.

He took some of the books section by section and read from them. He quoted paragraph after paragraph where the writers had advocated free love, where they said that after sex passion had ceased to exist separation was better for the man, for the woman and for the community in which they lived. He quoted places where they declared that no third person had the right to interfere in matters between a man and a woman, that no functionary had any importance. In such matters, that they were private matters as much as are the kind of clothes that are worn or the kind of food that is eaten.

He declared that the party strikes at the very root of the Christian family, that it is an attack on the Christian religion, that its leaders have declared in lectures and in their books that religion would die out and the churches with them were the Socialists but in power for a few years.

To Break Down Religion. He said that they planned to break

down the Christian standards of religion and of family and struck directly at the sanctity of the home. He said that the fundamental principle of the party is a belief in the materialistic interpretation of history, that the principles of religion, under this theory, are determined by the conditions of the people, that they are not unchangeable nor eternal but are subject to unceasing changes with the alterations in the conditions of the people who believe in them.

He said that the party divides history into the ages of slavery, feudalism and capitalism, that according to their belief, Christ was a leader of a labor movement, an agitator, a rebel, a waver of a red flag.

At the statement that the party believes that the adoption of Socialism will create a classless society, that religion will die out and the churches with them, he was greeted with applause from the members of the organization who were in the audience. He turned on them and said: "All through the night you will find me correctly presenting your doctrine. You see the wisdom of the Knights of Columbus; they don't want religion to die out. Why don't you declare in your platform that religion would die out? You would not get nearly as many votes."

Every leader of the party, he said, is an atheist. The teachings of their books are the teachings of atheism and of free love. Their greatest leaders, some of them, practiced it. He held the party responsible for those teachings because it circulates the books and holds them up as the classics of Socialism.

Scandals in Organization. "By those books you stand and by them you shall fall in the estimation of decent American citizens everywhere, once they are given an opportunity to know what they contain," he said. "When you say that your party organization is primarily an economic movement, the words of your very platform is the lie of the party that wrote them and is the lie of every local that indorses them."

He excoriated by the scandals that have occurred time and again at the national organization, that the center of those scandals was the campaign manager for Eugene V. Debs in the last campaign, and that the party covered him and the others with coats of whitewash every time their indecent conduct was brought to light.

The mention of the name of William D. Haywood brought applause from the Socialists in the house. "Yes, he typifies your movement, both in his public and in his private life," shouted the speaker.

Mr. Goldstein said that although the party had promised to better the condition of the working man were it given power for two weeks, it had never increased his happiness one iota nor done one per cent of the things that it had promised to do when it was out after the votes.

Questions Are Asked. After the speech, Gus Frankel, one of the party members, started in to ask questions. "Do you mean that the materialistic interpretation of history is only advocated by the Socialists?" he asked. "I mean that the materialistic interpretation of history is the fundamental principle of socialism and that no man can be a Christian and a Socialist," the speaker answered.

"Do you know that Rev. Dewey of the Catholic church in his book on the 'History of Economics' indorses socialism and its teachings and that the book has the sanction of Cardinal Farley?" "I know Rev. Dewey personally and I have read his book thoroughly and from what I know of the man and from what I know of the book, I know that he does not indorse socialism nor the principles that it advocates."

Reading from the Appeal to Reason, Frankel asked if it were true that Mr. Goldstein had been ejected from the Socialist Labor party because of a juggling of the funds. "Tell me, you slanderer," shouted the speaker, "whether if I were such a juggler of the party funds, if I were such an accomplished embezzler, the Socialist party into which I went would have made me secretary-treasurer of the organization and would have given me the highest honors within its gift."

Printing of Dodgers. Frankel charged him with circulating a dodger that did not have the union label upon it, and that while he professed to be a union man, he did not live up to the principles of his organization.

"I had nothing to do with the printing of that dodger, and if I had the label would not have been upon it necessarily." The work was done in the Capital News job rooms, a union shop, and was done by union men. The label is not usually printed upon circulars unless it is particularly asked. As a matter of fact, it was brought out that there is not a single non-union shop in the city and that all printing done here is done by union men.

"Do Eugene V. Debs and other great leaders of the party practice free love?" Frankel asked. "I don't know. I don't charge them with being free lovers any more than I charge you, because you are a Socialist, with being a free lover, but I do charge and I can prove that if they carried out the principles which their own party teaches, they would be free lovers and they would be atheists."

In introducing the speaker, Jess B. Hawley, the chairman, said: "We have gone back to a general study of some of the conditions in this country. Heretofore we have been too much occupied with politics before the election—for I understand that there was an election, at least in a part of the state. It seems to be a question of running one man's character down and boosting another man's character up nowadays."

"We are discussing socialism tonight because of its growing importance in the city, the county, the state and the nation. Socialism is not dead; it is a living issue. There is a woeful lack of knowledge among the people of the country. Its importance is not indicated by the meager vote that it has received. If there is any good in socialism, why not adopt that good? If it is an attack upon the principles of American government, if it is an effort to strike at the sanctity of the home

**REDUCTION MADE IN FREIGHT RATE ON CANNED GOODS**

Idaho Product Given Good Rates to Missouri River Points and Chicago by the Harriman System.

(Staff Correspondence) Emmett, Nov. 14.—About a month ago the Oregon Short Line made a material reduction in the rate on Idaho canned goods to Missouri river points and to Chicago. The former rate on Idaho canned goods to Missouri river points was \$1.20 per hundred pounds. Now the rate is 70 cents per hundred. This is about the same rate as for horses shipped from Idaho to Missouri river points. The rate on Idaho canned goods to Chicago has been reduced to 85 cents per hundred. These reductions in freight rates open up new territory and new markets for all sorts of Idaho canned goods. This no doubt will encourage Idaho canneries to large increase their outputs in the future.

**10,000 Cases Packed by J. R. Field.**  
The J. R. Field cannery at Emmett this season, recently closed, packed a total of approximately 10,000 cases of canned goods, 4000 cases of which were peaches, strawberries and dewberries; 6000 cases were peas, beans and tomatoes. This entire pack, which has a selling value of \$25,000, is nearly all sold and delivered, and is being handled principally by Boise wholesalers. Exhibit Car of Apples in East. On Tuesday of this week the Emmett Commercial club shipped a carload of apples to G. E. Sherman at Indianapolis where they will be exhibited for a whole week in one of the largest department

stores of that city. This no doubt will have the effect of attracting much attention to this part of the famous Payette valley.

**\$6 Bushels on Non-Irrigated Land.**  
The Van Deusen Sheep Co. of Emmett have one of their ranches at the foot of Squaw Butte where this season they got a yield of \$6 bushels of oats per acre from 39 acres of non-irrigated land. The soil there is remarkably rich and sub-irrigates sufficiently to produce big crops without the necessity of irrigation. The Van Deusens this year threshed a total of 10,500 bushels of grain.

**A. J. Kelly Bought Threshing Outfit.**  
A. J. Kelly, the well known engineer and machinist at the McNish sawmill here, just bought the Frank Moulton threshing outfit consisting of an 18-horse power engine and 32x56 separator. Mr. Kelly has operated threshing machines in the past. He is an expert machinist and will operate his threshing outfit in the Emmett country next year.

**W. T. Crouch just completed a six-room bungalow, hay barn and other outbuildings on his 20-acre slope ranch just southeast of Emmett, at a cost of \$2000. Mr. Crouch has his 20 acres in commercial apple orchard. This 20-acre adjoins on the south the 20-acre peach orchard owned by Justice Sullivan of the Idaho supreme court.**

**Widening Farmers' Co-operative.**  
Quite a force of men is employed around Emmett just now, cleaning and widening the big Farmers' Co-operative canal, which is one of the best irrigation canals in the state. This ditch takes out of the Payette river at a point about two miles above Emmett and empties in the Snake river opposite Ontario. It furnishes water for many acres of land between Emmett and New Plymouth, and for a large portion of the famous Payette bench between New Plymouth, Fruitland and on down to the Snake river.

A great deal of work of a permanent character is being done on the Canyon canal. This ditch furnishes water for the famous Emmett slope and bench.

**TURKEY'S PLEA**

European intervention will not be needed. The diplomatic situation is easier, but the French premier, M. Poincaré, in a speech in Paris last night did not speak too hopefully, and proof that all danger is not passed is seen in reports from Austria and Russia of unusual troop movements and mobilization in Russia's western provinces.

M. Poincaré declared it essential that Europe advance no pretensions on the fruits of the allies' victories, and he expressed the fervent belief that it would be impossible that the Balkan difficulties could lead to a war, the most frightful that ever laid Europe low.

The report that the Servians have reached Nuraxo is not confirmed, and no news has been received from other points. Serious internal difficulties are developing in Constantinople and the guard has taken strong action in arresting the young Turk leaders.

**Heavy Turkish Losses.**  
Athens, Nov. 14.—It is announced that 35,000 Turks were engaged in the battle against the Greeks at Tenedos. They had 42 heavy guns. The Turkish losses numbered 3000 killed, 500 made prisoners and 22 guns captured. The Greek losses were 500 killed and wounded, including 15 officers.

**Cessation of Hostilities.**  
London, Nov. 14.—A Constantinople dispatch to the Daily News says: At 4 o'clock this afternoon the director of transportation informed those making inquiries at the war office that the cessation of hostilities already had been arranged. Simultaneously another officer summoned the chief contractors for military supplies and informed them that hostilities would cease this evening and the existing supply contracts would be cancelled and no further military supplies sent to the front.
