BALKAN NATIONS WILL REPLY TO REQUEST OF THE TURKS

Negotiations for Armistice to Be Carried on By Committee of Generals of the Armies

Sofia, Nov. 15.—The Turkish request for an armistice, addressed by Kiamil Pasha, grand vizier, to King Ferdinand, was discussed today by the Bulgarian council. The ministers decided to reply that the Bulgarian government would inform other nations of the Balkan alliance of the proposal and would reply as soon as an agreement was reached with them. After the allies are consulted it is believed negotiations for an armistice will be carried on by a committee of generals of the opposing armies, purely from a military point of view.

Constantinople, Nov. 15.—The cholera epidemic among the Turkish troops holding the line of fortifications at Tchatalja, in front of Constantinople, is rapidly becoming worse. More than 500 cases are reported daily and the total exceeds 6000. Whatever the hopes the Turks may have had of maintaining the line of defenses at Tchatalja have been dismissed by the outbreak of cholera. It is stated on good authority that cholera already has appeared among the Bulgarian troops.

Belgrade, Nov. 15.—Another Turkish force surrendered to the Serbian cavalry near Monastir yesterday. The Serbians attacked the Turks about five miles northeast of Monastir and despite a galling fire dislodged the Turkish advance posts from their entrenched positions. The Turks retreated and were pursued by the Serbians, who surrounded them. The advance of the Serbian army was temporarily stopped by floods.

ROOSEVELT HAS LEAD OF 72 ON OFFICIAL COUNT

San Francisco, Nov. 15.—California complete gave Roosevelt a plurality over Wilson of 72 in considerably more than half a million votes. These figures were official from all but three counties—San Francisco, Los Angeles and Yuba.

TWELVE BURIED IN THE WORKINGS OF SILVER MINE

Salt Lake, Nov. 15.—By a cave-in last night in the Horn Silver mine at Frisco, Beaver county, Utah, 12 persons, including two girls, were buried in the mine workings. Daisy and Hazel Alexander, daughters of Mine Foreman Roy Alexander, with David Banks and Arnold Robinson, eighteenthers, with James Riley, night shift boss, were caught on the 300 level. Through air pipes they made known that they were uninjured. Below the 300 level the slide tore out pipes and nothing is known of the fate of seven miners, including Alexander, who were working in the deeper levels.

PARIS BANKER GIVES UP TO POLICE AND MAKES CONFESSION

Paris, Nov. 15.—Augustin Max, known as the "Blind Banker of Paris," created a mild sensation in financial circles here by surrendering himself to the police, confessing the misappropriation of \$2,000,000 of his clients' money, which he lost in nickel and copper mines in New Caledonia.

CONDEMN THE PAYMENT OF MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT

London, Nov. 15.—Payment of members of parliament was condemned at the morning session of the conference of unionist associations, now meeting in London. A resolution was adopted inviting the next house of commons to restore the principle of gratuitous parliamentary service.

Telephone Pioneers. Meet. New York, Nov. 15.—The second annual meeting of the Telephone Pioneers of America began at the Hotel Astor today and will continue over tomorrow. Thomas A. Edison, Alexander Graham Bell, Theodore N. Vall and other men who have had a prominent part in the development of the telephone industry are in attendance.

Senator Rayner Improved. Washington, Nov. 15.—The condition of Senator Rayner of Maryland, critically ill at his home in Washington, was slightly improved this morning.

CLARK IN FAVOR OF THE CALL FOR SPECIAL SESSION

Speaker Declares That the Democratic Party Should Waste No Time in Redeeming Pledges.

Washington, Nov. 15.—"I believe there should be an extra session of congress at the earliest possible date after March 4 to fulfill the pledges made by the Democratic party," said Speaker Champ Clark upon his return to Washington today. "The party has made its promises and it should not put off the fulfilling of them." Speaker Clark reached here from West Virginia. He said he had come to Washington to take up the legislative program for the approaching session of congress.

M'MANIGAL LEAVES STAND TEMPORARILY

Reign of Terror Planned. Indianapolis, Nov. 15.—The McNamara brothers, convicted of causing the fatal Los Angeles Times explosion, determined, after it, to wage a campaign of terror. Emboldened by the fact that James B. McNamara was not captured, although months had elapsed, they began, early in 1911, to steal dynamite by wagon loads from a stone quarry, according to witnesses in the dynamite conspiracy trial today.

Governor Hawley Will Be Named to Fill the Senatorial Vacancy

L. H. SWEETSER TO BE THE GOVERNOR

Announces That He Will Appoint Present Executive to Hayburn's Seat.

Will Appoint Governor Hawley. Lieutenant Governor L. H. Sweetser authorized the following statement today: "Should Governor James H. Hawley resign as governor of the state of Idaho and by virtue of that act I become governor of this state I will most certainly appoint Governor Hawley United States senator from Idaho to succeed the late Weldon B. Heyburn for the recess vacancy. I believe that it would be for the best interests of the state of Idaho for Governor Hawley to fill the vacancy. A Democrat will be appointed and in my opinion the governor is the Democrat who should be."

Governor James H. Hawley will resign as governor of the state of Idaho this afternoon, Lieutenant Governor Lewis H. Sweetser will become governor and will forthwith appoint Governor Hawley United States senator from Idaho to succeed the late Weldon B. Heyburn in the upper house of congress, filling the recess vacancy that now exists, if the negotiations that were underway today go through without a hitch and they probably will.

ALL TELL SAME STORY WHEN ON STAND

"Dago Frank" Says He Was Not Present at the Shooting

DESCRIBES VISIT OF ROSE DAY OF MURDER

Was Only for the Purpose of Discussing "Frame-up" of Jack Zelig, the Gang Leader—Witnesses Use Almost Same Words.

New York, Nov. 15.—"Dago Frank," hollow cheeked and rawboned, with curly jet black hair, took the stand this morning in the trial of the gunmen for the Rosenthal murder. His testimony was almost word for word a repetition of the story told by his three fellow gunmen yesterday up to the point where the witness said he left Whitey, Gyp and Louie at Webber's poker rooms the night of the murder. He testified that the visit of Jack Rose to his apartment was only to discuss the "framing up" of Jack Zelig, the gang leader, and the shooting of Lefty Louie in Chinatown. The killing of Rosenthal was not mentioned.

"I said," testified Frank, "Well, Jack, the boys are from Missouri. You had better show them." The witness said Rose then asked him to come and look for the other gunmen. They boarded an automobile, in which Rose, Vallon and Schepps had arrived, and on the way down town Frank said Rose told him he could not sleep at night because of worry of being accused of the "framing up" of Zelig. "He told me he was known as a stool pigeon by Lieutenant Becker, but would prove to me he was not a stool pigeon but simply got stool pigeons for Becker."

VILLAGE OF STAR IS VISITED BY A DISASTROUS FIRE

Three Buildings Destroyed in Midnight Fire, Causing Loss of \$11,000, Partly Covered by Insurance.

Three buildings at Star were destroyed at a loss of \$11,000 by a fire that started from an unknown cause shortly after midnight this morning. The property of the Star Commercial company valued at \$4,000 and the stock worth about \$6,000 went up in the flames that swept through the brick structure and destroyed the wooden addition to the building. The buildings were owned by J. E. Stoner and were leased by J. C. Hughes.

The fire started somewhere in the cellar of the store building and had gained quite a headway before it was discovered by Mrs. J. C. Ohl, who was awakened by the smell of the burning wood. The chemical fire engine rushed to the scene and did effective work in confining the flames and preventing the adjoining buildings.

Part of the loss is covered by insurance, especially on the stock in the store. Just how much this insurance was, it was impossible to learn as the owners of the property were out of the town at the time that the fire occurred.

NEW CABINET TO BE FORMED IN SPAIN

Madrid, Nov. 15.—Count Alvaro de Romanes, president of the chamber of deputies, has been selected by King Alfonso to form a new cabinet in consequence of the assassination of Premier Canalejas. It was announced that Count de Romanes had declined to retain all the ministers.

appointment he would select a Democrat. No matter who would be selected there would still be criticism. I see no good reason why he should not receive the appointment himself and I firmly believe that it would be for the good of the state for him to do so.

Speaks Highly of Governor. "I have known Governor Hawley for many years, both personally and in a business way. I do not need to comment on his qualifications. We will admit that there is no question on that score. Looking at the situation from a non-partisan standpoint, I cannot help but feel that it would be for the best interests of the state that the governor accept the recess appointment."

"For me to become governor of Idaho at this time, while I greatly appreciate the honor if even endorsed for a short period, in a personal business matter I would have to be very hurriedly away from my business which needs my attention, and to become governor will keep me away from that business for a much longer time. I am ready and willing, however, to do anything within my power for the best interests of the state of Idaho."

"The greatest possible pressure has been brought to bear upon Governor Hawley to go to the United States senate. It has come from men prominent in his own party, from leading Republicans and from men identified with the Bull Moose party. Leading Republicans I have seen look upon the matter as one elevated above politics and have been insistent in their wish that the governor go to Washington. I look upon the matter in the same light as these men do."

THREE-YEAR SEARCH FOR NEW CONTINENT

Washington, Nov. 15.—Vilhjalur Stefansson, the explorer, whose recent discovery of a tribe of blond Eskimos at Coronation gulf stirred the scientific world, announced yesterday that he would sail from San Francisco or Seattle in June, 1913, on a three-year search for a continent supposed to exist in the Arctic.

Socialist Mayor Fined. Little Falls, N. Y., Nov. 15.—George R. Lunn, Socialist mayor of Schenectady, was found guilty today of violating an ordinance in refusing to move when the police interrupted a speech he was making to striking mill employees and was fined \$50.
