Florida grapefruit are selling cheaper on the market today than ever before in Boise, the price ranging from 3 for 25 cents, for the smaller size to 15 cents each for the larger ones.



EXPLANATORY NOTES. Observations taken at 5 a. m., seven-fifths meridian time. Air pressure reduced to sea level. Isotherms (dotted lines) pass through points of equal temperature; drawn only for zero freezing, 5° and 10°.

FORECAST FOR BOISE AND VICINITY—Fair and cooler tonight and Saturday. DAILY REPORT—Highest temperature yesterday, 54; lowest temperature this morning, 41; mean temperature yesterday, 49. Total precipitation for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m., .04 of an inch.

CONDITIONS—A barometric depression of considerable importance is central near the Gulf of St. Lawrence, attended by precipitation in New England and the middle Atlantic states. Elsewhere the pressure is high and fair weather prevails except on the north Pacific slope, where light showers have occurred. Temperature changes have been unimportant except locally. Fair weather may be expected in Boise and its vicinity tonight and Saturday with lower temperature tonight.
