The elk weighs 600 pounds dressed. It had to be dragged for miles through the woods and brush from the hunting ground. Mr. Peasley proved that he is a rapid game artist for he had his elk shot and back into camp within three days, bagging the monster the first day out. He was satisfied with one of the members of the antlered tribe, and after he had brought him to the ground lost no time in retracing his steps. Few hunters are as successful in the elk country of the west. Many are satisfied if they can kill a bull elk in a week.  
"It was a great trip and the actual hunting time was short," enthusiastically declared Mr. Peasley. "I was lucky in running across the bull when I did, and having done so I lost no time in getting within striking distance and bringing him to the ground. The Green Timber country is about 23 miles from Ashton. It is a great elk hunting ground, and yet the monsters are not as easy to shoot as one would think. I have not placed the elk on exhibition, but have him at my home."

**CHANGES MADE IN COMMERCIAL LEAGUE**

Some changes have been made in the directorship of the Idaho State League of Commercial Bodies since the board first began its studies of the needs and conditions of the state.  
The resignation of W. L. Hasbrouck of Caldwell on account of illness has been accepted and M. H. Gibbons, secretary of the Commercial club of that place, has been appointed to fill the vacancy. W. E. Hance of Twin Falls was also made a director in the place of John MacMullen of Idaho Falls, who resigned.  
The board is laying plans and making suggestions for the advertising of the state and the closer union of all of the commercial organizations inside of the state lines. A legislative committee will probably be appointed soon to take charge of the league's plans at the capital while the legislature is in session. It will present laws, in all probability, to the legislature that would tend for the betterment of the conditions by the state and that would be for the advancement of the interests of every part of the state.

**MAKING PLANS FOR GOOD ROADS MEETING**

Plans are already made for the entertainment of the Inter-Mountain Good Roads association, which meets in Boise next June and at which it is expected there will be over 1000 delegates. Utah alone having guaranteed, through J. A. Hendricks, president of the association, to send a special train here containing 500 delegates, while Montana, which is after the next convention, proposes to send a special train. Wyoming and Nevada are expected to be well represented.  
Dr. L. P. McCalla, chairman of the executive committee of the association for Idaho, is planning to make the convention one of the best ever held in the west in the interests of good roads and has already started laying plans to get all the ranchers in southern Idaho to attend the convention for a day or two at least. He predicts that great good will come from having the convention in this city.


