Why DID the City Editor Leave So Suddenly?

POINT IS WON BY CITY OF WALLACE

Supreme Court Declines to Interfere With Order Granting New Trial.

Chief Justice George H. Stewart filed for record in the supreme court late yesterday an "after dark" opinion in the case of Charles M. Baillie versus the City of Wallace, an action for damages in which Baillie was given a verdict for \$5000. The city was granted a new trial and from this order Baillie appealed. One of the interesting questions in the case is whether Baillie was injured by striking his head against a metallic sign or by a policeman's club.

This question is brought out in the remarks of the chief justice as follows:

"Turning now to the evidence for the purpose of determining whether the discretion of the trial court in granting or refusing a motion for a new trial was abused, we are safe in saying, and the evidence is uncontradicted, that on Oct. 15, 1911, the Northern Express company was occupying a building facing Sixth street in the city of Wallace; that the Northern Express company placed a sign attached to said building at the entrance to the building, and that the sign was a metallic sign, and the lower edge was 5 feet, 10 7-16 inches from the surface of the sidewalk. The sign was securely fastened to the side of the building, and all of the sign except about fifteen-sixteenths of an inch thereof was suspended over the sidewalk.

"There is evidence also which shows that about midnight on October 15, 1911, Baillie was walking along the sidewalk, and came into contact with the sign by striking his head against it. The evidence also shows that he came in contact with the sign, or a policeman's club, or the sidewalk, causing the injury for which he seeks to recover. This sign was placed in the position above described on or about the 16th day of September, 1911, and was in that position at the time the

BIG BOXING EVENT GOES ON TONIGHT

All Arrangements Completed for Exhibition at Forest Park.

Gillis claims the title, having won it from Kid Hermit. He has so far been successful in defending it. Tuttle is anxious to have the title and is going to box tonight for it. He is a fast lad, said to be easily a match for Gillis and one of the most promising lightweights seen in this part of the country.

Promoter Mickey Morton has made all arrangements for the boxing card tonight and his house should be packed to the walls for he has four fast men matched and promises one of the best programs. Special arrangements have been made for the seating of fans and the crowd will be handled without trouble. Special car service will also be given to and from the grounds. The preliminary go will open sharply at 8:30 and the two events will be put on as fast as possible and without unnecessary delay.

OUTLAW LEAGUE BEING PLANNED

Western League Managers Are Behind Scheme to Form New Circuit.

Chicago, Nov. 21.—Rumors that certain clubs in the American association and Western league are planning to become "baseball outlaws" and form a new league are confirmed here.

President "Tip" O'Neill of the Western league admitted that discussion of the proposed league had been going on for weeks and that the matter took concrete form at a meeting of the league held in Milwaukee last week. Certain club owners in the Western league assert their cities properly belong to a circuit with Milwaukee, Kansas City and Minneapolis. It also was contended that President O'Neill was too close to major league influence and the directors, therefore, ordered the removal of the league's headquarters from Chicago.

The invasion of Chicago and the establishment of rival clubs in American association cities are said to be included in the plans of the proposed league. The American association is supposed to have an option on a favorable piece of ground on Chicago's "North Side" and for several years has threatened to place a club in Chicago.

Plans of the proposed league, it is said, are to establish clubs in Chicago, Minneapolis, Indianapolis, Milwaukee, Kansas City, Omaha, St. Joseph and an eighth city yet to be selected.

"Nothing officially has been said to me regarding the proposed league," said President O'Neill. "But the proposition, however, has reached me from other sources. I know there has been trouble for several weeks."

"I want it to be understood that I am in no way connected with the project. I am opposed to 'outlaw' leagues."

McCarron Outfights Gibbons.
Philadelphia, Nov. 21.—Jack McCarron, of Allentown, Pa., outfought Mike Gibbons of St. Paul in a six-round bout last night at the National Athletic club.

Gibbons showed more science, but appeared over cautious while McCarron, by forcing the fighting through the bout, earned the popular decision. He missed many swings but occasionally landed hard.


