

SPECIAL STAMPS FOR THE PARCELS POST REQUIRED

Partial Instructions From the Department Received by Boise Postmaster—Zone Rates Given.

Special stamps will be necessary for the packages that are sent under the new parcels post law effective Jan. 1.

The territory has been divided into zones and the rates of postage have been fixed accordingly.

After the business of the department increases, it may be possible for the city carriers to deliver most of the parcels that are sent through the mail but for a time, at least, they will be handed out at the general delivery window.

The zones and rates that have been fixed are as follows:

First zone includes an area within a radius of 50 miles of the sending office. Rates, 5 cents for the first pound, 3 cents per additional pound.

Second zone includes a radius of 150 miles from sending office. Rate, 6 cents per first pound, 4 cents per additional pound.

Third zone includes a radius of 300 miles from sending office. Rate, 7 cents for first pound, 5 cents per additional pound.

Fourth zone includes a radius of 600 miles from sending office. Rate, 8 cents for first pound, 6 cents for each additional pound.

Fifth zone includes a radius of 1000 miles from sending office. Rate, 9 cents for first pound, 7 cents for each additional pound.

Sixth zone includes a radius of 1400 miles from sending office. Rate, 10 cents for first pound, 8 cents for each additional pound.

Seventh zone includes all districts further than those before enumerated. Rate, 12 cents per pound straight.

PIN ROAD MAKING BIG IMPROVEMENT

Round House Built at New Meadows and Repair Shop Equipped.

(Staff Correspondence) New Meadows, Nov. 22.—The P. & I. N. railroad is completing at New Meadows the first four-stall unit of a 12-stall round house, the plans of which provide for three units of four stalls each, with heavy fire walls between each unit. The additional units can be added as needed, and they will conform absolutely to the track arrangements, turn table facilities, etc., now being provided.

The building here in present use for a round house was constructed for use as a car and engine repair shop. This shop will be equipped with the power machinery including drills, lathes, planers, wheel presses, punches, cutting and boring machines, wood working machinery, etc. When all of this expensive machinery, which will be operated by electric power, is installed, the P. & I. N. can do its own repair work on cars of all classes and locomotives, this being increasingly necessary and desirable as the road adds to its rolling stock as its business grows.

Thrashing Results. W. L. Freese, the well known owner of one of the thrashing machine outfits operating in the Meadows valley, has thrashed the following quantities of grain and seed this season: 11,040 bushels of oats, 4223 bushels of barley, 2416 bushels of wheat, 18 bushels of rye, 76 bushels of clover seed, 3689 bushels of timothy seed.

Mr. Freese states that grain sown in Meadows valley in the fall of the year does better than spring sown grain.
