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DEMOCRATS IN A WILD SCRAMBLE FOR THE PLUMS

Federal Patronage in Idaho Is Causing Lively Fight Between Factions—Candidates Numerous.

Federal plums are ripening for Democrats in Idaho who are fortunate enough to be basking in the good graces of President-elect Woodrow Wilson and his close lieutenants, for aside from the presidential postmasters to be appointed in this state, there are a number of high-salaried jobs within the federal jurisdiction that look mighty good to leaders of both factions of the party, the Hawley-Perky and Nugent-Pence as well as their respective followers. There will be a "silent passing" of familiar Republican faces in the federal building in this city when the new regime comes into its own. Federal officers who have held positions for years will be forced to bid farewell to their posts and their salaries. Judge Frank S. Dietrich and the clerk of the court, may be the only ones left for under the federal law a district court judgeship is virtually good for life and for service covering a period specified may retire on full pay.

Conflict for District Attorney. For many years the office of United States district attorney in Idaho has been a bone of contention around which factional differences even in the Republican party have waged bitterly. The term of District Attorney C. H. Lingenfelter expires Dec. 15, but he will probably hold over until such a time as his successor is appointed and ratified by the senate.

Frank Moore of Moscow, a Wilson presidential elector in this state, is very strongly spoken of as the leading possibility for the appointment of district attorney. He is classed with the Hawley-Perky wing of the party. The Nugent-Pence faction will, it is claimed by party leaders here, bring John F. Nugent out as an aspirant and if a harmony program is followed within the party Mr. Nugent may become a formidable candidate to be dealt with, it is claimed.

Say Gray Has Cinch. Democratic State Chairman Ben R. Gray, now state fish and game warden of this state, is claimed to be in line for the appointment of United States marshal to succeed Shad Hodgins, present incumbent. The state chairman is the choice of the Hawley-Perky wing of the party, it is said and stands well with the powers-that-be. It is claimed that he can easily transfer to the federal building with several of his chief deputies representa-

ONLY CHANCE TO REUNITE PARTY IS IN LEGISLATURE

Bartlett Sinclair Declares Way to Harmony Can Be Paved by Enactment of Progressive Legislation.

Bartlett Sinclair of Kootenai county, former state auditor, and always a devoted adherent of the Republican party, declares that if the Republicans and Progressives are ever to get together again in this state, it will be up to the Twelfth legislature to pave the way by showing fruits sufficient to guaranty to the Progressives that the reunited party intends to stand for the progressive principles that members of the Progressive party stand for and that he believes a majority of the Republican party stand for. This, Mr. Sinclair declares, the legislature can accomplish by electing an out and out progressive—one who has always stood squarely for progressive principles and not one who has merely stood two-faced declaiming that he is both a progressive and a reactionary at the same time—to send with Senator Borah to the United States senate as successor to Senator Heyburn. Mr. Sinclair's ideas upon the future union of the two parties is expressed in the following statement:

"I know no reason in our national or state politics why what is left of the Republican party and the Progressive party should not try to harmonize. There has been no calm meditative attempt so far by leaders at this important business. There are certain great political principles or policies common to both these parties or factions. Those principles and theories have to do with the very foundation of our institutions and government. The recent campaign in Idaho, and elsewhere, as it affects these two parties or factions or political classifications developed no irreconcilable differences. Outside of Idaho from beginning to end the real issues were clouded by an unprecedented casting of personal epithets.

"The Progressives were justified in the removal of the state to the marshal's office without trouble installing the deputies as assistants. John Ellis, chief of police of Pocatello and a two-term sheriff of Bannock county, is being groomed for the marshalship by his friends.

Postmaster Inviting. That there will be a fight over the postmastership here goes without saying, party leaders declare. Boise has the largest and highest-salaried post office in the state. The plum is one that many Democrats have a longing eye on. The friends of P. M. Davis, one of the leading Democrats of this state, are inclined to the belief that he stands about as good a show of being appointed to this office as any other man in the party, and, if anything, is the strongest man so far mentioned. That there will be many aspirants in the running for the postmastership is now conceded.

The United States land office not only here but in other parts of the state offer promising berths for federal appointments and will be filled by Democrats. C. E. Harris of Montpelier is mentioned as a prospective receiver of the Blackfoot office. The surveyor general's office is another position of honor and high salary, while there are numerous assistants in all offices and federal departments in the state, including United States assayer.

May Promote Governor. Idaho may be able to rise even above federal appointments in the state, for it is claimed by party leaders that the prospective trip of Governor Hawley to Washington may result in interesting developments in that it may bring the chief executive of the state into the limelight as timber for a cabinet position. His name has been frequently connected with the post of attorney general of the United States, and his friends believe that even if he should not be the chosen one for that office he may be given the appointment of secretary of the interior. It is pointed out that the governor is recognized as a prominent lawyer and a man familiar with the administration of land matters. They say he would be qualified for either position and that while in Washington he may be strongly advocated by leading Democrats as a possibility worthy of the most serious consideration on the part of the president-elect and his close counselors.

taking the steps they did. There was no other way of forever discarding certain antiquated and fossilized theories of government which the Republican party insisted upon asserting. Those theories are now dead and buried. They can no more be resurrected than the doctrine of secession of the states. The national and state election relegated most of the leaders of those harmful and illogical contentions out of sight forever. Taft, Cannon, Mann and others of the old school are likewise gone. They were repudiated because they stood for false and unprogressive ideas of government.

"Republicans of Idaho recognize this state of affairs. Progressives know it by heart. It seems to me when these two bodies, by their representatives, get together to talk the battle over and come to terms, there will be found a way of a more perfect union than ever before. The thing most to fear is the radicalism of the leaders. "When Governor-elect Haines advocates a continuation of the fight, I think he falls into a deep error. He is a man of excellent sense and I must believe his Portland declaration of war was hasty. As governor of Idaho he would find his strongest supporters amongst the Progressives, if he recants his belligerent attitude. It can make very little difference to a Progressive whether ultimately his political beliefs are put into execution by an organization known as Progressives or Republicans or Progressive-Republicans. This is a point of no great importance. My contention is there should be a serious, statesmanlike attempt to end the controversy on a basis of principle mutually acceptable. Unless it is done one thing, I believe, is certain, and that is the Republican party will gradually go out of existence. This seems to me to be a cruel and unnecessary ending of one of the greatest political parties known to history. Within the 50 years of its existence it has done more good for mankind and for the cause of human government and civilized society than all our other parties combined. That record is worth something. My contention is, with more or less pruning and augmentation here and there, the Progressives and Republicans will find they are not apart on the great, live, accepted doctrines and principles of wise politics as they bear upon the national and state governments and economic theories of organized society. At any rate, it seems to me the situation is one demanding an olive branch rather than a sword at this time.

"When the legislature meets in January, after 10 days' deliberation, it will be in order to choose two United States senators, a successor to the late W. B. Heyburn, and a successor to W. E. Borah. There seems to be no doubt about Senator Borah's re-election. He will be re-elected as a Republican, in name at least. He will be credited to that party, no matter to what extent he may believe it is out of date. In the recent election all candidates for the legislature on record for Senator Borah's re-election had the smallest opposition. That was insisted upon by the voters. Progressive candidates known by their political principle to be for Senator Borah's re-election, unless they were publicly pledged, went down before Republicans who had antagonized Senator Borah for years and did so antagonize him till bound by written obligation to cease further opposition and promise, if elected, to vote for Senator Borah's re-election with tremendous majorities. So it is, by regular Republicans and as a member of that party whose nominee he was, will Senator Borah be again sent to Washington for at least six more years to continue the magnificent work already to his and our state's credit.

"Here, then, is an opportunity to make a manifestation of that desire to re-unite the parties which I believe patriotism and the welfare of the government demand. That opportunity is involved in the election of the other senator. The northern part of the state should here be recognized. The south having one senator, a member of the Republican party, the north may reasonably claim the other. And if the spirit of reconciliation and sagacious political adjustment prevails with members of the legislature and the membership generally of the two parties the northernmost member should be a recognized Progressive. Not of the kind who rode two horses or fought Progressive nominees under orders from superiors.

"It seems to me by a legislative act of such momentous significance there would be opened the way for harmonizing on the broad basis of those principles common to both Republicans and Progressives. It is a serious condition for members of the legislature to ponder. It seems to me here is a chance to effect a union of two great political forces, now separated and antagonistic, that as one body has served the end of patriotism and justice during that period of our country's growth which arouses the world's admiration and applause.

"Instead, therefore, of the belligerency of Governor-elect Haines, I suggest this more pacific course."

Veteran Public Official Retires. Washington, No. 25.—After 45 years spent in the public service, during which time he has filled important legislative, diplomatic and executive positions, Thomas Ryan today retired from the post of advisory counsel and special assistant to the secretary of the interior in connection with the affairs of the Five Civilized Tribes. Mr. Ryan was born in Oxford, N. Y., 75 years ago today. He served with the

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Pennsylvania regiment in the civil war and after the war located in Topeka, Kan., which has ever since been his legal residence. He served 14 years as a representative in congress, four years as United States minister to Mexico and 11 years as assistant secretary of the interior.
