ENGLISH FIGHTER MAY BE MATCHED

Probable That Jimmie Belshaw Will Meet Jack Carpenter in Boise.

Mickey Morton, the well known local promoter, may serve fans here a rare treat in the near future for he received a proposition yesterday to match Jimmie Belshaw, the well known English welterweight now in this country, with Jack Carpenter, who drew with Montana Kid in his last fight here.

Should Promoter Morton be successful in his plans Boise fans will be lucky, for they will see the first tryout of the English ring artist in the United States, for he has not as yet put on a bout in this country. Belshaw arrived in the United States three months ago and as Morton understands, he is on his way to the Pacific coast. It is the local promoter's plan to induce the Englishman to stop off in Boise while enroute.

Has Fine Record.

Belshaw comes to this country with a fine reputation. He has had 28 fights and won 23 of them via the knockout route in less than 10 rounds and five have been draws. He is now matched to box Wells at Cincinnati Jan. 15. Frank Armstrong, the well known referee, stated while in Boise last week that the Salt Lake fans are trying to get the Englishman to show in that city. If fans here are successful the match will be a great drawing card.

PROGRESSIVES OF IDAHO TO ATTEND BIG CONFERENCE

State Chairman Gipson Names Delegates to Represent This State at Chicago Meeting Next Month.

State Chairman James H. Gipson of the Progressive state central committee, has received a request from Joseph M. Dixon, national chairman of that party, to appoint five members of the Progressive party in this state to attend the national assembly of Progressives which has been called to meet at the La Salle hotel, Chicago, Dec. 10 and 11.

The national committeemen and the candidates for governor of the Progressive party, newspaper editors and publishers who supported the Progressive party had already been invited. The idea has evidently taken so well and the assembly has developed such enthusiasm that it has been decided to add to the numbers that are expected to be present.

State Chairman Gipson, who was in the city today, announced the appointment of the following to attend the meeting: R. S. Sheridan, Boise; Victor O. Johnson, Shoshone; E. A. Burrell, Montpelier; Paul Clagstone, Clagstone; Captain John E. Yates, Boise, and he will appoint one other from Lewiston to be recommended by the Progressives of that place.

Colonel Roosevelt has not given any intimation as to whether he will be there or not, but it is expected that many men of national prominence will be in attendance, including Governor Johnson of California, Governor McGovern of Wisconsin, Senator Clapp of Minnesota, Senator Dixon, Senator Poindexter, Victor Murdock of Kansas, and numerous others.
