

BIG HIGH SCHOOL GAME OF SEASON ON AT CODY PARK

Boise and Twin Falls High Schools Struggle for Supremacy on the Gridiron Today.

The big Thanksgiving day game is on this afternoon on Cody field between the Twin Falls and the Boise high school championship teams and it had every indication prior to the calling of the game of being one of the best in the history of the city. Both teams entered confident of success. The game was in progress at the time of going to press, having been called at 3 o'clock.

Upon the outcome of the battle depends the championship of southern Idaho, which is virtually the state championship. Boise is defending more titles than Twin Falls. Coach Worthwain's underclassmen are champions of the southwestern interscholastic league and will be champions of the intermountain country, having defeated the championship team of the Salt Lake high school, if they win today.

Twin Falls is in the same class, not having been defeated. The muleskin wearers from the magic city have met and defeated every high school team in southeastern Idaho and won the championship of the southeastern interscholastic league. This entitled Twin Falls to meet Boise to decide the championship of the southern part of the state.

Both teams are unusually well advanced along lines of modern football, having been fortunate in the coaches selected. They play practically the same style of game featured with the forward pass and formation massed on the tackles and ends. Both also have enormous trick plays to call upon when in need of them.

The game is looked upon as the big football event of the intermountain country.

UNION PLANNING AN EIGHT-CLUB CIRCUIT

The many rumors circulated since the close of the 1912 baseball season that the Union association would not be in the field at the start of the next season have received little credence from baseball fans and there is no room for doubt that the organization, bigger and more active than ever, will be ready for the umpire's call of play ball when the balmy days of spring-time arrive, says the Salt Lake Tribune. The league's decision not to elect a president until there are duties for him to perform gave the impression that the affairs of the circuit were in a doubtful condition, but according to those on the "inside" a perfect understanding exists among the franchise owners and definite plans for next year have been agreed upon.

The circuit next year as stated in these columns on several occasions will be composed of eight clubs. The six clubs which made up the Union association last season together with Boise and one other Idaho town will begin the 1913 season. The following special from Pocatello indicates that the Gate city is already in line for membership. "Pocatello, according to advices from John J. McCloskey, manager of the Ogden baseball team, will be one of the eight cities in this section of the north-west in the Union Baseball association next year. Pocatello is necessary to the success of the organization if Boise, Butte and other widely separated towns are in the league. Railroad distances would be too great without Pocatello as a league city. The fans here are very enthusiastic over the prospects."

TROOPERS GIVE GOOD EXHIBITION

Athletic Program and Smoker of L Troop at the Boise Barracks.

Troop L, Boise barracks, entertained the other troops stationed at the post last night with a fine athletic program and smoker given in the gymnasium and capped the climax with the service of an excellent buffet luncheon. Wrestling, boxing and gymnasium apparatus work featured the evening's program. Probably no other event of its kind at the barracks' ground has met with greater success.

Jack Carpenter, the well known wrestler and Three Round Gills, staged two classy rounds of sparring for the entertainment of the troopers and they traveled a fast pace while in the ring. Both were willing and ready to mix things, and they did.

The program opened with a wrestling bout, catch-as-catch-can, with Jack Fair of K troop, and William Burns of L troop. Burns had the best of the grapple and during its execution Fair injured his ankle and had to leave the mat.

A boxing event for three rounds followed, between Phuison of troop L, and Fisher of troop K. It kept the fans excited and honors were even, the go being called a draw. The Carpenter-Gills go followed.

For four rounds Curl of troop I, and Ehmske of troop L, played a tattoo on each other in the most exciting event of the night. What they did not land in the way of swings and jabs would not be worth recording. At the end of each of the four rounds the honors were even. Gregor of troop I, and Patrick of troop M, went for three rounds to a draw. White of troop K, and Jewell of troop L, were the principals in the final boxing event and both traveled a fast pace. Green and Garrett gave a fine gymnastic exhibition on the horizontal bar, and music was furnished during the intervals between the athletic numbers.

They can see the Battler swinging, Montana side-stepping but not getting far enough away and the right of the Dane's slamming on his jaw.

Flushed with victory the Battler has issued a challenge to Jack Carpenter of this city to meet him and Carpenter will have to come pretty near accepting in order to defend himself.

Darby O'Brien, well known to Boise fans, was the third man in the ring when the main go was staged last night at Twin Falls. As far as it went the battle was a clean and classy one. Two Burley lads, the Hoag brothers, put on the preliminary bout, which was fast and clever.

IN THE PENITENTIARY TWO DAYS AFTER HE COMMITTED CRIME

Arriving in Idaho from Oregon last Sunday, arrested on the same day on the charge of burglary, arraigned and plead guilty on Monday, receiving a sentence of from 2 to 15 years, and delivered to the penitentiary officials who assigned him to his cell and properly registered him with a number on Tuesday, Thomas H. Wilson, now a ward in Idaho's penal institution, has come to the conclusion that they "do things" in the Gem state. There are few other records showing such a quick administration of the law in the history of the state.

Whether or not Wilson thought it was easy to pull of a "job" in an Idaho town without falling into the clutches of the law is not known but that he attempted one and was caught is a fact. He tackled the "job" in Canyon county and was arrested with the goods on him. That was Sunday. He was taken to Payette on Monday and there before the court entered a plea of guilty. He was immediately delivered over to the penitentiary officials under an indeterminate sentence on Tuesday and is now an inmate of the institution.

Speaking of the case Warden Snook said it was one of the most rapid ones in point of the administration of justice that has been called to his attention for a long time.
