

CHARGES FILED AGAINST SHERIFF BY AN ATTORNEY

C. H. Edwards Alleges Prejudice on Part of Sheriff Roberts and Takes Complaint to Court.

Charges of prejudice were filed against James M. Roberts, sheriff of Ada county, by C. H. Edwards, attorney of Tommy Getzney and F. G. Edwards, in the district court this morning.

The lawyer claims that the sheriff has violated the oath of office that he took when he assumed the responsibilities of the position. He charges him with prejudicing the interests of the defendants. He claims that he has illegally restrained the defendants by refusing to allow them to talk with their attorney together.

The charges were made in an affidavit filed and statements made to the court this morning. Mr. Edwards asks the court, Judge Carl A. Davis, to issue an order instructing the sheriff to grant him the right to consult the defendants together.

Mr. Edwards told the court that he did not want favors, he simply demanded that the sheriff allow him, for the interests of his clients, the right to interview them together.

In his answer, Raymond L. Givens, county attorney, held that the sheriff has the right to make rules and regulations of that sort regarding the handling of prisoners while they are in jail. He will submit authorities to the court on the subject and the matter will be taken under advisement until that time.

FRIENDS OF GOV. HAWLEY ACTIVE IN HIS BEHALF

Idaho Executive Is Being Urged to Become Active Candidate for Secretary of the Interior.

Every effort is being made to push Governor James H. Hawley to the front as a candidate for the appointment of secretary of the interior. Letters have been and are being received at the governor's office urging the chief executive to consider the matter seriously and pledging him support.

Senator Perky, due to his close friendship with the men who will assist in picking the next cabinet, especially William Jennings Bryan, will have a great deal of influence with the powers-that-be.

The American Mining congress went on record in support of a western man for the appointment, and this fact, the Hawley people claim, is a boost for Governor Hawley.

Whereas, The natural resources of the United States are in large measure found in the western or what are commonly termed the public land states, and

Whereas, The greater portion of the business of the department of the interior of the federal government has to do with matters of peculiar moment to the states of the west; and

Resolved, By the American Mining congress, in annual session assembled in the city of Spokane, state of Washington, that the administration of the affairs of the department of the interior should be in the hands of a man who comes out of the west and who by reason of his intimate knowledge of the matters affecting this great section is able to make his administration of the greatest value to the people of the whole country.

Resolved, Further, that it is the sense of this congress that the president-elect, Woodrow Wilson, should select a western man as secretary of the interior and he is hereby respectfully requested to make such selection in forming his cabinet for the coming four years.

Resolved, Further, that the secretary of this congress directed to transmit a copy of these resolutions to Woodrow Wilson.

THREAT IS HELD

COLONEL HAMER SENDS LETTER TO MEMBERS-ELECT

That Thomas R. Hamer of St. Anthony is a candidate for the short term senatorship is now beyond a question of doubt, for authentic information has been received in Boise that he has sent letters to practically all the north Idaho members-elect of the legislature announcing his candidacy and soliciting their support.

Every effort is being made in the northern part of the state to sidetrack all south Idaho senatorial aspirants in an effort to combine all members-elect to a north Idaho man.

An interview given by Justice Allshie in Spokane gives color to this report. He said: "The geographic conditions of Idaho are such as to render the northern end of the state most deeply concerned in national legislation and departmental matters, which only incidentally affect the southern end of the state, merely by reason of being a part of the same state; and the reverse is true with reference to that great, arid southern end of the state."

"For these and many other sound reasons, one of our senators should be elected from the north, and I know that many thinking people in southern Idaho share in this belief. The south is already most ably represented by Senator Borah, whose re-election is now only a matter of form, and who has become, not only an Idaho senator, but a national statesman as well."

"I trust that a northern man may be selected for the short term, who knows the conditions in this end of the state, who has the industry, courage and ability to battle for Idaho and fairly represent all her people. I feel that by 25 years' acquaintance with Idaho and her citizens and needs would in a measure enable me to represent the people of the whole state. I am not, however, vain enough to think that I am the only citizen of this great northern country qualified to represent Idaho in the United States senate."

ber \$6,000. King Nicholas will move his headquarters to Bruda, and will begin vigorous operations against the beleaguered fortress. Practically the entire army has been concentrated in an attempt to force the Turks to surrender. The latter have made several attempts at sorties, but all have been repulsed.

A Turkish deserter from Scutari says the distress among the besieged army is terrible. Russian Diplomacy to Win. St. Petersburg, Nov. 30.—The chances for a peaceful settlement of the Balkan crisis are increasing daily.

Russian diplomacy, supported by that of France and Great Britain, expects to tide over the Austria-Serbian conflict regarding the Adriatic and drive a bargain with Austria and Italy based on recognition of Albanian autonomy in return for Austria giving Serbia access to the sea.

According to views of Russian diplomats, a permanent settlement of the Balkan crisis is desirable to all the European powers. They are of the belief that there is no reason to make the Serbian position economically untenable. Whether a settlement of the controversy is achieved through a conference or otherwise is of secondary importance.

The main object is peace, but not peace at any price. The most important thing for diplomacy at present is to hasten a conclusion of the negotiations between Turkey and Bulgaria.

It is said to be not impossible that Russia may exert her good offices for peace, either in the form of advice or pressure. It must be remembered that Turkey's left flank is entirely exposed to the Caucasus, where Russia has concentrated large forces. Russia, however, does not desire to take any action that might compromise her relations with Turkey in the future. Russia, it is understood, does not want any Turkish territory, but desires only the freedom of the Dardanelles for her Black sea trade, which represents three-fourths of her grain exports.
