

STATE OFFICERS NOW AT HOME IN THE NEW CAPITOL

Governor, State Auditor, State Treasurer, Insurance Commissioner and Secretary of State Moved.

State Auditor Stephen D. Taylor, State Treasurer O. V. Allen, State Insurance Commissioner Isaac C. Hattabaugh, Secretary of State W. L. Gifford and Governor James H. Hawley and their respective departments, deputies and clerical forces are now comfortably installed in the new state capitol building, having moved from the old structure.

The apartments of State Auditor Taylor are located in the west side of the ground floor of the new building and occupy a suite of three large rooms, including the general public reception room, opening off of which is a large, spacious room for the clerks and the private office of the auditor.

The state treasurer's department is on the opposite side of the building on the same floor and occupies the south half of the east side. The entrance is from the lobby, opening off the rotunda. The department consists of a general room for the public, opening from which is a wicker gate to the counting room, off which is the vault to the north opens the private office of the state treasurer.

The state insurance commissioner Hattabaugh has the opposite suite, arranged almost in the same manner. Entrance to this grade floor is from the walk leading to the lobby under the main steps of the capitol or from the grand staircase from the executive floor above, entrance to which is gained from the main steps of the building.

The secretary of state has his department on the executive floor above that of the state treasurer. The rooms are arranged the same with the exception that the secretary of state uses the closed hallway for the general reception room for public use. The governor's apartments are found across the rotunda, on the same floor, over the state auditor's department. All of the apartments are furnished and finished in mahogany and marble.

The supreme court room and chambers will soon be completed so that the court can move probably next week. The attorney general will vacate the old building at the same time.

The state land office is now in the old building in rooms formerly occu-

pleaded by the governor and treasurer; the state land commissioner is in the apartments formerly occupied by the secretary of state, having moved from the annex.

NEW BRIDGE OVER THE CLEARWATER RIVER

Lewiston, Dec. 2.—F. W. Straw, manager of the Security Bridge company, Saturday broke ground on the construction of the steel bridge that will span the Clearwater river at Eighteenth street.

The work done comprised the clearing of ground for material sheds and the erection of a temporary office at the foot of Eighteenth street. Material will begin arriving this week and a shed has been constructed for the accommodation of the cement and reinforcement materials.

Wright has set the stakes for the abutments but the initial work will be on the main channel piers.

These are eight piers independent of the abutments to be installed and five of the piers are located in the main channel.

FREMONT COUNTY SENDS CARLOAD TO CHILDREN'S HOME

Saturday was Thanksgiving day for the second time last week at the children's home. It was the day when the finest lot of eatables ever shipped over the Oregon Short Line arrived in Boise and the contents were unloaded and taken to the institution.

Accompanying the gifts made by the children, were many touching little notes, all of which are to be answered, but could the givers have seen the big eyes and wondering faces of the children at the home yesterday, when loaded car of produce came from Fremont county, and while it was largely the gift of the children of the public schools, the credit for the shipment is due to the efforts of Miss Harriet Wood, county superintendent of Fremont county and the Commercial club of St. Anthony.

The car contained 192 sacks of potatoes, 3000 pounds of flour, 1000 pounds of sugar, 75 dressed chickens, a large quantity of fresh and salted meats, canned fruits and vegetables and everything imaginable for a large family and everything received was of the best. The car for the shipment was donated by Mrs. Harriman and it was sent by special dispatch, a fast freight having been held for two hours in order that the car might be attached as soon as to get in Boise in time to be unloaded before Sunday.

Another car of produce for the home arrived Saturday night from Canyon county and was unloaded yesterday. This car is known to contain 70 boxes of fine apples, several hundred cans of fruit and various other products. Smaller donations have also been received here, thus making the Thanksgiving this year by far the best ever enjoyed by the home.

GRAND JURY NOW HAS AMPLE POWER

Judge Davis Makes No Recommendation for Changes in His Report.

While the grand jury of this county is without authority under the state law to enforce any recommendations that it makes, Judge Carl A. Davis, district judge, believes that the statutes give it ample powers to correct such evils as may exist in the administration of any of the public buildings or the management of any of the county affairs.

Judge Davis did not include in his report to the supreme court of the state, any recommendations for changes in the laws that would give a grand jury more powers than it already has. He thinks that the management of the poor farm, for instance, is vested by law in certain county officers and any changes from the plans and policies of those officers would be changes of judgment alone. The law could hardly hold the officers responsible for the administration of those affairs in a business-like way if their judgment was to be predicated upon the judgment of a body of grand jurors who had been in office but a few days, it is said.

The grand jury does have the power to indict or to remove by impeachment proceedings, any of the county officers whom it thinks have so far failed to attend to the duties of their office as to make such a step necessary. If it thinks that such conditions should be remedied and makes recommendations that would correct those conditions and the officers fail to obey or respect the suggestions, the grand jury may then indict or impeach those officers and they can be given a trial in the district court on their general conduct while in office.

Judge Davis thinks that the powers of the statutes given to the grand jury in this way are ample and he does not feel that a change in the law would be necessary. The law gives the grand jury the right to inspect

all public buildings and property, but it does not require it to do so. The last session was considerably agitated over the discovery that it could not enforce its recommendations about the poor farm, but those suggestions have been in the main, adopted by the board of county commissioners.

Certificate of Election Issued.

Topeka, Kan., Dec. 2.—The Kansas board of canvassers this afternoon issued to George H. Hodges, Democrat, a certificate of election as governor. The action follows the refusal of the state supreme court to grant Arthur Capper, Republican candidate a re-hearing in the Wabunsee county contest.
