OLIVE BRANCH IS OFFERED BOISE BY UNION LEAGUE

Emissary Comes From Salt Lake to Ask This City to Cast Fortunes With Organization.

Will Boise become a member of the Union association or remain with the Tri-State league in which it held a membership last season?

This issue has been brought squarely before the officers of the Boise Baseball club and the president of the Western Tri-State league as well as local fans through the visit here yesterday of R. L. Hughes, special representative of Dick Cooley, owner of the Salt Lake club in the Union association.

Mr. Hughes held a conference with President Bossner of the Boise Baseball club and President William Sweet of the Tri-State league when he laid before the Boise magnates the proposal from Dick Cooley that Boise seriously consider the offer of the Union association to become a member of that league.

That the Union association now realizes the folly of cutting Boise out of that league a year ago is evident from the visit of Mr. Hughes to this city. Boise was cut off then without consideration. But the fans of this city were willing to be cut off rather than stand for the deal that the Union association put across and with the assistance of organizers the Western Tri-State league was perfected.

This new league gave Boise good class D ball, as good as that of the Union association. Contrary to expectations, the Tri-State league "made good" and is in a position to open the 1913 season, placing Boise in the independent column so far as baseball next year is concerned.

The Union association magnates realize, however, now that Boise should be offered any and every possible inducement to join with it for 1913.

Straw Vote Taken Indorses Pocatello Man, With G. A. Coates Second.

First choice—Robert Pyper Pocatello. Second choice—George A. Coates, Bannock. Third choice—Frank Millsaps, Shoshone. Fourth choice—Charles D. Sumner.

The above is the result of the straw vote taken by the Idaho State Sportsmen's association to show the choice of the majority of its members for the appointment of one of its members to the position of state fish and game warden.

The association's four preferences have been placed before Governor-elect John M. Haines for his consideration. Neither choice is binding, however, on the governor, and he is not under obligations to select the man endorsed by the association.

The governor-elect was informed that the sportsmen's association desired to take a straw vote on the candidates mentioned for the appointment and to present the names of the respective choices to him.

W. C. Tatro, an officer of the association, took the matter up with the governor, informing him of the desire of the association. The governor-elect stated that he would give the applicants who secured choice by the association consideration with other applicants and the matter was left in that way without a promise being made by the governor-elect to tie to any candidates.

The morning paper gave out the impression through published reports that the choice of the association was binding on the governor and for that reason an erroneous impression has prevailed.

WASHINGTON HIGH WILL NOT ACCEPT No Post Season Game Will Be Played by the Boise High School.

There will be no post season game in this city between the Washington high school and Boise, simply for the reason Portland will not come here. Coach Worthwhile of the Boise high is in receipt of a telegram from the Washington high school management in reply to his challenge to meet the Portlanders here in a post season game.

The Washington high school game was suggested because of the fact the Portland school won the championship in that city and Boise, having won three championships during the season, was willing to play Portland for the Oregon-Idaho-Utah championship. A challenge was issued to the Oregon school and will not be accepted according to the telegram.

The only prospect Boise has for a post season game is with the fast Chicago high school which makes an annual trip into the west meeting the championship teams of Butte, Spokane, Seattle, Portland and other cities. Portland also expects to play the same team. If it is possible to induce the Chicago aggregation to include Boise in its itinerary a game may be played here, but this is not likely.

IDAHO GIVEN BUT ONE MAN ON TEAM

Guard Kinnison Placed on the All-Northwestern by Football Experts.

The University of Idaho is given but one man on the All-northwestern conference team picked by the football experts, in Kinnison, a guard. The University of Washington is given three men, the University of Oregon two, the Oregon Agricultural college two, and Whitman two. The all-star team as selected is as follows:

Sutton, Washington (165).....End Tyrer, Washington State (160)....End Patton, Washington (185).....Tackle Bailey, Oregon (227).....Tackle Fenton, Oregon (188).....Guard Kinnison, Idaho (180).....Guard Christian, Oregon Aggies (186).....Center Young, Washington (160).....Quarter Blomquist, Whitman (170).....Half Blackwell, Oregon Aggies (188)....Half Niles, Whitman (182).....Fullback Washington's superiority over the other five conference schools was plainly evidenced, not only by its consecutive victories, but by the scores piled up.
