

WHITE SLAVERY CHARGE IS FILED AGAINST CARROL

Man First Arrested for Bigamy Must Answer Another Charge in United States Court.

Complaint has been filed before T. F. Halveston, United States commissioner, charging J. Carrol with white slavery. The paper was signed by P. E. Cavanaugh, assistant United States district attorney, and the case may come to trial at the next session of the federal court. The matter has not yet been set, however, and cannot be until the court returns from the session at Coeur d'Alene.

Carrol is charged by the complaint with transferring a woman from one state to another for immoral purposes. It is said that her own testimony in the justice court was to the effect that he bought her ticket from Salt Lake to Nampa and that he had never married her. The case will involve the common law marriage theory and will come before the court officials later this month. The federal court will meet at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning for the adjourned session of the September term. Judge Dietrich, Marshal Hodgkin, C. H. Lingenfelter, the district attorney, and A. L. Richardson, the clerk, will be back from Coeur d'Alene tonight.

Several cases are scheduled to come to trial during this term, among them that of Oliver Bates charged with white slavery.

engineer in charge of the government irrigation investigations in this state. This contrivance has a sliding board that accurately divides the amount of water to be distributed from the canal and enables two or three farmers to use the same weir in the same ditch with a certainty of getting the proper share of water into their own canals. The slots on the device are arranged in such a way that the current can be divided into thirds and each farmer using the weir can be sure of the amount of water that he is receiving.

A small model of the device is being sent out from the office here to some of the irrigation projects of the state. The engineer believes that it will solve many of the troubles that arise between neighbors over the water and that it will prevent a large number of the disputes that sometimes find their way into the courts.

TO PURGE IDAHO OF UNJUST LAWS

Colorado Man Writes Letter to Governor Hawley Urging Legislative Action.

For the sake of respect for law, Idaho should purge itself of unjust laws and itself exercise its sovereign power of eminent domain and it is up to the next legislature to take action, according to the mandate received by Governor Hawley from Moses Franklin of Pueblo, Colo. In a communication to the governor he writes as follows: Pueblo, Colo., Nov. 30, 1912. Your Excellency, Governor of Idaho, Boise, Idaho.

Dear Sir: I want to call your attention to the fact that your state is wrongfully delegating its sovereign power of eminent domain to individuals thereby violating the constitution of the United States and the fundamental principles of government as declared by the supreme courts of states and of the United States.

Under the decision of the supreme court regarding the use of the sovereign powers of state, the state can permit individuals to use land for beneficial purposes, but it cannot delegate its sovereign power to individuals to control other individuals in the use of land, either to exclude them from using it, or dictating terms by which others may use it. Such power belongs to the state only, can only be exercised by the state and cannot be delegated.

Such grant of power is used by individuals to levy a tax, which the state alone has the power to levy, on other individuals who want to use land, and gives him authority to commit robbery by exacting rent (a tax which the individual has no right to levy, and less right to collect for his individual benefit); by exacting profit, through increased value which such power of control gives to the owner of land, and increased prices of products due to unnatural increase in price of land.

It is of the utmost importance to your state that it respect the constitution of the United States, and obey the decisions of the supreme courts; and, for the sake of social order and respect for law your state should purge itself of unjust laws, and itself exercise its sovereign power of eminent domain.

The interests to be affected are of such vast extent and importance, that legislation should not be undertaken hastily, but be thoroughly considered and discussed by the people during the next two years. I am sending a copy of this letter to the governor of each state for concerted action. Will you kindly call this to the attention of the legislature of your state?
