

# BRADY IS GIVEN INDORSEMENT IN HIS HOME COUNTY

**Strong Resolutions Passed  
by the Republican County  
Central Committee of Ban-  
nock County.**

Resolutions indorsing ex-Governor James H. Brady as a candidate for United States senator to succeed the late Senator Weldon B. Heyburn, passed by the Republican county central committee of Bannock county have been received in Boise. The same Republicans indorsed William A. Norton as Bannock county's candidate for water commissioner. The delegation failed to indorse A. E. Haines, as a candidate for state immigration commissioner. Those present are said to have shown a preference to O. H. Harber of American Falls for this post, although he was not indorsed.

## LAND OFFICE REPORT FOR NOVEMBER FILED

William Balderston, register, and Fred Tinker, receiver of the Boise land office, have filed their November report to the department of the interior showing the amount of business that has been transacted in this district and through this office during that time.

The report shows an allowance of 42 final homesteads of 5692.64 acres; eight commuted homesteads of 1076.59 acres; two desert finals of 129 acres; eight public sales of 359.52 acres; 59 homestead originals of 7948.27 acres; six homesteads later filed of 634.60 acres; 28 deserts of 4177.53 acres; one timber and stone entry; one school selection of 40 acres.

The statement also shows the amount of money received for those entries as fees and totals them at \$4829.12.

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three to five years, for Settors has applied for a writ of mandate directed to Warden John Snook to show cause why he is being detained in the state's penal institution.

Settors declares in his application that he should have been given a lighter sentence, with a minimum of one instead of three years, and therefore he asserts that the judge who sentenced him exceeded his jurisdiction. He was received at the penitentiary Jan. 4, 1910. Had he been given the limit maximum of three years he would be permitted to leave the prison, he asserts.

The alleged fact that Settors violated a parole may play a prominent part in the present litigation before the court. It is charged that immediately after he was paroled he violated the terms of the parole by drinking to excess.

Saturday morning has been set by the supreme court as the time for hearing argument on the writ. The warden may be commanded to bring the defendant before the bar.

## BIG PRUNE ORCHARD TO BE SET OUT NEAR MERIDIAN IN SPRING

A 100-acre prune orchard is to be set out near Meridian in the spring by the F. J. Garver company. The orchard will be the largest prune orchard in Ada county and is conveniently situated between the Oregon Short Line tracks and the Boise Valley line. The ground for the big orchard is now being prepared, a large force of men being engaged in blasting 10,000 holes on the tract for the trees, which are being set out under direction of an expert horticulturist, who declares that the blasting method is superior to any other for planting an orchard for the reason that the ground is well loosened for a considerable area about the roots, thus giving them an opportunity to spread, while trees planted in that manner do not require as much water as those placed in dug holes.

The entire tract is to be planted to the famous Italian purple prunes for which there is such a demand and which are being canned to a large extent at the Boise Canning factory.

The house numbers for the residents of the new addition to the city are now ready and can be secured by calling at the office of the city engineer in the city hall. The engineer is particularly anxious to have the house numbers put on as many of the houses in that section have wrong numbers which makes confusion. There is no charge for the numbers but they must be called for. There is an ordinance on the books of the city providing for the correct numbering of all business houses and residences, and carrying with it a penalty of from \$5 to \$50 for violation and a fine not exceeding 30 days in the city jail.

A reinforced concrete addition is to be added to the business section of the Idaho Brewing & Malting company's building at Sixth and Idaho streets. The addition will make the building three stories high and will cost approximately \$20,000. Plans for the addition have just been completed by Tourtelotte & Hummel.
