MRS. TRAINOR IS SEEKING FREEDOM

Effort Made to Secure Woman's Release From Industrial School.

The supreme court late yesterday granted a writ of habeas corpus to compel J. H. Humphries, superintendent of the Idaho State Industrial school at St. Anthony, to show cause why he should not liberate Mrs. B. M. Trainor, nee Adeline Hansen, from that institution where it is charged she is being unlawfully detained, and is not entitled to join her husband to whom she was recently married. Superintendent Humphries is required to appear before Judge James M. Stevens of the Sixth judicial district court Dec. 16 to show cause why he is holding the girl.

Mrs. Trainor, 37 years of age, was for some time inmate of the industrial training school. She met Trainor, a train inspector at Pocatello and they became engaged. Just before their marriage Mr. Trainor was called away from Pocatello on business. During his absence the officials of the probate court of Bannock county took the girl in charge as a delinquent and she was committed to the school. She made her escape two days later going to Idaho Falls. From there she communicated with Trainor, who came on to that city and they were married.

The marriage formed an interesting legal question and was attacked but later allowed to stand, although Trainor was tried and exonerated. He was charged with perjury, but was able to produce a written consent to the marriage from the girl's mother. The habeas corpus proceedings is the last step taken to clear away possible legal obstructions to the two living as man and wife. The litigation has extended over a period of months in eastern Idaho and from time to time the newspapers there have commented on it.

them will be drawn the money to feed the thousands.

WILL LOOK INTO TAX SITUATION

Payette Commercial Club to Make Thorough Investigation of Subject.

Payette, Dec. 11.—A special meeting of the Payette Commercial club has been called for tonight for the purpose of investigating causes for the high taxes and to make recommendations to the legislature, county commissioners, city council and board of education looking toward the reduction of taxes next year. The club is feeling most optimistic over county division due to the fact that Payette people are giving their help and encouragement toward the matter and also from the fact that aid has been promised from other parts of the state. Payette and New Plymouth both aspire to secure the permanent county seat, but should the people of the valley succeed in getting the county divided, Payette would undoubtedly stand the best chance for landing the prize. It would in all probability receive the substantial support of almost the entire valley, due to its location and to the fact that the city has buildings

which could be used to transact the business of the new county in for a number of years, thus relieving the taxpayer from the burden of being further taxed to build a court house and other buildings necessary at a county seat.

FIGHTING TO RETAIN THE ASSAY OFFICES

Boise is recognized as in the fight to the finish for the maintenance of the assay office here. A telegram from the Helena Commercial club, through its secretary, L. M. Rheem, to the Boise club and R. W. Childs, the secretary, was received yesterday asking for notice as to what action had been taken by the organization here to prevent the Democrats from cutting off the appropriation. The telegram says: "Please advise what action you are taking in the abolition of the assay offices at Salt Lake, Boise, and Helena. Wire from our representative says committee unanimously agreed to abolish them. Senator Myers says thinks can reinstate when appropriation bill comes back to senate." The Boise club will notify Helena as to the action that has been taken for the support of the local office and will line up behind that club for the maintenance of the offices through the mining states of the west.

TWO NEW BUILDINGS FOR THE UNIVERSITY

The budget to be submitted to the next legislature by the regents of the University of Idaho will, besides asking for an appropriation of \$100,000 to be used for the construction of a woman's building at the university, ask for \$75,000 for a men's dormitory. Aside from these two features the budget provides for the salaries and current expenses of the university, together with apparatus and machinery and other expenses, including \$24,235 for buildings, improvements and land. A large portion of the estimated expense is covered by the estimated receipts from the endowment funds of the university.

The budget for the agricultural department includes \$31,000 for extension work in the different counties of the state, together with an estimate to cover the needs of the various experimental stations throughout Idaho. For the university \$35,000 is asked for a farm engineering building in Moscow. By the time President MacLean leaves the University of Idaho, which will be during the latter part of February, the regents hope to have secured the new president and are working now to the end that he may take charge of the university at that time. It is desired if possible that President MacLean turn over the institution to his successor without the necessity of a president ad interim.

President Moffat of the regents will leave for the east shortly to look over the field and make the selection of a man for the presidency, the choice having been delegated to him by the other two regents.




