

SENATOR PERKY ENTERS DENIAL OF LOCAL STORY

Brands as False the Report That Slate Has Been Made Up of the Federal Appointments.

Senator Perky Denies Report.
The second denial to the alleged report that a slate had been made in Washington for federal appointments in Idaho has been received from Senator Perky and is contained in a telegram as follows:
Washington, D. C., Dec. 11, 1912.
"Fred Flood,
Boise, Idaho.
"Absolutely no recommendations and no agreement."
"K. I. PERKY."

Senator Kirtland I. Perky adds his denial to the one made yesterday by Fred Flood, private secretary to the governor, that a slate had been made at Washington by himself, Governor Hawley and ex-United States Senator Fred T. Dubois for federal appointments in this state, thereby branding as erroneous the report published in a local paper under a Washington date line that such a slate had been perfected through the agreement reached by the "Big Three."
It is believed in Democratic circles that the message from Senator Perky will set at rest the uneasiness caused through the publication of the false report, and has reassured who were about to engage in a merry war because an attempt had been made to pluck all the ripening federal plums in Idaho by men who are prominent in the party and close to the ear of President-elect Woodrow Wilson.

mediately issued a denial as he was then in possession of information direct from the "Big Three" branding it as untrue. To make certain that there could be no mistake he wired Senator Perky and the above reply was received.

Would Strike Common Ground.
It was given out today by those close to the federal pie counter in this state that every effort is being made on the part of Democrats to get together on the federal patronage for this state and it is now believed that this will be done, or at least every effort will be put forth by party leaders to accomplish it if possible.

The friends of Ben R. Gray, Democratic chairman, are claiming the office of United States marshal for Mr. Gray on the grounds that as state chairman he conducted a campaign that resulted in placing Idaho in the Wilson column and therefore he will be given recognition. Harry Fulton, former chief of the fire department of this city, is also receiving strong backing for the appointment. His friends assert that he will be given serious consideration.

Nugent if Elders Agree.
The three party leaders who are strongly being considered as Democratic timber for district attorney are Robert Elders, national committee-

man; Frank R. Moore, a Wilson presidential elector, and John F. Nugent, former state chairman and a strong leader in the party. It is now claimed that Elders is not and will not make a fight for the office but will make a great deal to do with the naming of the man who does take it. If he can get together with John F. Nugent, it is said, and Mr. Nugent is willing to accept his indorsement or stamp of approval, the district attorneyship will go to the former state chairman.

The disposition of the party leaders, it is said, to give the plums to the factions of both wings of the party, hence the Elders-Nugent plan for harmony.

Wallace and Robinson.
F. M. Davis will probably be the only Democrat considered for postmaster of Boise. His qualifications are well known so that there is no question as to his ability to take over the post at a moment's notice, it is said by his Democratic friends. He is also acceptable to the two wings of the party, is the claim made and will therefore receive the commission.

The name of H. E. Wallace of Canyon county, former probate judge there, was brought into the political limelight as possible timber for register or receiver of the Boise land office and it is said he will be among the successful federal appointees.

J. I. Robinson, state engineer, is said to be favorably considered for surveyor general, the post now held by General D. A. Utter. Mr. Robinson became state engineer under Governor Hawley when the chief executive took over his office and is now rounding out the second of his four-year terms. Should he be appointed surveyor general a successor will be selected to him as state engineer. Should he decide not to be a candidate for surveyor general, or fail to secure the appointment his friends are now working for, he will still have two of his four years' term to serve as state engineer unless he should resign or be removed for cause, which it is said is not likely.

Hoeklin had any knowledge as to his guilt or innocence?"
"I believed so then."
"Do you believe now that they had that knowledge then?" asked Judge Anderson.
"No, I don't now believe they did."
Did Not Oppose Re-election.
Cunnans said he did not oppose McNamara's re-election as secretary at the iron workers' convention in September, 1911, while McNamara was in jail. He also testified he read a letter from Ryan saying in reference to members of the National Erectors' association, "You are to use the funds in any manner that will delay or add to the cost of the work," but he denied that it implied the use of violence.

Frank K. Palmer, of Omaha, testified that 60 days before an explosion in Omaha on July 21, 1910, he wrote to McNamara that "there are no police within 10 blocks of the job and that after the explosion he sent McNamara a newspaper clipping giving an account of it."

After another explosion in Omaha on March 4, 1911, six months after the Los Angeles Times building was blown up, he testified he sent another newspaper account:
"Knowing that a man called J. B. Bryce, and others called Schmidt and Caplan were being sought on the Pacific coast, still that Omaha explosion caused you to make no investigation and you sent the clipping merely as a matter of news did you?"
"I did not know much about who was being sought on the coast and I did send the clipping merely as news," said Palmer.

Palmer said that about 30 days before the last explosion McNamara wrote him: "You know you can't tell much in letters, but you know if I can do anything, I will be on the job." McNamara was arrested the month after the explosion.

John H. Barry, St. Louis, testified that as a member of the executive board of the Iron Workers' International union, he audited the accounts of McNamara, the secretary, but he denied knowing that any of the funds was used for dynamiting. He said he visited Steubenville, O., before an explosion took place there in June, 1909, and he went to Cincinnati, where he talked to Edward Clark, now a confessed dynamiter, about union conditions in Cincinnati, but he asserted he knew nothing of any proposed explosions.
