THREE LINES MAY BE OPERATED AS ONE BIG SYSTEM

Union Pacific Will Probably Absorb the O. S. L. and the O. W. R. & N., Using One Name.

Idaho will probably form an important link in a railroad consolidation if the Oregon Short Line, the Union Pacific and the Oregon-Washington Railway & Navigation company become one system, which, according to well posted local railroad men, is the movement now under way on the part of the owners of the great Harriman system. If the plan is consummated the three roads will hereafter be one from Omaha to Portland.

While the three roads are practically one, at the same time they have separate titles. The Union Pacific owns the stock of the Oregon Short Line and the Oregon Short Line owns the stock of the Oregon-Washington Railway & Navigation company. The consolidating move will be made, it is said, because of the recent supreme court decision declaring illegal the merger of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific. The three lines will probably be known as the Union Pacific and the two other and present road names dropped, providing the railroad heads decide to take the action contemplated.

This plan becomes more certain of adoption in the event that the Union Pacific loses its fight for control of the Central Pacific, which is the line between Ogden and San Francisco.

While the supreme court suggested a way by which the Union Pacific could maintain ownership of this line, it is understood that the majority

stockholders are preparing to pool their interests in New York with the intention of preventing it from passing into the hands of the Union Pacific. The Union Pacific owns less than 50 per cent of this stock. The Central Pacific is the keynote in the present situation. Portland will benefit most if the Union Pacific loses it. In that event it is almost certain that the Union Pacific will divert all its Oriental traffic to Portland, which will result in the operation of regular steamship service between Portland and the Orient.

Use Ogden Gateway. This plan would give the Union Pacific the haul on its transcontinental traffic from its eastern termini—Omaha and Kansas City—to Portland. Were it to continue using the Ogden gateway it would be compelled to pay a rival road for handling it between Ogden and San Francisco.

Should, however, the Union Pacific be successful in its fight for retention of the Central Pacific the Oriental traffic would continue to move as at present—through San Francisco.

As a matter of convenience and to save operating expenses it is proposed now to merge the three roads and place them under one executive head. The Short Line already is under the direct management of the Union Pacific, A. L. Mohler being president of both companies.

GUARDS KEPT ON

docks in Edgewater yesterday. In a pitched battle which followed, two railroad detectives were killed and a dozen men wounded.

A telegram requesting that the militia be called to quell the disorder was sent to the acting governor of New Jersey by General Superintendent Stone of the Erie railroad. Mr. Stone escaped a storm of bullets fired by strikers as he was seeking shelter in a building.

The men killed were: ANDREW J. GRAW, 28, of Binghamton, N. Y., captain of detectives. CLARENCE MALLERY, 46, one of Graw's men.

The wounded include: John Ryerson of Jersey City, lieutenant of detectives; William King, William A. Woods, Frank A. Brown and William Hicks.

All these men, like Captain Graw and Mallery, were doing private detective work for the Erie railroad.

Hicks is in a hospital wounded 23 times. Brown and Woods were shot through the head, Ryerson in the back and chest and King in the right ear. The men hiding behind cliffs and trees, waited until a scow had discharged its cargo of men brought to take the strikers' places. A volley of blank cartridges did not frighten the strikebreakers, who pushed forward toward the railroad tracks on the coal wharf.

The men in ambush then left their hiding places and firing real bullets attempted to swarm out on the wharf. They were met by the private detectives, who unarmed, except for clubs, engaged in a hand-to-hand struggle.

A fusillade of shots brushed the officers aside and they fled for safety, except the mortally wounded Graw and Mallery. The strikebreakers under a fire of bullets, fled along the shores of the Hudson and concealed themselves in the woods of the palisades.

Three hundred employes, foreigners, of the Susquehanna, which the Erie controls, quit work Monday demanding a wage increase of five cents an hour. Officials of the railroad would not grant the increase.

REPORT MADE ON RURAL SCHOOLS

County Superintendent Tells of Work Done During the Past Year.

Miss Ivy M. Wilson has submitted a report, as county superintendent, to Miss Grace Shepherd, the state superintendent, on the work done during the past year by the Ada county rural schools.

She reports that six new school buildings have been erected in the county during the past two years and that each one of them is making preparations to become the social center of the community. They are building auditoriums and putting in adjustable partitions in such a way that they can be taken out for special entertainments.

Twenty-eight districts are using their buildings for general meetings, parent meetings, sessions of the mothers' circles, and other general conventions. Nine districts have organized mothers' circles for the discussion of matters that relate to child welfare.

Improvements are being made in many of the districts in the methods of heating and stoves are being rapidly replaced by furnaces while others are planning to make improvements of the same kind. Eighteen districts have established fountains while in the others individual drinking cups are required. Material advancement has been made in all of the districts in the way of playground improvement. Fourteen districts have bought teeter boards, turning poles, swings and basketball outfits and have placed them on the grounds for the children of the schools. The Star school has even gone beyond this and has established a regular gymnasium for the children of district No. 20.

The teachers and pupils of the districts should be given credit for these improvements, the superintendent says, for they have schemed and planned to raise money for the purchase of the improvement on the grounds. A total of \$528.75 has been raised in 13 districts for the betterment of the conditions either in the buildings or on the grounds.

A large number of trees have been planted in all of the districts of the county and a great deal of shrubbery and plants have been set out during the year.

The Industrial Feature. Great improvement has been made in the industrial features of rural education. Potato clubs, sewing circles, cooking classes and other things of the kind have been established in many of the districts during the past year. The children of the county have won a large number of prizes at the state fair for their work in the school and have manifested that the plan has been a working success. The superintendent closes her report with the statement that the county is justly proud of the work that has been done and realizes that it is only a beginning of what will be done in the next few years.
