

GREEKS ARE OPERATING AGAINST POSITION OF THE TURKS

Ottoman Government Instructs Its Delegates Not to Meet Greek Delegates at London Conference

Athens, Dec. 13.—A general offensive movement along the whole line was begun Monday by the Greek army operating in Epirus. After repeated attacks the Greek troops captured, at the point of bayonets, the Turkish advanced position, and camped there. The Greeks lost 5 killed and 19 wounded.

DECLINE TO MEET GREEKS.

Constantinople, Dec. 13.—The Turkish delegates to the peace conference at London have been instructed by the Ottoman government to decline to meet the Greek delegates until Greece has signed the armistice.

DELEGATES ARE ARRIVING.

London, Dec. 13.—The Bulgarian delegates to the peace conference arrived today. The Turkish plenipotentiaries are expected to reach here tonight. With this exception all who are to participate in the conference are now in London.

BAN IS PLACED ON INTERFERENCE WITH WIRELESS

Rules Put Into Effect by the Department of Commerce and Labor to Protect Signals.

Washington, Dec. 13.—Commercial messages by wireless, or the exchange of signals in behalf of a ship in distress, will no longer be interfered with by the practice of amateur devotees of the new system of telegraphy, if the rules put into effect today by the department of commerce and labor serve the purpose for which they are intended.

The new regulations establish a complete federal control system over radio communication and require the licensing of all wireless operators working across state lines or in communication with ships at sea. Permits for radio stations will be issued only to citizens of the United States or Porto Rico or to a company incorporated under a federal, state, territorial or Porto Rican law.

PROTESTING AGAINST CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

San Francisco, Dec. 13.—"Thou shalt not kill," the slogan of the Anti-Capital Punishment league, was urged throughout the night to varying crowds here at a 24-hour street meeting organized by the league as a protest against the four hangings scheduled in Oregon and one in California today.

STOCK EXCHANGE SECRETS TOLD TO THE COMMITTEE

Former President of the Exchange Defends "Short Selling" System in Case of Panic.

Washington, Dec. 13.—At the continuation of the money trust investigation today, Frank K. Sturgis, former president of the New York stock exchange, said the estimate of the business of the exchange at 196,000,000 shares annually was about right, but brokers did not receive commissions on all these sales, as they did about one-third of the trading between themselves.

DIES FROM FASTING IN THE VAIN HOPE OF CHILD RESSURECTION

Calgary, Alta., Dec. 13.—Wasting her strength for more than a month in the idle hope that her fast would bring back in life her babe that perished two months after birth, Mrs. Henrietta Irving, wife of a ranchman near here, died Dec. 8. The mother, father and aunt of the child took part in the fast.

WILLIS SENTENCED TO THE PENITENTIARY

(Capital News Special Service) Pocatello, Dec. 13.—Judge Budge in the district court yesterday afternoon, sentenced Walter Willis to serve from 15 to 25 years in the penitentiary. Willis was convicted of murder in the second degree for killing Chauncey Sessions at Downey on Labor day.

KANSAS WOMEN WILL BE FORCED TO DO JURY DUTY

Difficulty Being Experienced in Finding Women at Home—Judge Gives Them Warning.

Independence, Kan., Dec. 13.—Evident reluctance among Independence society women to respond to the call for jury service brought the announcement today by Justice Clark that he intended to have a woman jury in his court for every case where the testimony was not likely to be of an embarrassing nature. He said women had more time for jury duty than men.

In many cases, Sheriff Wadman said, he was met at the door by a butler or maid with the information that the mistress was "out of town," while at the same time he had seen the absentee at an upstairs window laughing at him.

COMMISSION HOLDS IT HAS JURISDICTION OVER THE WIRELESS

Washington, Dec. 13.—The interstate commerce commission today ruled that under the act making telegraph and telephone companies common carriers, it has jurisdiction over wireless messages from a commercial station in the United States to a ship at sea, whether a United States or foreign ship, but that it has no jurisdiction over messages between two American ships at sea.

FOLLOWED BY AGENTS OF RIVAL COMPANY

Cincinnati, Dec. 13.—The cross-examination of A. G. Woodman of Helena, Mont., was again taken up when the trial of John U. Patterson and other officers of the National Cash Register company, charged with violation of the anti-trust law, was resumed in the district court.

ATTORNEYS GAVE ARCHBALD MONEY TO GO TO EUROPE

Prosecution Concluding Its Case Against Judge Who Is on Trial in the United States Senate.

Washington, Dec. 13.—With all remaining witnesses summoned to Washington today, the house managers of the impeachment trial of Judge Archbald prepared to conclude the case. Much of the concluding testimony produced by house managers concerned Archbald's trip to Europe while federal judge in Pennsylvania.

Defendants Tell of Getting Instructions From J. J. McNamara

RYAN IS GIVEN A CALLING BY COURT

Judge Anderson Objects to the Tone of Replies Given by the President of the Union While on the Witness Stand.

Indianapolis, Dec. 13.—Visits by some of the defendants to the scenes of the explosions on non-union jobs were explained by them at the dynamite conspiracy trial today. Paul J. Morrin of St. Louis testified that three weeks after an open shop works was blown up at Mount Vernon, Ill., he was instructed by J. J. McNamara to unhoist the men.

McManigal had confessed to causing the Mount Vernon explosions. Previously Frank M. Ryan, president of the union, had written McNamara: "Morrin can take care of Mount Vernon," but Ryan denied it concerning dynamiting. Morrin said that after McNamara's arrest he assisted in raising the defense fund.

Ryan is Censured. For saying that "virulent attacks" were made on him by contractors who employed non-union workers, Frank M. Ryan, president of the Ironworkers' International union, was censured by the court as giving "irresponsible" answers.

Ryan was asked what he meant by comments he made on an invitation he received to visit William T. Jerome, then district attorney of New York. Ryan's comments were contained in a letter written in January, 1906, to John J. McNamara, secretary of the union.

At that time, according to the government, Ryan was in New York directing the "dynamiting campaign" in the ironworkers' general strike against "open shop" contractors.

Ryan identified a copy of a letter he received from Jerome saying: "I shall be glad to see you alone or with your attorney, if you prefer."

In his letter to McNamara he said: "Another surprise. I enclose a copy

CANDY TRUST IS LATEST VICTIM OF GOVERNMENT

Suit Is Instituted by Attorney General Against the Philadelphia Jobbing Confectioners' Association.

Philadelphia, Dec. 13.—The "candy trust" was attacked by Attorney General Wickersham in a civil anti-trust suit filed here today against the Philadelphia Jobbing Confectioners' association. Members and officers combined and conspired, it is charged, to coerce candy manufacturers from selling direct to retailers, consumers or jobbers other than members of the association.

Hate Off to the Apple Growers. Spokane, Wash., Dec. 13.—To organize on a co-operative basis so that the price of apples to the consumer may be reduced, at the same time insuring adequate returns to the grower, a conference of prominent orchard owners will be held in this city this afternoon of the coming week.

Sang Too Much; Sent to Jail. Minneapolis, Dec. 13.—Because she frequently sang a song for 36 consecutive hours, Mrs. Florence Queen, whose home is said to be in North Dakota, was sentenced to 90 days in the workhouse here today.

DRIVEN INTO STREETS BY SPECTACULAR FIRE IN APARTMENT HOUSE

Pittsburg, Dec. 13.—More than 200 persons, residents of the Library apartments, a large residence building in the business heart of the north side, were driven into the streets this morning by a spectacular fire which destroyed the structure. A dozen or more persons were injured, some of them firemen, who were caught under a falling wall, but it is not believed there were any fatalities.

NEW STATIONS FOR THE SALE OF EGGS

Philadelphia, Dec. 13.—Seventeen additional stations for the sale of eggs were put in operation today by members of the Housekeepers' league. Fifty-nine stations are now engaged in supplying the demand for lower priced eggs in the campaign opened by the women Wednesday.

New Nickels Almost Ready. Washington, Dec. 13.—The nickel with an artistic Indian head on the face will be in circulation, according to the expectations of the treasury department by Feb. 1. Secretary MacVeagh has definitely accepted the design.

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MONTANA POWER CONCERNS ARE CONSOLIDATED INTO GREAT CORPORATION

Trenton, N. J., Dec. 13.—Articles of consolidation were filed today with the secretary of state by the Butte Electric & Power company, the Montana Power company, the Madison River Power company, the Billings & Eastern Montana Power company, the Missouri River Electric & Power company, having a combined capital of \$14,000,000. The new company, under the name of the Montana Power company, has an authorized capital of \$100,000,000, divided into \$100 shares. The officers of the new company will be elected at Newark in April. A filing fee of \$17,000 was paid.

LIVESTOCK SHOW COMES TO A CLOSE AT LEWISTON AFTER BIG SALES ARE MADE

(Capital News Special Service) Lewiston, Dec. 13.—The Northwest Livestock show at Lewiston closed today with the record of a success that surpasses all expectations. Until today the crowds have witnessed very agreeable December weather. Yesterday and today were almost exclusively confined to the sales, which have been conducted under the auspices of the association. Thirty head of pure bred horses yesterday brought breeders of the northwest \$23,000. Three carloads of fat cattle, amounting to 48 head, was sold to coast and Spokane firms for a total figure amounting to \$5200.

PROMINENT CATTLE MEN UNDER ARREST

(Capital News Special Service) Twin Falls, Dec. 13.—W. C. Janks, Paul Robertson, Dick Wetherbee and Charles B. Jenks, all prominent cattle men of this section, were last night bound over to the district court for trial by the probate judge of this county, on a charge of having received stolen property. The property alleged to have been stolen and received by them is 20 head of cattle which the officers charge they caught two rustlers in the act of driving into pens of the defendants for delivery to them.

KU KLUX KLAN IS REVIVED IN SOUTH

Dalton, Ga., Dec. 13.—The Ku Klux Klan was revived today when masked men took John Watkins from his home to the center of the town, where he was severely whipped. He was then given three days to leave town. The action is said to have followed his refusal to get rid of alleged disorderly white women in one of his houses.

LURED GIRL INTO A MINE AND KILLED HER

Palouse, Wash., Dec. 13.—Luring his sweetheart into the depths of a mine near Harvard, Ida., Jesse Dillman shot and killed Miss M. Limer, 15 years old, of Helmer, Ida., and fatally wounded himself late Wednesday night, according to a report which has reached here. Men employed in the mine entered the tunnel to investigate the cause of two shots they had heard, but Dillman opened fire on them and drove them out.

TURKS READY TO RESUME THE WAR

Paris, Dec. 13.—If the allies do not permit peace honorably for Turkey, hostilities will be begun immediately. This was one of the declarations made by Rehad Pasha, one of the Ottoman plenipotentiaries, in an interview today with a correspondent of the Temps as he passed through Paris on his way to London.

EXECUTIONS IN OREGON PRISON

Salem, Ore., Dec. 13.—Frank Garrison and Noble Foulger, condemned murderers, were hanged in the penitentiary simultaneously at 11:25 o'clock today. Immediate preparations were made to execute two other murderers, E. E. Roberts and Mike Morgan.
