

# GOVERNOR IS IN RECEPTIVE MOOD AS TO CANDIDACY

## Strong Support Given Hawley for Place in Wilson Cabinet by Men Close to President-elect.

Governor James H. Hawley stands in the light of a receptive candidate for secretary of the interior. When interviewed today, the governor authorized this announcement. While not seeking the office in that he is making a campaign of any kind to secure the appointment, he would not refuse the portfolio were it tendered to him by President-elect Woodrow Wilson. The governor, accompanied by State Land Commissioner George A. Day, returned yesterday from Washington, where they have been successful in starting in operation the federal machinery which means the transfer of lieu lands in this state by the government to Idaho which have an approximate value of \$50,000,000.

**Statement as to Candidacy.**  
When interviewed today, and asked whether or not he was a receptive candidate for secretary of the interior, Governor Hawley said:  
"You can say that I am, and that while I am not making a campaign for the appointment, still I believe that a western man will be selected, and as my name has been connected with the office, I have no hesitancy in stating that I might be termed a receptive candidate."

The governor was recently endorsed by the Boise Commercial club as Idaho's candidate for the portfolio. The resolutions passed by the Boise club called upon other clubs in this and adjoining states to give their endorsement to him. Many have already done so. When this fact was called to his attention yesterday, Governor Hawley said:

**Appreciate Indorsement.**  
"I did not learn until this morning that the Boise Commercial club had taken this action. I deeply appreciate the honor they have conferred upon me, and the indorsement that our own, as well as other clubs have given me."

It became known today that the governor has the staunch backing of many men of prominence, high in Democratic councils, and they are urging the name of the governor to the president-elect. They are powerful with the incoming administration, and it is claimed that if the appointment comes to the west, it will go to the present governor of Idaho. In view of the fact that President-elect Wilson was in Bermuda while Governor Hawley was in Washington, Idaho's chief executive could not hold a conference with him. The latter left Washington just before the return to this country of the governor, however, have the Washington situation well in hand, and will take an active interest in behalf of the governor.

**Land Matters Satisfactory.**  
"We closed up the land matters that took us to Washington in, to our minds, a very satisfactory way," said Governor Hawley, commenting on the mission that took him to Washington. "Both Mr. Day and myself took the issue up with the departments, and were given very courteous treatment. We are satisfied that the lieu land selections will take place as we had hoped, and that Idaho, as a result, will receive the benefits from the big transactions, the biggest, I believe, in the history of the state. I expect that all details will be arranged before I leave the office of governor."

While in Washington Governor Hawley called upon and paid his respects to President William Howard Taft, spending a very pleasant half hour with the nation's chief executive. He also met many of the department heads, congressmen and senators, and had the satisfaction of seeing his United States senatorial appointee, Kirtland J. Perky, on the floor of the senate in the seat formerly held by the late Senator Sheldon B. Heyburn.

### BIG BOUNTIES FOR SCALPS AND FURS

Ontario, Ore., Dec. 17.—T. A. Hurtle, one of the best known and most successful trappers of this section, was here this week marketing his pelts and collecting his bounty on the scalps of wildcats and coyotes, the proceeds of which amounted to about \$1000, and is the largest amount of scalps and furs brought in so far this season. He received \$219 bounty on the scalps and the furs will bring him about \$500. He has bagged 224 coyotes and 49 wildcats so far this season, but only brought in the pelts of 122 coyotes and 18 cats on this trip. Among the other pelts brought in by Mr. Hurtle for shipment to eastern fur dealers were those of otter, musk rats, mink and badgers. Mr. Hurtle is 72 years old and has followed trapping and hunting a great deal of his life and is an expert trap-

## IDAHO FOWLS ON PORTLAND MARKET


Sum of \$25,000 Received by New Plymouth and Caldwell Poultry Raisers.

New Plymouth, Dec. 17.—Twenty-five thousand dollars is the very tidy sum which the poultry raisers of New Plymouth and Caldwell will have received for their year's work by Jan. 1, when the last of the turkeys, chickens, ducks and geese have been shipped to the Portland market. One thing worthy of note is the fact that the greater part of this sum will go to the women of the Payette and Boise valleys, who almost without an exception, have been the ones to give this branch of farm work their exclusive attention, and to their industry and intelligent management is due the credit of adding very materially to their husbands' bank accounts.

The man who leaves this very satisfactory sum in Idaho this year is M. C. Mace, of Portland, owner of the "Mace Market" in that city. Mr. Mace, who has operated here and at Caldwell for the past four years, left Monday after making arrangements at both points for the shipment of 25,000 pounds of dressed poultry for the Christmas and holiday trade. For Thanksgiving 30,000 pounds about equally divided, left the New Plymouth and Caldwell houses which did not begin to supply the demand of the Mace Market. Fully twice as much could have been handled had it been available. Throughout the summer and early fall months Mr. Mace ships quantities of live poultry, the greater part going through the Caldwell house. Prices this year have been the same as obtained last year—Turkeys 15 to 20 cents per pound, live weight; chickens, 9 to 12 cents, ducks 10 cents and geese 8 cents. The poultry shipped out this fall has been highly satisfactory to Mr. Mace who states that in no other section in which he operates does he find the poultry in better condition, when brought in from the farm than in Idaho. He has one criticism to offer, however, and that is that far too many engaging in this industry as a money making business are raising the Mediterranean breeds of chickens, such as the Leghorns, which as a table bird are unsatisfactory to the trade, and do not command the price that the American and Asiatic breeds do.

"Another season," said Mr. Mace, "the chickens will be graded, a lower figure being paid for the Mediterranean class, while the highest market price will be paid for Plymouth Rocks, Rhode Island Reds, Brahmas and other breeds in the American and Asiatic class. For this class of poultry I can well afford to pay top prices for the reason that they look nicer in the mar-



ket, sell more readily, bring from 2 to 3 cents more per pound and are considered much superior to the Mediterranean breeds for the table. I enter exclusively to private trade, no wholesale business being done at my market, hence an desirous of obtaining the very best poultry which it is possible to get irrespective of price in order to satisfy my city trade.

The Mace poultry house here presents a scene of great activity for eight hours every day, and the coming week work will be pushed during the evenings in order that the Christmas shipments may be gotten off in time.

### CASE AGAINST DR. BIWER DISMISSED

The Dr. Edward T. Biwer and Sadie River adultery case went up in smoke this morning and the serious charges filed against them by the doctor's former wife were dismissed by Judge Gardner Adams, upon motion of Special Prosecuting Attorney C. E. Winstead, who in a written motion, declared that he had made an investigation of the case and found that the defendants were legally married in Pocatello, Oct. 3, 1912, and asked that the case be dismissed as there was no probable cause for such charges and further asked that the costs be assessed to the complaining witness.

Judge Adams granted the motion to dismiss, but denied that part of asking that the costs be assessed to the complaining witness. Promptly at 10 o'clock, Dr. and Mrs. Biwer, accompanied by their attorney, E. J. Frawley, appeared in court and immediately upon convening, C. E. Winstead presented his motion for dismissal, which was granted, the defendants not being in court over five minutes.

It is reported that the doctor's divorced wife is still full of fight and will likely attack the divorce proceedings, bringing an action in the Canyon county court in which the divorce was secured.
