

# PUBLIC UTILITY COMMISSION IS URGED FOR IDAHO

### Senator Edgington, of Bonnevile County, Holds a Meeting With Constituents at Idaho Falls.

(Capital News Special Service.) Idaho Falls, Dec. 27.—A large course of local citizens and farmers of the immediate vicinity met here yesterday in response to an invitation issued by State Senator-elect Edgington, to discuss proposed and needed legislation during the coming session of the legislature. The idea is one unique in the political world, and has been much discussed by those who are interested in pending legislation.

The meeting was called to order by Senator Edgington, and, after a few preliminary remarks, the serious part of the meeting was reached. A resolution favoring a public utility and tax commission was introduced and passed without a dissenting vote.

The sentiment in favor of this particular legislation was tremendous, and no one left the meeting any wise in doubt as to its attitude.

A committee was appointed by the chair, having for its purpose the preliminary draft of a bill looking toward state aid in the matter of guaranteeing farm loans, thus insuring a lower rate of interest, and which idea is very similar to the one advanced by President Taft following the German and French system of guaranteed farm loans.

Matters affecting better road legislation and the idea of appropriating state money for the purpose of building good roads, were discussed, and quite uniformly favored.

There appeared to be some opposition to making any appropriations for the California expositions. It was also made the sense of the meeting that, if the state prisoners should be forced to labor, that the labor be done upon the public highways under the supervision of the state and counties. A decided negative expression was had opposing the lease or contract system of prison labor.

A large number of other matters were discussed. The meeting was voted a complete success, and it portends good results.
