The contestant alleges that Representative Kent spent \$50,000 to secure his election, in violation of the law limiting the expenditures of candidates, and failed to make a correct report of expenses.

Pole Discoverers to Meet.

Washington, Jan. 10.—With honors befitting his achievement, Captain Roald Amundsen, discoverer of the South Pole, will be entertained in this city tomorrow night as the principal guest at the annual banquet of the National Geographic society. Captain Amundsen will be presented with a special gold medal awarded by the society in recognition of his achievements in south polar exploration. The address of presentation will be made by Rear Admiral Peary of North Pole fame. The ceremony will be witnessed by a distinguished company that will include the president of the United States and members of his cabinet, justices of the supreme court of the United States, senators and representatives, the diplomatic corps, and members of the society from many parts of the country.

London, Jan. 10.—A verdict of death from heart failure was returned at the inquest on the body of Paul Nash, United States consul general at Budapest. A doctor testified that Nash had taken a sleeping draught to combat insomnia and this possibly hastened death.

LINCOLN DAY TO BE OBSERVED BY THE BULL MOOSE

National Committeeman Is Making Arrangements for Meeting — Pays Visit to Contempt Prisoners.

P. Monroe Smock, of New Plymouth, national committeeman of the Progressive party, arrived in the city yesterday having been deprived of attending the Progressive rally on Monday because of a belated train.

Mr. Smock, accompanied by L. B. Baker, of the Golden Rule store in New Plymouth, paid the three men in jail for alleged contempt a visit last evening, and left them 500 pennies as a result of a "penny subscription" started by B. F. Swatman, the big "Bull Moose" of New Plymouth.

Mr. Smock paid his eulogy to the three gentlemen who constitute the Idaho supreme court, declaring their attitude toward the Progressive party in Idaho in general, and Messrs. Sheridan, Broxon and Cruzen in particular, as harking back to the days of the "Spanish Inquisition."

"These three judges," declared Mr. Smock, "have foolishly gone into the waters of prejudice beyond their depth and have come to wait until the unfolding tide of popular free government arises which will engulf them from the memory of men and courts of justice."

Lincoln Day Celebration. Mr. Smock is arranging for a big "Lincoln day Progressive celebration," to be held in Pocatello on Feb. 12, at

which meeting he has secured the promise of speeches from a number of men who are high up in the councils of the Progressive party. Among those already secured is Hon. Nephth Morris, the Progressive candidate for governor of Utah, who will speak on the topic of "Mormonism," and forever silence the alleged falsehood of the Idaho Progressives making war on the Mormon church. "We want every Mormon in Idaho who is a Progressive at heart to come into our party," declared Mr. Smock. "We have no thought of making this church or any other church an issue in the next campaign."

C. O. Broxon will speak on "The Supreme Court in Idaho." Colonel Ingersoll of Pocatello will have charge of the local arrangements, and it is expected the Pocatello rally will measure up to the big gathering held in the Owyhee last Monday.

BONDS ARE PROVIDED FOR LABOR LEADERS

San Francisco, Jan. 10.—Bail bonds in the sum of \$250,000 for the release of Olaf Tveitmo and Eugene Clancy, convicted dynamite conspirators, sentenced to six years in the federal prison, were accepted here today by the United States district court.

Tveitmo was president of the Asiatic Exclusion League and secretary of the California Building Trades Council, which furnished bonds through P. H. McCarthy, president of the council, and former mayor of San Francisco. Clancy was formerly an officer of the Structural Iron Workers' union. The government charged Tveitmo with having financed the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building by James B. McNamara, now serving a life term in San Quentin prison.

Two Women Lawmakers.

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 10.—Many important measures, the most of them aiming at social reforms, are slated for consideration and action at the session of the Washington legislature which will begin here Monday. For the first time in the history of this state women will have seats among the lawmakers. Two women—one a Progressive, the other a Republican, are included in the membership of the lower house.
