

## Senator Hart to Comply With the Terms of Senate's Resolution

An aftermath of the humorous by-play of last Saturday's session of the senate, when an anonymous resolution calling upon Senator Hart, president pro tem of the upper house to reward his supporters by giving them a dinner, occurred this morning when a communication from the senator from Fremont was read.

According to the communication, only those senators included in the original resolution as "supporters" of the president pro tem, are to be permitted to display their gracefulness in full dress.

The communication which was accepted by the senate with applause is as follows:

"Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I have had under consideration the resolution passed on Jan. 11, suggesting first, that I give a dinner to the Senators Fields, Haight, Hunt and Goodnight. This was amended to include all the senate, and the time was extended until I drew my mileage. I feel greatly honored by the unanimous good feeling expressed in my behalf by the adoption of the above resolution, and, in order to show my appreciation of the good will of such a body of high-classed gentlemen, who comprise the membership of this senate, I unhesitatingly respond to the requirements of the said resolution, with permission to extend the invitation to the lieutenant governor and the senate members of the press, with the understanding that the privilege of the members to appear in full dress shall be confined to Senators Fields, Hunt, Haight and Goodnight.

"The time and place when this dinner will be given is as follows: Jan. 14, 1913, at 9 o'clock p. m., at the Idaho hotel. Every member is most earnestly requested to be present promptly at that time, and no excuses will be accepted.

ing of legislation that will build good roads through all of the intermountain country.

J. A. Hendrickson, president of the organization, is planning for a bond issue of \$10,000,000 for Utah and expects to have the automobiles and others who use the roads to any considerable extent taxed to meet part of the issue.

## SHOOTING GROUNDS OF LOCAL CLUB WILL BE GREATLY IMPROVED

The finest shooting grounds in the northwest will be built at Hull's gulch when the local marksmen have worked out their plans, and have fixed up the property according to the present designs.

A club house, modern in every way, will have additional and new coats of paint. Concrete walks connecting the traps and the club house will be built and new ranges installed for the rifle club away from the bird men. The club plans to put in a range that will give the riflemen the 1000-yard target, and expects to divide up the distance so a large number may be shooting on the different ranges at the same time.

The grounds around the club will be worked over and filled in wherever they need it, while grass will be planted to make a lawn in front of the house, and the trees will be in a condition to produce a large amount of shade by the middle of the season this year.

On the grounds have been built concrete trap houses of a design used by no other club in the United States. The plans were worked out by the local men, and the houses built in a way to suit the local conditions. The boy who fills the trap is protected from the shot in the guns, as he never was under the system of wooden houses, while the operator has a better control of the machine, and the men on the firing line are better satisfied with the results.

The lights and sky lines on the new grounds make the place the ideal point in the state for the shoots of the clubs, and is being fixed up in a way that will give pointers to the other clubs when they send their delegations here for the next summer.

No United States senator is to be chosen at this session.

## FIGHTERS REST BEFORE BATTLE

Thompson and the Battling Dane Ready to Go at Forest Park.

It is "Just before the battle, mother," with Peter Jensen, the Battling Dane, and Maurice Thompson today. The finishing touches on a long course of hard and fast training will be finished. The men have been constantly at it since first they were matched for the bout. The training has been going on steadily through the afternoons before a crowd of fans who are getting excited over the prospects for one of the fastest fights that Boise has ever seen.

Both men worked out yesterday at the Natatorium, and took the last real work that they will have. Jensen still has the cold that he received the other day from his road work, but he is confident that he will be able to break it up, and that it will not interfere with him when he steps inside of the ring tomorrow night. He boxed with Al Fraser, who will meet Donk Flynn in the preliminary. His work yesterday convinced the fans that he is even a better man than he was when he fought here a year ago, and that his foot work has come up several points in the scale since his last battle in Boise.

Thompson takes everything seriously. He seems to mean business from the time that he takes the rope in his hand and goes through his first training exercise until he winds up in the last round on the daily fight with his manager. He does not talk, nor smile, nor throw out catchy jokes to the fans along the sides of the walls, but he goes into the work with all of the vim that there is in him until his manager calls "Time."

Both principals are well backed by the fans. The odds do not seem to be in favor of either just now, although all concede that Thompson will have a harder fight on his hands than he did when the Dane met him at Sheridan several years ago.

## KELLY AND ALLEN TO MEET AT TWIN FALLS

The Twin Falls Athletic club will see one of the fastest fights of the year in the local park on Jan. 23, when George Kelly and Yankee Allen enter the ring together. Articles of agreement have been signed between the fighters and the club, and an interesting bout has been arranged for that city on the 20th of this month.
