The second branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Michael's cathedral met on Wednesday afternoon at the home of its vice president, Miss Amelia Sonna. The meeting was largely attended and every member entered enthusiastically into the plans for future work. It was planned to serve a dinner at the Tuttle church house on or about Feb. 6. The dean of the cathedral addressed the auxiliary on the work of the general convention, speaking particularly of the great advance in missionary activity throughout the church; also of the church pageant illustrative of different events in church history.

The cathedral choir is at work on a special musical service to be rendered on Sunday evening, Feb. 11. Those who attended the musical service given last November will remember with pleasure the beautiful rendition of anthems and other musical selections. An offering was at that time taken for work among the choir boys.

There will be no meeting of the first branch of the auxiliary during the coming week, Wednesday being the fifth Wednesday of the month. The regular meeting days are the first and third Wednesdays.

The banner classes in the Sunday school last Sunday were Mrs. Hollingshead's, Mrs. Roe's, Miss Tilden's and Mrs. Johnesse's. We are in need of additional teachers. Who will volunteer?

Choir rehearsals for the boys are held every Tuesday and Friday afternoons at 4 p. m., and Saturday morning at 11 a. m., in the choir room. If the parents of our boys could realize the tremendous influence of the church music and services upon their children's lives, we are sure they would never let them miss a rehearsal.

The dean will use this column so kindly placed at his disposal to make mention from time to time of important facts connected with the life of St. Michael's cathedral. The following item is from the first parish records, and will prove of considerable interest:

"On Aug. 7, 1864, the Rev. St. Michael Fackler arrived from Oregon in Boise City and held the first services of the church in the adobe building on Idaho street, opposite the Statesman office."

The following item is from the Statesman of Sept. 3, 1866: "On September 2, 1866, was held the first service in Old St. Michael's church. In his first sermon Rev. Mr. Fackler said: 'Brethren, I congratulate you on this occasion, when we occupy for the first time, this church, so far completed by the liberality of the people of Boise. It is proper that I should here state that the contract price for the building is \$2000. Some additional work will cost about \$50. To meet this we have subscriptions to the amount of \$750, and the ladies of the aid society, with commendable zeal, have raised \$975. We have the promise of more subscriptions, and we hope soon to raise the balance needed, about \$355."

"It is now a little over two years since we began public religious service in Boise City, and in that time we have used seven different places, more or less inconvenient. We began in the little adobe building, opposite the Statesman office, with its dirt floor and slab seats. "We think we can well report progress when we compare that building to this, and we hope that after these two years of struggling the progress of the Episcopal church will be even more encouraging as her distinctive features of doctrines, policy and worship become better known."
