

# BRANDS STORY HE WILL RESIGN MALICIOUS LIE

Director of Farm Markets Declares He Has Never Considered Quitting His Office, Although He Has Received Many Offers.

## PART OF SCHEME OF SPECIAL INTERESTS

Says Attempt Being Made by Those Who Have Robbed Both Producers and Consumers to Undermine Work Being Done.

Boise, Monday, Jan. 29. Editor Capital News: I have read with much interest the leading article on page two of the Sunday Capital News under the heading, "Scholtz May Resign as Head of Market Bureau." "May Become Identified With Large Marketing Organization—Active Work Being Done in Behalf of the Aspirants." Although the article is complimentary to the efforts I have put forth in behalf of Idaho's farmers, I desire to take this opportunity to nail as a malicious lie the rumor that I am contemplating resigning my position as state director of farm markets. The circulation of this rumor over the state is simply part of an organized effort among certain interests to get me out of office. Because I have fearlessly exposed and attacked those who have robbed both the producers and consumers of Idaho for many years, it is now proposed to undermine my work by circulating the rumor over the state that I am contemplating resigning, thus bringing discredit on me for considering, through such resignation, the leaving of the farmers in the lurch at this hour when they are in need of every atom of experience and information that I have had an opportunity to gather in their behalf during the past two years.

## SCHEME OF VICIOUS INTERESTS.

The farmers over the state realize that any new man in this position will require the major portion of his first term getting familiar with all conditions and laying plans for working out remedies for present market evils. If the vicious interests who have preyed on Idaho producers and consumers in the past can succeed in getting a new man at the head of this department every two years they will easily prevent the office from reaching its maximum efficiency. Some of the men mentioned in your article, as persons in whose behalf inducements have been sent to the governor for the position in case I resign, are the best friends I have in Idaho and I am sure those men are innocent of the treacherous back of the rumor that is being circulated. A number of my friends have for some time known of various offers that have come to me at considerably larger salary than this state position pays; but I have assured them, in every instance, that although I might be called upon to make a financial sacrifice in order to continue the work that I intended to "carry by the ship" and secure for Idaho growers and consumers the relief to which they are entitled. My friends know that I have put my heart and soul into this work, that no one in the state employ has worked longer hours, under greater handicaps, or with less thought of financial reward.

## WORKED UNDER SURFACE.

This organized effort of the predatory interests and their friends to get me out of office started a long time ago, but they have been too shrewd to come out in the open with their attacks. They have worked under the surface in various ways and have sometimes used innocent parties to further their efforts. In the last political campaign they were particularly active in their efforts to create friction, principally through the circulation of a campaign card to the effect that I was secretly working against the state administration in my travels over the state. If I had conducted the farm markets department in a perfunctory manner, without offending those who have wax-

ed fat off the illegitimate profits extracted from both producers and consumers, no effort whatever would be made at this time to "get" me. ## TWO MILE LIMIT BILL FOR CATTLE

Editor Capital News: There was introduced in the senate Friday morning as senate bill No. 67, a measure of great importance to the small stock growers of the state. It provides for the formation of grazing districts in which a settlement of 25 or more bona fide resident land owners can form a grazing district, containing not more than what would be a two mile limit around the district in which they would be protected from outside stock. It provides for the election of five directors who shall have the power to regulate the grazing within the district and shall issue permits to those living in the district and the preference right to graze shall be based upon the amount of winter feed which each ranch producer, thus protecting the range for the settler whose property is dependent upon it.

As the laws now are, there is no sort of regulation or protection whatever to a man living in a range section of the country from the invasion of an unlimited amount of migratory stock. It is a free pitch in for all with the result that about three-fourths of what was formerly good range is fast becoming a desert, to the great injury of the state and the livestock industry in general and especially to the bill sections where the only chance a man has to make a decent living is to raise a few head of cattle or stock of some kind. And he should have the right to the range immediately adjoining for some years large stock men have made a practice of driving their stock in unlimited numbers into sections where homesteaders are endeavoring to make homes. I believe as Senator Borah said, that there is no use to which the public domain can be put to better use than the making of homes upon it. (Cows) go into the valleys and districts and gather up large herds of cattle and drive them into the hills to summer, at from \$1 to \$2 per head in unlimited numbers and with no sort of regulation so that the range is constantly overstocked and is soon tramped out and destroyed, making a permanent injury to the range and the water shed. The amount of brush and grass in the hills regulate the melting of the snow. The amount of moisture in the air depends a great deal on the amount of vegetation on the ground. Therefore, it is as necessary to protect the range as it is the forest. If the amount of stock allowed to run on the range is properly regulated it can be improved and preserved for posterity otherwise it will become a desert as it is in some sections now.

# CREATION OF LAKE COUNTY PROVIDED FOR IN MEASURE

Bill Introduced in the State Senate Takes Territory Away From Kootenai and Bonner Counties.

A bill providing for the creation of Lake county was introduced in the senate this morning by Senator W. S. Walker of Boundary county. The proposed county will include within its boundaries approximately five townships in the southern part of Bonner county, and approximately 10 townships in the northern part of Kootenai county, according to the provisions of the bill.

The territory taken from Bonner county has an assessed valuation of \$1,766,574, leaving in that county an assessed valuation of \$16,910,368.

The valuation of the property taken from Kootenai county amounts to approximately \$4,602,614, leaving in that county a property valuation of \$13,991,982, which will make a total valuation in the proposed county of Lake of \$6,369,488.

The present area of Bonner county is 1872 square miles and the territory to be taken from it involves an area of less than 200 square miles. Kootenai's present area is 1490 square miles, and the territory asked from it for the new county is less than 400 square miles. This will give the new county an area of nearly 600 square miles.

## MEETS ALL REQUIREMENTS.

The idea of any injustice being perpetrated upon either Bonner or Kootenai county, by taking territory from each of these two counties, is eliminated, according to the contentions of the advocates of the proposed county, because of the fact that, each would be left with sufficient area, as well as valuation, to rank with the largest and richest counties within the state. Upon the other hand, they declare that the new county of Lake would have over 50 per cent more area, and in excess of six times the valuation required by the constitution for the creation of a new county.

One of their strongest arguments, however, is the inconvenience of the present county seats of Bonner and Kootenai counties, to a majority of the people residing within the proposed new county. At present this inconvenience necessitates a large number of the residents of that section traveling, either by way of Spokane to reach Coeur d'Alene, the county seat of Kootenai county, or by way of Newport, Wash., to reach Sandpoint, the county seat of Bonner county. In the event, however, of the creation of the new county, 95 per cent of the residents can drive by team or wagon to Spirit Lake, the proposed county seat of the new county, and return home the same day.

## NO COURT HOUSE.

The opposition to the creation of the new county has not the merit its advocates claim, that has characterized the opposition to county division in any other county in the state, from the viewpoint of vast expenditures having been made in the way of public buildings, for notwithstanding that Kootenai county is one of the oldest counties in the state, it has no court house or public buildings, but has been compelled to rent a building for its government and through inefficiency and misfeasance upon the part of its officers, has created an indebtedness of approximately \$200,000.

Upon the other hand they point to the fact that when the present county of Bonner, originally a part of Kootenai county, withdrew from that county, it assumed an indebtedness of approximately \$70,000, but due to efficient and economical administrations, it has not only eliminated that indebtedness but has constructed and paid for, a magnificent county building and also purchased a county farm.

## DEVELOPMENT RETARDED.

The citizens of the two sections of the proposed county claim that they are unable to secure representation in their respective county governments, and as a consequence they are unable to accomplish road and other improvements and the general development of this section has thereby been retarded. At the recent general election a vote was taken upon this issue and in the territory of Kootenai county embraced in the proposed county, practically 80 per cent of the votes cast were in favor of its creation. In Bonner county where petitions were circulated asking for the submission of the issue to the voters at the general election, 168 out of a possible 191 voters signed the petitions, but its submission was prevented.

# INSTITUTIONS TO GIVE ACCOUNTING OF ALL THE FUNDS

Bill Pending in Legislature Requires That Monthly Statements Be Given Showing Sources of Revenue.

There will be a strict account of all moneys received by state institutions, other than money appropriated by the legislature, in the future, if a bill introduced in the house is passed, which is very likely. Many of these institutions received federal funds. The bill requires a monthly statement to be filed showing the sources of the revenue and the amount received.

The purpose of the measure is to remedy and prevent duplication of a situation that arose in one of the state institutions, it is said. Federal funds received had been through carelessness or inferior bookkeeping placed in the wrong account and did not show on the books.

The bill says in part:

"All funds or moneys received by any state institution under the supervision, direction or control of the state of Idaho, or of any state boards or any officers or officials of the state of Idaho received by said institutions from any source whatsoever, shall be paid monthly by such institutions or their superintendents or executive officers into the state treasury of the state of Idaho; and every such institution receiving funds or having any income from any source whatsoever other than from appropriations specifically made for and on behalf of said institutions by the legislature of the state of Idaho, or federal aid received from the government of the United States, shall make monthly reports of such income and the sources thereof to the state treasurer of the state of Idaho and shall transmit with each monthly report the funds received by said institutions during the period the funds received by said institutions during the period covered by said report. Said reports shall show in detail the income so received and the sources from which it has been received, and shall be sworn to by the executive officers of the institution making the report. Said reports shall be made in triplicate, and in addition to the copy forwarded to the state treasurer, a copy shall be forwarded to the governor and a copy to the state auditor.

"All moneys so received by the state treasurer from any state institution, shall be set apart to the credit of the institution paying the same into the state treasury, and the same is hereby appropriated for the use and benefit of the institution paying the same, and said moneys so deposited is hereby appropriated to said institution, in addition to all other funds that may be appropriated thereto, and the funds so created shall be disbursed for and in behalf of the respective state institutions to whose credit they are placed, on vouchers properly drawn and approved by the state board of examiners."
