

RETIREES FROM ARMY BECAUSE OF DISABILITY

Captain George Steunenberg, Brother of Late Governor of Idaho, Known as the Army Poet, on Retired List.

MANY REBUKES FOR WRITING OF POEMS

Satirical References to Rulers of the Old World Caused Embarrassment to United States on Number of Occasions.

Captain George Steunenberg, brother of the late Governor Frank Steunenberg of Idaho, has been retired from the United States army because of disability. Captain Steunenberg, whose former home was in Caldwell, attracted wide attention because of some of his satirical poetry. The New York Post has the following about the Idaho man's retirement:

"The active list of the army loses its poet in the retirement for disability of Captain George Steunenberg. Twenty-fifth infantry, who has been in ill health following a nervous breakdown two years ago. The active list probably has had no officer who has written so many widely read poems as Captain Steunenberg. No officer has been rebuked so many times for his satirical references to the European armies, and also for his criticisms of the American army. Captain Steunenberg once said that he was not popular in the army because he talked too much. He is a brother of the late Governor Steunenberg of Idaho, who was assassinated several years ago.

START OF HIS ARMY CAREER.

"When he was 22 years old Captain Steunenberg had a desire for service in the navy, and applied for the position of stoker. He did his work so well that when he was mustered out he was an engineer yeoman and a finely educated young man for one of his opportunities.

"At the beginning of the war with Spain he was living in Idaho, and was appointed a second lieutenant in the First Volunteer Infantry of that state. When the regiment was mustered out in September, 1899, Steunenberg was a captain.

HIS RISE FROM PRIVATE.

"Steunenberg liked the army so well that he refused to go back to civilian life, and six weeks after he was mustered out Captain Steunenberg was a private in the Eleventh United States Volunteer cavalry. He was soon made a corporal, then a sergeant, and finally first sergeant of troop A. In December, 1900, he became a first lieutenant in the Forty-eighth United States volunteer infantry, and was appointed first lieutenant in the Thirtieth cavalry in February, 1901. He did not accept the commission until October in that year, and in 1908 went to the Twenty-eighth infantry. He received his captaincy in the Seventeenth infantry in 1911, and was transferred to the Twenty-fifth infantry a year later. His retirement is a real loss to the arm."

El Paso, Tex., Feb. 23.—Carranza forces under Colonel Salvador Chapa and a body of Villistas commanded by Jose Ynez Salazar engaged in a battle near Boca Grandes, a short distance south of the New Mexico border, yesterday. The battle was in progress for several hours. Salazar's forces finally defeating the government troops and driving them eastward.

GALLS ATTEMPT TO PASS ANTI-ALIEN BILL A MISTAKE

Ex-Governor Gooding Regrets Agitation on Subject at Time When Country Faces International Crisis

Hon. F. R. Gooding of Gooding, who is in the city, in talking of the present legislation, said he felt the attempt to pass the anti-alien land ownership act was unfortunate. "The re-introduction of the bill in the senate," said Mr. Gooding, "was a mistake. To my mind this is a very serious matter. This is no time to rock the boat. The country is facing a crisis in its history of which no one is able to see the end. Any day may bring us into war with Germany and all her allies. In the face of such a crisis it becomes the duty of every American citizen to stand squarely behind the president. Through the attorney general he has expressed his disapproval of such legislation at this time. We must give him credit for understanding the situation, and the man or legislative assembly that would knowingly embarrass the national administration would be committing a serious offense against the peace and dignity of the nation. I have too much confidence in the men who compose our legislature to believe they will do this. Nor do I look upon alien ownership of Idaho lands as being any great menace, requiring immediate action."

STATE DIVISION.

"I have been watching with a good deal of interest," said Mr. Gooding, "the efforts of some of the members of the legislature toward division of the state. The whole situation to my mind is unfortunate. The impossibility of carrying out the plan to divide the state should be apparent. Except in the case of Virginia no state has ever been divided. The creation of West Virginia was strictly a war measure. We need no division of Idaho. What we do need is loyalty to the state and its institutions. Unfortunately there is too often a disposition to attack the university or some other northern institution. This is unfortunate for the whole state. We should all realize these institutions are all permanently established. There should be no division or impairment of any of them."

IMPORTANCE OF HIGHWAYS.

"The present legislature, I believe, should do something to bring about the completion and development of the north and south highway, giving better communication between the various sections of the state, and should certainly stand behind all its institutions whether in north or south Idaho. If these things are done the present spirit of discontent which finds expression in a desire to tear down or apart, would soon be forgotten."

HARD TIMES AHEAD FOR BOYS WHO LIKE NIP OCCASIONALLY

Washington, Feb. 23.—When the Reed "bone-dry" law goes into effect, the boys who "don't drink as a regular thing but like a nip occasionally," the occasion ranging anywhere from 15 weeks to 15 minutes, are going to have a hard time.

Prohibitionists in congress today insisted on the law prohibiting shipment of liquor in interstate commerce into prohibition states, will cover the introduction of liquor in any form (except internally) and by any possible means, including by foot, horseback, submarine or aeroplane.

The "bone-dry" allusion to the law is interpreted literally. Prohibitionists insist "absolutely" as applied to the exclusion "means ABSOLUTELY."

The body was found several hours after death had come, in Selleck's room at the Union League club, where the financier made his home.
