

DIVISION BILL PASSED BY THE LOWER HOUSE

Measure Creating Bear River County Out of Bannock Goes Through at Night Session by Vote of 31 to 23.

HERD DISTRICT BILL MEETS ITS DEFEAT

Measure to Which Small Farmers Objected Lost—Bill Giving the Governor Power to Remove His Appointees Approved.

Another proposed new county came up smiling last night in the house of representatives. It was Bear River, seeking to be cut out of Bannock county, and was passed by the lower house at the night session by a vote of 31 to 23. The Bannock county delegation divided on the merits of the measure. Lehbas, who introduced it, championed the bill. He had the backing of Richards, Thatcher, the third member of the delegation, was outspoken in his opposition to the division issue. The house was in a very pleasant frame of mind, however, and although a number of members managed to escape voting either for or against, there was a sufficient majority present to pass it, and it was ordered transmitted to the senate.

PASS ADMINISTRATION BILL.

The administration measure giving to the governor power to remove subordinates of his appointees for cause, or house bill No. 128, was passed by a vote of 36 to 24. Bennett, Kent and Young, three Republicans voting with the Democrats for its passage. Peckham, Democrat, voted with the minority. Minority Leader McGowan moved a call of the house, which was granted. Four representatives were brought into the chambers by the sergeant-at-arms and as many more missing could not be found. In spirit of levity Driscoll, Lewis, Quinlan and Giles were lined up before the speaker's desk, where the speaker fined them a sum not less than sufficient to fill two vases with flowers to be placed on opposite sides of the speaker's desk. The speaker held that truancy was becoming so prevalent that it was becoming contagious. The flowers are to remove the disagreeable thoughts of truancy.

the feeding of stray stock, allowing feeders 15 cents per head. House bill No. 218, by Eames—Annexing part of Fremont county to Madison county. House bill No. 254, by Welsh—Giving directors of irrigation districts organized in this and adjoining states power to unite in the purchase, acquisition or construction of an irrigation district. Senate bill No. 18, by Pettibone—Providing county boards of health shall inspect county jails and court houses.

House bill No. 260, by Shearer—Making it a misdemeanor for any person to cause any child under 18 years of age to become delinquent or to aid in his delinquency. Senate bill No. 85, by Hill—Providing penalty from \$25 to \$300 for adulterating gasoline and other oils.

House bill No. 87, by Jones and McMullen—Providing highway districts shall receive 50 per cent and the county 10 per cent of all road and bridge taxes collected within a highway district. House bill No. 128, by Krebs, Anderson of Canyon, Richards and Cannon—Empowering the governor to remove his appointees for cause.

House bill No. 153, by Lehbas—Creating the county of Bear River out of territory taken from the east half of Bannock county and naming the town of Soda Springs as the county seat.

BILLS KILLED.

The following bills were killed: House bill No. 132, by the committee on livestock—Amending the herd district law requiring consent of majority residents of voting precincts within proposed district. RECOMMEND BOND ISSUE. The late afternoon session of the house was devoted to consideration of the \$1,000,000 bond issue bill for good roads which was recommended for passage. An attempt made to segregate \$100,000 of that amount for the building of bridges was defeated. The house recommended for passage that measure and the state departments' appropriation bill carrying a total of \$463,980, after an unsuccessful attempt had been made to strike from the latter a provision that all state institutions shall account for all moneys received from the sale of livestock or produce raised on the institution farms. Consent must be secured from the state board of examiners to sell this produce.

CALIFORNIA BEHIND IDAHO IN BUSINESS

"Trees are in blossom and the grass is green in the Sacramento valley in California, but in a business way, California does not seem as prosperous as Idaho and there is but little real estate moving there."
