

MARKET BILLS NOW READY FOR THE GOVERNOR

Measures Seeking to Strengthen the Farm Bureau, Previously Approved by House, Passed by the Senate.

COLLECTION OF DATA BY THE ASSESSORS

Power to Inspect Books and Accounts of Farm Organizations Placed in Hands of Director—Licensing of Creameries Provided.

The series of farm market bills seeking to strengthen the state farm market bureau and the farm market director by licensing creameries, cheese factories and threshers, providing that assessors shall collect agricultural and horticultural data and giving the director power to inspect the books and accounts of farm organizations, passed the senate and will be sent to the governor for his approval. All of the bills were amended in the house of representatives before passage and transmission to the senate.

BILLS PASSED.

Bills passed by the senate Friday afternoon follow:

Senate bill No. 159, by Pincock, Davis, Eames, Heiss and Atherton—An act amending the drainage law.

Senate bill No. 27, by Randall—Relating to assessment and taxation.

Senate bill No. 180, by committee on agriculture—Preventing fraud in the sale of agricultural seed.

Senate bill No. 194, by Mitchell—Prohibiting county officials from buying delinquent tax certificates.

House bill No. 60, by committee on agriculture and horticulture—Requiring county assessors to certain agricultural data.

House bill No. 61, by committee on agriculture and horticulture—Requiring threshermen and seed hullers to register with the director of farm markets and procure licenses.

House bill No. 62, by committee on agriculture and horticulture—Prohibiting price discrimination in the purchase or sale of agricultural products.

House bill No. 63, by committee on agriculture and horticulture—Relating to the duties and powers of the director of farm markets.

House bill No. 65, by committee on agriculture and horticulture—Requiring all incorporated co-operative associations of farmers to keep their accounts in a manner acceptable to the director of farm markets.

House bill No. 67, by committee on agriculture and horticulture—Requiring promoters of creameries, cheese factories and condensaries to register with the director of farm markets.

House bill No. 89, by Moody—Requiring one year's residence in Idaho to make one eligible to file suit for divorce.

House bill No. 336, by Newport—Providing appropriation of \$15,000 for Steunenberg memorial monument.

Senate bill No. 61, by Mitchell—Providing for mining under the corporate limits of a city, town or village. This bill applies particularly to Wardner, in Shoshone county.

SENATORS ABANDON EFFORT TO REPEAL THE UTILITIES ACT

The fight on the public utilities commission has been abandoned. Senator Cummings of Bannock county Friday afternoon asked for unanimous consent to withdraw senate bills Nos. 135 and 136, the first seeking to repeal the convenience and necessity clause of the law and the second to amend section 48 so as to provide for regulated competition. withdrawn. Senator Cummings stated that it was too late in the session to attempt to debate the merits of the measures.

There is still pending before the legislature bills that seek to give the commission supervision over the securities of public utilities operating in Idaho, thereby greatly strengthening the commission. It became apparent to those watching the contest before the legislature, that the fight to repeal some of the important provisions of the commission act, would fail. Another bill pending having passed the senate, is the Thomas measure seeking to remove from the jurisdiction of the commission supervision over municipal utilities. The house the other day also passed a second bill seeking to exclude from the jurisdiction of the commission mutual and non-profit telephone companies. A similar bill had previously passed the house but was killed in the senate.

IDAHO SPUDS USED AS MONEY; VALUED AT 3 1/2 CENTS EACH

The Omaha Bee in a recent issue prints a story of Idaho spuds being used in Chicago as money, the tubers being exchanged for taxi-cab rides, street car fare and the purchase of merchandise, their value being 3 1/2 cents each. The article is as follows:

Chicago, Feb. 23.—A newspaper reporter using a basket as a purse and potatoes as money, had little difficulty today in getting about and in making purchases. The potatoes were from Idaho and valued at retail at 3 1/2 cents each.

The cashier of a moving picture show accepted three of them for a ticket. A street car conductor declined them as fare, but the conversation attracted the attention of a passenger, who offered to buy the whole supply at the rate of two for a nickel.

A taxicab chauffeur accepted six for a ride of two blocks. "If the company won't accept them, I'll pay the fare and take them home myself," he explained. At a five and ten-cent store, the reporter bought two "diamonds" and a picture frame with his tubers.

PLAN TO REVISE THE CONSTITUTION GIVEN APPROVAL OF HOUSE

The proposed constitutional convention to revise the constitution of this state, was approved by the house of representatives Friday afternoon when senate joint resolution No. 2 providing an amendment to the constitution authorizing the convening of the convention, was passed by a vote of 47 to 11. At the same time the house passed a companion amendment to the constitution limiting the number of delegates entitled to seats in it if it is called as equal to the number of members in the house of representatives. The latter amendment cuts the representation in two, as provision is now made that the membership shall be twice as large as the most populous branch of the legislature. It is held this is too large a body; that half the number is large enough and gives proper representation.

COUNTY ENABLING ACT DEFEATED IN THE LOWER HOUSE

Power of the Creation of New Counties to Remain in the Hands of the Legislature.

Apparently the house of representatives believes that the legislature can better stand the county division contest than the counties themselves, for by a decisive vote Friday afternoon it killed the Peckham general county enabling act. This bill proposed that where a portion of a county seceded or sought to secede from the parent county, the commissioners could handle the matter through the proper kind of an election following the filing of petitions. Every legislative session county division is the principal medium for log-rolling. That has been true of former sessions as well as the present one. The division issues have occupied the valuable time of the legislature and have caused not a little bitterness. All this the Peckham bill sought to remove so far as the legislature was concerned.

When the bill came up on third reading Representative Peckham explained the purpose of the measure at length. Sims of Twin Falls immediately took exceptions to the act. He held it to be a piece of vicious legislation which would, if it became a law, only seek to embroil counties in constant division fights. Lucas of Adams took the same attitude. Goehry of Owyhee was against it, he said. McMurray moved that it be indefinitely postponed and the motion prevailed.

The house also killed senate bill No. 104, by Wedgewood relating to filing of annual statements of corporations with the secretary of state.

BILLS PASSED.

The following bills were passed: Senate joint resolution—Submitting a constitutional amendment to call a constitutional convention to revise the state constitution.

House joint resolution—Submitting a constitutional convention fixing representation in constitutional on bases of total number of representatives in lower house of representatives.

House bill No. 331, by Kiger—Empowering mayor and city councils may install sewer systems and sewer disposal work.

Senate bill No. 76, by Curtis—Prohibiting use of trading stamps except when proper license is secured.

House bill No. 190, by Lewis and Kiger—Prohibiting the carrying of concealed weapons without a permit.

House bill No. 214, by committee on agriculture and horticulture—Providing for the issuance of tax deeds for delinquent taxes for the year 1917 and subsequent years.

SENATE APPROVES BILL FOR MONUMENT TO STEUNENBERG.

A marble monument to the memory of Frank Steunenberg, ex-governor of Idaho, assassinated by the placing of a bomb at the gate of his home in Caldwell, will be erected at some place in Idaho to be selected by a commission to be appointed by the governor. The senate Friday approved the house bill so providing through a \$15,000 appropriation. Until the commission is appointed and has organized the place for the monument to stand will not be known. It is probable it will be erected either in the former governor's home city, Caldwell, where he met his death, or given an honored place near the state capitol building in Boise.
