

# MAYOR STANDS BEHIND POLICE CAPTAIN'S ACT

### Declares Colored Woman Came to Boise Admittedly to Conduct House of Ill-Repute.

## WARM PRAISE FOR OFFICER'S CONDUCT

### Chief Executive of City Heartily and Publicly Commends Him for Efforts Put Forth "to Keep This Community in a Proper Course."

Mayor Hays announced this morning that he stood squarely behind Captain Van Dorn in his action taken in regard to Minnie Smith, colored, being ordered from Boise. His statement concerning the affair is as follows:

"A colored woman of ill-repute came from Pocatello to Boise for the purpose, she stated to me, of pursuing her vocation and being near her husband who is confined in the penitentiary for manslaughter. Being arrested for an offense she was released on the understanding that she would leave town. Time was given her to sell some of her belongings, which she wished to dispose of here.

"Captain Van Dorn has my entire confidence and I wish publicly to express to him my appreciation of his efforts to keep this community in a proper course.

"The present attack upon Captain Van Dorn is merely an effort by a certain element to keep this woman in the community."

### SMITH WOMAN'S AFFIDAVIT.

The dismissal of Charles Van Dorn, night captain of the Boise police force, was asked in an affidavit filed with the city clerk Friday afternoon by W. A. Ricks, attorney for Minnie Smith, a negroess. According to the affidavit made by the Smith woman, the night captain summoned her to police headquarters on the afternoon of Feb. 5 and in rough language ordered her to leave the city. Upon her refusal, she says she was kept in jail until Tuesday morning before being fed.

The following Friday at 9 o'clock at night she was taken from the cell before Van Dorn and asked if she wanted a trial. Van Dorn stating that she did, Van Dorn informed her he would see to it that she was given 90 days in the same cell or one week to get out of the city. Fearing his threat, the Smith woman states, she promised to leave. She next consulted an attorney, who informed her she could remain in Boise and advised her to do so. On Feb. 27 she was again arrested and taken before Van Dorn, who gave her until the next day to leave Boise for good, according to her statement.

In the affidavit the Smith woman gives the names of women in Boise for whom she works, declares that the charges made against her by Van Dorn are untrue and asks his dismissal from the force.
