GRAIN WAREHOUSES AND ELEVATORS IN THE BOISE VALLEY

Committee Named at Meeting at Eagle to Arrange for the Purchase of Property for Building.

Eagle, March 8.—Grain warehouses and grain elevators are very strongly forecasted as factors in the near future for the protection of the farmers of the Boise valley in the way of making provision for holding their products for a favorable market through the action of the farmers at the county meeting of the Farmers' Union, which was held here yesterday. In fact, tentative plans for the establishment of a grain warehouse at this place are now under way for the accomplishment of this purpose, and as the initial movement for its consummation, a committee consisting of H. J. Renk of this place, R. G. Lyons of Spring Hill and D. J. Clemmens of Brookside were appointed at the meeting of yesterday to confer with Mrs. Mary J. Aikens, of this place, relative to the purchase of three lots for the site of the warehouse.

THOROUGHLY ORGANIZED.

Throughout southern Idaho, and especially in Ada and Canyon counties, have the farmers awakened to a complete realization of the great possibilities presented them through organization and well formulated methods for the promotion and protection of their interests. "Organization and thorough co-operation" appears to be the slogan of every farming community. Never before in the history of Ada and Canyon counties has there been such a measure of concerted action among their farmers, and the present trend of development is highly prophetic of their purpose to make themselves felt as a very potent factor in state governmental matters, legislative procedure and all phases of marketing.


