

# ETO AXE FALLS IN THREE BILLS; OUR APPROVED

enate Measure Regulating Proxies in State and County Conventions Fails to Meet With the Governor's Approbation.

## BILL REGULATING LAND SALES KILLED

Measure Providing for the Elimination of Agricultural Lands From Cities, Towns and Villages of the State Signed.

Governor Alexander Saturday night signed four and vetoed three bills passed by the legislature. Of the bills signed probably the most important is the Peckham house bill No. 144 providing for the elimination of agricultural lands from cities, towns and villages. He also signed the house measure relating to dissolution of irrigation districts, increasing the salary of chief deputy state bank examiner and allowing railroad employes to use railroad passes.

The chief executive vetoed house bill No. 216 which sought to regulate the sale of state land by prohibiting the sale of any leased lands under cultivation by a lessee who is a bona fide resident; senate bill No. 88 regulating proxies in state and county conventions and senate bill No. 165 seeking to regulate the interest received from daily balances of state moneys deposited in banks by requiring the interest received shall be credited by the state treasurer to the accounts of the several funds forming the principal upon which such interest is computed. The governor's veto messages as

transmitted to the secretary of state are as follows:

### RELATING TO LEASED LANDS.

"I transmit herewith house bill No. 216 without my approval. "This bill seeks to regulate the sale of state land by prohibiting the sale of any leased lands under cultivation by a lessee who is an actual bona fide resident upon such land within two years of the expiration of the term of the lease under which it is so occupied. "After careful consideration of this provision of the bill, I have reached the conclusion that it would be impossible for the land department of the state to sell any leased lands during the term for which it is leased, and such provision would be an injustice both to the state and to the prospective purchasers of state lands, and that its results would be generally detrimental, therefore, my signature is withheld and the bill is not approved."

### REGULATING PROXIES.

"I herewith return senate bill No. 88. This bill seeks to amend section 29 of the direct primary law, as amended in 1911 and 1913. The amendments contained in the attached bill make two changes in the existing law: "First—The use of proxies is prohibited in meetings of county central committees, except when held by electors of the precincts represented by proxy. "Second—The use of proxies in meetings of state central committees is prohibited, except when held by electors of the counties represented by proxy. "There is an additional amendment in the attached bill, but it in no way changes the present law and practice. This is a provision to the effect that proxies shall not be allowed in state conventions, but the members of the delegation from each county in actual attendance, shall be entitled to cast the full vote of the delegation. This is the present law as to state platform conventions."

### WOULD DENY REPRESENTATION.

"In my opinion the effect of the bill, if approved, would be to deny representation in county and state committee meetings to certain precincts and counties in a great many instances. All meetings of the state committees are held at the state capital, and state committees from remote counties, such as Lemhi, Teton, Boundary, etc., must travel hundreds of miles at considerable expense to be in attendance. These counties should not be denied the right to be represented in such meetings by proxies held by persons who can be in attendance. If this bill is approved, such counties either will not be represented or will be represented by persons whose expenses to

Boise are paid by persons and interests desirous of securing control of party organizations and who are willing to expend money for that purpose.

"Under the statutes of the state of Idaho, a citizen has the absolute right to give to any other person a power of attorney authorizing him to perform any act or acts as fully and with as much legal effect as if performed by the person himself. "If a man has the right to authorize another person to convey his realty or satisfy a mortgage, or perform other acts of importance, he certainly should have the right to authorize another person to represent him at a political committee meeting, and I am therefore, compelled to withhold my signature and approval from this bill."

### CREDITING INTEREST.

"I am transmitting herewith senate bill No. 165 without my approval. "This bill seeks to regulate the interest received from daily balances of state moneys deposited in banks of this state by requiring that interest received shall be credited by the state treasurer to the account of the several funds forming the principal upon which such interest is computed. No good purpose can be accomplished by such a measure which would result in great confusion in the keeping of the accounts of the state treasurer's office. It can make no essential difference to any state institution, whether educational, penal or charitable, whether the moneys received for its support and maintenance come from direct appropriation or from the small income that might be received through the deposit of those funds temporarily in the banks of the state."

### DOES NOT AFFECT TAXES.

"It will not increase nor will it decrease the tax bill of the people one way or the other. If the money is placed in the general fund as at present, it will be taken from that fund by appropriation of the legislature for the benefit of these institutions which is the only purpose that could be served by adding the small interest received, to the endowment income of such institutions."

"The idea of the legislature seems to have been that in some manner or other the different institutions of the state are separate and distinct from the state itself, whereas, they are only a part of the state and any moneys going toward their support come from the general purse and no harm is done to any such institution if moneys received are placed into that general purse and taken out by a legislative appropriation."

### BILLS SIGNED.

The following bills were signed by the governor:

House bill No. 314—Providing for the modification and dissolution of irrigation districts.

House bill No. 312—Making one of two deputies appointed by the state bank examiner a chief deputy whose salary shall be raised to \$2700 per annum and providing for appeals from decisions of the examiner.

House bill No. 272—Allowing railroads to issue passes to any member of the legislature who is an actual and bona fide employe of a railroad, but prohibiting such employe, if a member of the legislature, to use the pass traveling to and from the place where the legislature is in session.

House bill No. 144—Providing for elimination of agricultural lands from cities, towns and villages.


