

RICKARD SEES END OF BOXING IN METROPOLIS

Western Promoter Says the Game Is in Disrepute in New York and Will Not Be Able to Stand Much Longer.

CANNOT REGAIN ITS FORMER STANDING

In Other Parts of Country, However, Boxing Stands on a Firmer Footing Than Ever Before, in the Opinion of Old Timer.

New York, March 23.—Tex Rickard, veteran promoter of boxing contests, today told the United Press the end of boxing in New York state is so near he can almost feel it. Even if Governor Whitman, in the opinion of Rickard, should suddenly relent in his avowed intention of crushing the game in this state, the sport has been given such a black eye that it never would grow.

This, of course, indicates beyond a shadow of doubt that Rickard, stager of sensational matches, no longer is to be considered as a factor in moving for big bouts in this city or state.


CANNOT GET THE CROWDS.

Rickard pointed out the unfavorable publicity the game has received of late and added that no one could expect the high class and large crowds of old to attend contests here.

"There is no attraction, no matter how great, in the boxing world," the promoter said, "that would be worth a man's while in New York. The attendance would be so small money would be lost on any great venture in the sport. A Moran-Willard bout such as I staged a year ago, would not draw enough money to pay expenses, and the world knows I lost no money on that affair."

Rickard hastened to add that it is not his impression that the antics of a few of the boxing crowd in this city have had any effect on the rest of the country. On the contrary, he believes boxing stands on a firmer footing in many localities right now than ever.


