

RATE DECISION MEANS MUCH TO LIVESTOCK MEN

Action of Interstate Commerce Commission in the "Los Angeles Case" of Far-reaching Effect in Idaho.

SHORT LINE RATES HELD UNREASONABLE

Lower Tariffs on Hogs, Calves, Sheep and Goats From Points in Utah, Idaho and Oregon Will Be the Result.

Idaho stockmen won a victory through a decision that has been handed down by the interstate commerce commission in the case entitled American National Livestock association versus the Oregon Short Line Railroad company et al. Copies of the decision have reached the public utilities commission. The case has been known by stockmen as the "Los Angeles case." It was set forth in the complaint that the rates on hogs, calves, sheep and goats from points in Utah, Idaho and Oregon on the Oregon Short Line railroad to Los Angeles, were unreasonable. The rates on hogs are combinations made on Ogden or Salt Lake. Other rates assailed are joint rates. The establishment of reasonable joint rates on hogs, sheep and goats, in single and double-deck cars, and reasonable rates on cattle and calves, was asked for. The Idaho public utilities commission intervened on behalf of the livestock dealers of this state.

FINDINGS OF COMMISSION.

The findings of the interstate commerce commission as set forth in the decision follow:

First—Rates on cattle and calves from certain points in Utah, Idaho and Oregon to Los Angeles, Cal., not shown to be unreasonable.

Second—Rates on sheep and goats in double-deck cars from points in Utah,

Idaho and Oregon to Los Angeles found to be unreasonable to the extent that they exceed the rates contemporaneously maintained on cattle in carloads from and to the same points, and this

relationship of rates prescribed for the future.

Third—Defendants required to establish joint rate, on hogs in single-deck cars, from points in Utah, Idaho and Oregon to Los Angeles, not in excess of 90 per cent of the rates contemporaneously maintained on cattle in carloads from and to the same points.

While swine growers lost part of the fight to secure a rate reduction to Los Angeles by the above finding of the commission, the sheepmen won a distinct victory.

WHAT COMMISSION SAYS.

"From a consideration of all the circumstances," the commission says in that portion of its opinion relative to the freight rates on hogs, "we are of the opinion and find that defendants should be required to establish and maintain, from and to the points involved, joint rates on hogs in single-deck cars, not in excess of 90 per cent of the rates contemporaneously maintained on cattle from and to the same points, and that the present rates on hogs are and for the future will be unreasonable insofar as they exceed this basis."

As to the rate on hogs carried in double-deck cars not to exceed more than 5 per cent of the rates on cattle, the commission finds there does not seem to be any present necessity for requiring its establishment in the intermountain country.

MISSIONARY WORK GIVEN IMPETUS AT MEETING IN BOISE

Women of Presbytery Conclude Interesting Session at Which Plans for Future Work Were Outlined.

The Women's Missionary society of the Boise Presbytery closed the most successful meeting of its history last evening at the First Presbyterian church. The session was successful from a point of attendance and more so from the feeling of devotion manifested. Presentations of the need of missionary work were most vividly given by the speakers, chief among whom were Mrs. Paul W. McClintock, a returned missionary from China, where she spent 25 years in school work, and Mrs. J. W. Aldrick, field secretary for home missions, with headquarters at San Francisco, who made several inspiring addresses showing what had been done in the missionary field at home and the possibilities for the future.

Thursday afternoon Rev. G. W. Barnum of the Second Presbyterian church, gave a masterly talk dealing with the missionary spirit. He handled the subject, not from the spirit of work, but the deeper spirit within one which prompted the giving and service for the great missionary field.

LARGER GIFTS FOR WORK.

The topic, "Larger Gifts for Our Work," was handled in two sections. The first speaker was Mrs. Stewart Hunter of Emmett. She dealt with the gifts of time and prayer, stating that more meetings, but that the missionary thought be kept uppermost in the minds of women at home and when in prayer. The second part, dealing with gifts in money, was given by Miss Olive Hunting of Boise. She emphasized the need of missionary work in various points in Idaho which were remote from church life and influence and the need of work there. She pointed out the great need of school and hospital work in Mexico among the Spanish speaking people and in Alaska especially. She also spoke of the need of missionary work among the mountain whites of the United States. These people, she pointed out, were descendants from the sturdy race of early settlers who had fine characteristics and needed more books and education and the religious life brought to them and in their homes.

A feature of the meeting was a debate as to whether or not the Missionary Magazine or the Missionary Studybook was the best to create a missionary interest. The speakers were Mrs. J. E. Turner of Payette and Mrs. D. G. Whyte of Boise. The women handled their subjects in such a scholarly manner that the discussion which followed showed that it was consensus of opinion that neither the magazine alone nor the book quite filled the field and both were essential for the success of the work.
