JESS WILLARD MAY OGDEN WRESTLER MEET THE WINNER IN FINE CONDITION OF COMING BATTLE TO MEET THE DANE

Carl Morris or Fred Fulton Likely to Be Pitted Against the Champion in Limited Bout.

New York, April 2.—Matt Hinkel, the Cleveland promoter, today began dickering for a limited bout between Jess Willard and the winner of the Carl Morris-Fred Fulton bout here tomorrow. In a telegram to officials of the Manhattan Athletic club, Hinkel declared he would make the largest offer ever made for a short bout, planning to stage the affair at Cedar Point, O., on July 4 or Labor day.

Hinkel declares he looks for no trouble in staging the bout. Hinkel's message was also to Jack Curley, a member of the syndicate which is managing Willard. He is disposed to look with favor on the match. Willard has not been seen in a ring since he met Frank Moran here a year ago.

Fulton and Morris have hit training perfection for their battle. The added inducement of a probable crack at the championship should make the bout even better than the possibility of Fulton recovering a prestige lost when the records credited Morris with a victory over him. It should be the best meeting between heavyweights since Moran and Willard battled.

Peter Visser Arrives in Boise for Match With Harold Christensen at the Pinney Thursday Night.

Ready to go, Peter Visser, the Ogden light heavyweight wrestler, is in the city having arrived this morning from Utah. He is matched to meet Harold Christensen of Denmark at the Pinney theater Thursday night. They are to go to a finish, catch-as-catch-can, best two out of three falls, strange hold barred. Local interest is keen over the outcome of the go, for both boys are exceptionally well matched. Visser said today he would weigh 194 or 195 stripped. Christensen will weigh from 185 to 190 or better.

Visser has every physical indication of being able to take care of himself. He stands almost six feet, has a well developed chest, muscular shoulders and quick action. He will make his first public appearance for the benefit of fans Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Visser and Christensen will work from that hour to 7 o'clock at Nick Collins' physical culture school on South Eighth street, where fans may give them the once over.

JUST THE RIGHT WEIGHT.

"I never felt better in my life," said Visser. "I understand that my opponent is one of the best boys in this part of the country. I am glad of that, for I am confident that I can give him a hard match. My weight is just about what I want it and I am hardened for the most strenuous kind of mat work."

Promoter Collins is now preparing for the preliminaries. He is negotiating with some of the members of the various companies stationed at the Boise barracks in the hope of matching them with local boys, including "Babe" Brown and Raymond Brewster. He will also have a number of vaudeville acts.
