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DISAPPEARANCE OF MRS. HUNT REMAINS UNSOLVED MYSTERY

Word Received From North Idaho That Missing Woman Did Not Go to Home of Mother.

Boise, April 6.—All efforts to solve the mysterious disappearance of Mrs. Lloyd Hunt from her home at this place Sunday a week ago, and to ascertain what has become of her have thus far proven futile. The mother of Mrs. Hunt, who resides at Harrison, was advised of her daughter's disappearance, but Mr. Hunt has received word that his wife had not been there, and efforts in other directions have proven equally unsuccessful.

Mr. Hunt left Monday for north Idaho to continue his search for his wife. The children of Mrs. Hunt, whom she left in the care of a neighboring girl to care for until she returned from Boise, where she was going to consult a physician, are now in the care of Mr. Hunt's parents.

ENDOWMENT FUND OF COLLEGE OF IDAHO STEADILY GROWING

Caldwell, April 6.—The College of Idaho endowment fund campaign is being conducted at Parma this week by Dr. C. L. Chalfant, vice president of that institution in a highly vigorous manner. Of the \$5000 allotted for the Parma community, \$4000 has already been subscribed, \$2000 of this amount having been secured in a period of three hours. Next week, the campaign will be waged at Roswell with an equal measure of activity. The sum of \$5000 has also been allotted to that community, and it is anticipated that it will be secured with but little, if any difficulty. Of the \$50,000 of the endowment fund which is to be raised, in this city and its tributary country, \$25,000 has now been subscribed. The proposed endowment fund is for \$1,000,000, of which, \$100,000 is to be raised in this state and eastern Oregon.

SPINAL MENINGITIS CAUSES BOY'S DEATH

Caldwell, April 6.—Funeral services for Ralph, the 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John M. Schreiber, who died at the home of his parents in this city early yesterday morning after having been taken suddenly ill the preceding evening, were held from the family residence at Fifth and Everett streets at three o'clock this afternoon, Rev. Ewing conducting the services.

The lad had apparently been in perfect health until 5 o'clock the evening before his death when he complained of feeling poorly and a physician was called. When he grew worse other physicians were called in consultation and a trained nurse secured, but despite their combined efforts death followed early yesterday morning. In view of the fact that the physicians were unable to diagnose the disease Dr. Ernest E. Lambaugh, of Boise, former state bacteriologist, was summoned yesterday afternoon to make an analysis to determine the disease. Late yesterday evening he announced that it was spinal meningitis.

FINE COUNTRY HOME DESTROYED BY FIRE

Nampa, April 6.—The fine two-story country home of W. W. Russell on Orchard avenue near this city was destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon. All of the contents with the exception of a few pieces of furniture and some of the clothing of the family were also burned. The fire is attributed to a defective flue or from chimney sparks. The loss is estimated at \$2000. Some insurance was carried. Mr. Russell and his family but recently moved back to the farm from Boise after an absence of three years.

WELL KNOWN WOMAN KILLED IN RUNAWAY

Nampa, April 6.—Yesterday afternoon while out driving in single horse buggy with her sister-in-law, Miss Olive Pearson, Mrs. C. I. Pearson, wife of a well known farmer of the Fargo community was killed in a runaway, the horse becoming frightened and turning the buggy over while running away. The death of the deceased lady occurred almost instantly. Funeral arrangements have not yet been announced.

NEW INDUSTRY.

Nampa, April 6.—A new manufacturing industry, a desiccating plant is now assured this city through the efforts of F. A. Benson, of this city. Chicago men are the promoters of the concern. The machinery of the plant is designed to reduce to a powder fruits, vegetables, poultry and meats, as well as the bones of meats. The per cent of water in these foods is eliminated through the process and it is claimed that all food waste will be removed by this manufacturing process. It is predicted that the industry will give a strong impetus to horticulture in the tributary country in addition to providing another payroll for the city.

PACIFIC SYNOD OF EPISCOPAL CHURCH TO MEET IN BOISE

Episcopal of Boise are already making preparations for the entertainment of the Pacific synod which meets here Sept. 19 to 23. The synod represents the Pacific province, including all states south and west of Idaho. Its meetings have formerly been held at Seattle, San Francisco and Los Angeles. Upon the urgent invitation of Bishop Funsten the 1917 session was brought to Boise. There will be present at the meeting 14 bishops and a large number of distinguished clergy and lay delegates. The Woman's auxiliary will also meet at the same time, bringing to Boise prominent women in the church from the western states. Bishop Johnson of Los Angeles is to preach the opening sermon and plans are to hold an open meeting at the Finney theater during the synod session.

AT NEW ORLEANS.

New Orleans, April 6.—Federal authorities early today seized the interned German steamers Breslau and Andromeda. The crews were taken to the immigration station.

NAVAL RECRUITS LEAVE.

Chicago, April 6.—Six hundred naval recruits, graduates of the Great Lakes naval training station, left Chicago today for "somewhere in the east." They will be assigned to battleships in the Atlantic fleet.

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
