

TO CANCEL LAND IN THE PROJECT NOT IRRIGABLE

State Land Board Decides to Free Lands on Twin Falls Tract Not Brought Under the Canal System.

CERTIFICATES OF SALE CANCELLED

Register of the Board Authorized to Begin Active Work on the Collection of Delinquent Interest Due the State.

The state land board decided today to investigate the feasibility of canceling tracts of land not properly located for irrigation on the Twin Falls tract near Hollister. R. S. Madden of Canyon county was appointed by the board to proceed to the lands, ascertain their condition and take such steps as are necessary to bring about their cancellation. He is given full power to act. It developed during the discussion of the question that there is little objection on the part of either the settlers or the irrigation company against cancellation.

The board ordered a cancellation of 14 certificates of sale for lands in the Gem Irrigation project after James Hawley Jr. appeared and presented the matter. P. B. Carter also appeared in connection with the Keating Carey act project affairs. The board set Wednesday morning as the date for hearing the application of the Malad Reservoir company to increase the capacity of its reservoir. Edwin Snow appeared before the board and presented the matter.

INTEREST MUST BE PAID.

The board authorized the register to begin active work on the collection of delinquent interest due the state on money loaned. There is a great deal of this interest unpaid and the board proposes to see that it is paid or foreclosure suits will be instituted. The work of checking up the delinquents has been placed under the supervision of the register and W. P. O'Connor of Nampa has been employed to attend to the legal features of it. Mr. O'Connor has already taken up his new duties. Register Stott announces that the work will be vigorously pushed. State Auditor Van Deusen is rapidly getting the land department work under investigation and it will soon be in full swing. The last legislature appropriated \$20,000 for this investigation.

Bishop Tuttle church house last evening for their annual parish meeting. The bishop presided and congratulated the dean, the chapter and congregation upon the splendid showing, as exhibited in the various reports submitted. Dean Alward Chamberlain announced that the Easter offering amounted to over \$2200, and may possibly reach \$2400 when all returns are heard from. This, he stated, was one of the largest Easter offerings ever made at the cathedral, and betokened a deep and vital interest in the church affairs. Of this amount the two branches of the auxiliary raised \$600 and the Sunday school about \$420. The dean urged all present to prepare themselves for a determined campaign during this coming year to pay off the entire remaining indebtedness.

The finance committee presented its report for the year, showing that \$4466.32 had been raised and \$2922.35 expended, leaving a balance in the treasury April 1, 1917, of \$1543.97, with all current bills paid, also missionary apportionment of \$500, and \$500 on the flustered debt. The offering received this evening will be used to further reduce the debt, pay interest and missionary apportionment for 1917-1918.
