CALL FOR MEETING IN INTERESTS OF FARM PRODUCTION

County Auditor Asks Farmers and Business Men to Confer on Subject of Increased Crops.

County Auditor Utter is especially anxious that the meeting for Saturday afternoon in the county court rooms to consider ways and means for extending help to the farmers that they may plant and harvest larger crops this season, be well attended. In accordance with the proclamation issued by Governor Alexander, Mr. Utter yesterday afternoon issued the call for the meeting. He extends an invitation to farmers and others who have suggestions to make relative to the planting of a larger acreage this spring than ever before.

CALL FOR MEETING.

The call issued by Mr. Utter is as follows: Saturday, April 14, 1917, at 2 o'clock p. m. has been proclaimed by the Honorable Moses Alexander, governor of the state of Idaho, as the time when all patriotic citizens, county commissioners, county agricultural agents, county superintendent of schools, an officer from each bank and all agricultural organizations and a representative from all business houses in the county shall meet at the county court house and perfect an organization for the promotion of food crops and the increasing of food products, to the end that crisis now upon our nation shall not find Idaho unprepared.

"Call is hereby made upon each banking house, each business house, all agricultural organizations, county agents and granges, farmers' equity farmers' unions, commercial clubs and other organizations inspired with a patriotic purpose, situated within Ada county, to be present in person or by representative at the Ada county court house on above date for the purpose of organizing, electing a chairman and secretary and the appointment of proper committees for the purpose of obtaining the fullest possible food production in each part of the county."

EXTENDING OF CREDIT.

A letter received today by Auditor Utter from Governor Alexander reads: "It is suggested that if bankers, business men and commercial organizations who will be most directly benefitted by large crop productions could devise some means of extending credit for such purposes they could be abundantly protected through a lien upon crops to be produced."

This matter will be brought before the meeting by Mr. Utter.

WAR STOCKS MAKE GAINS IN ACTIVE SESSION OF MARKET

New York, April 11.—The stock exchange opened strong and more active than in several days today, gains of more than a point being made by many of the war stocks and rails.

Delaware & Hudson made a recovery of 1/4 at 1.22 1/2, Bethlehem Steel B stock was up 1/4, Wilson company 1/4, Marine preferred 1/4 and United States Steel 3/4 to 3/8.

After moving listless during the late forenoon and early afternoon, the market again moved upward around 2 o'clock. General Electric jumped 5 to 168 and Republic and Westinghouse were strong.

The market closed strong.

Chicago, April 11.—The wheat market was irregular today. Buying in May wheat was fair, which made it stronger than other futures. Favorable crop reports from the wheat belt acted as a bearish factor. May wheat opened up 3/4, later declining 1/4 to 2.07 1/2. July opened down 1/4, later losing 1/4, going to 1.81 1/2. September opened down 1/4 and later declined 2 to 1.66.

Corn started strong but later developed weakness. May opened up 3/4, later declining 1/4 to 1.27 1/2. July opened up 1/4, but dropped 1/4 to 1.25 1/2. September opened up 1/4, later losing 1/4 to 1.23 1/2.

Oats opened firm and later weakened with wheat. May opened unchanged, but declined 1/4, going to 63 1/2. July opened up 1/4, dropping 1/4 to 61 1/2. September opened up 1/4 and lost 1/4 to 55 1/2.
