Members of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows accompanied Grand Sire Franklin C. Goudy from Pocatello to Boise this morning. Later trains from nearby points brought in members of the order.

The Odd Fellow meeting proper began this afternoon at 2 o'clock when the grand lodge met and conferred the grand lodge degree upon 20 candidates. This was followed by an anniversary meeting at 3:30 at which the veteran jewel was conferred upon five candidates. This honor is won by those who have been Odd Fellows in good standing for 25 consecutive years, and those receiving it at this time were Max Mayfield, Charles Baxter, Ross Miner, L. A. York and W. B. Conner. Past Grand Master Gipson of Caldwell officiated at this service.

## ODD FELLOWS' HEAD PAID BOISE VISIT ELEVEN YEARS AGO

Grand Sire Franklin C. Goudy of the Odd Fellows' lodge arrived in Boise early this morning and stated that he was pleased to have the privilege of returning to this city again as he had visited it upon the occasion of the National Irrigation congress which met here a number of years ago. Mr. Goudy has been identified with irrigation interests as attorney for irrigation enterprises in Colorado since 1886. He stated that Boise seemed warmer than either Salt Lake or Denver which cities he had been in recently, and that the crops were backward in those states also.

Mr. Goudy further stated that the sentiment in Colorado was practically unanimously back of the president in his declaration of a state of war between this nation and Germany, and that this was also true of native-born Germans who had come to this country to make their homes.

"Colorado gave a heavy majority for Wilson," said Mr. Goudy, "on the ground that 'he kept us out of war,' but now that congress has declared a state of war Colorado recognizes that he is the president. The Odd Fellow order will not take any action as a body in upholding the president," he said in answer to an inquiry on that point, "for the order is international and has a quasi-jurisdiction in Germany, England, Sweden and every country where there is a society. But every individual member is taught to obey the law of the country in which he is a resident and respect the flag of his country."

## WAR OF DEMOCRACY AGAINST AUTOCRACY DECLARES GOUDY

"This is a war of democracy against autocracy. It is a war being fought to determine whether a portion of the world shall continue under the domination of those who believe themselves to be beneficiaries of the doctrine of the divine right of kings or whether the principles of liberty shall prevail. It means that we are fighting for the freedom of all the world from the shackles of militarism."



## TWO BOUND OVER ON CHARGE OF MURDER

In the preliminary trial of the Chinamen involved in the recent tong war murder of Wong Bok Sing yesterday in the justice court the defendants Dong Sing and Lo Ming were bound over to the district court.

One of the features of the trial centered about the demand of the defense for Wong Chow to appear in the court room. Wong Chow is the partner of the murdered Chinaman and was named as a witness for the state. E. S. Delana, county attorney, stated that it was not necessary to produce all testimony in the preliminary hearing but only that which was necessary to show that the case should be continued in the higher court.

The defense wanted Wong Chow to appear for them, but he could not be found. Justice Anderson in order to dispel any suspicion of the work of the officers issued three subpoenas, and search for Wong Chow was made by the sheriff, constable and chief of detectives. All reported diligent search but that they had been unable to locate the aged Chinaman.
