

BEAR RAID TUMBLES QUOTATIONS ON THE STOCK EXCHANGE

Leading Issues Drop Nearly Four Points in Closing Hour of the Afternoon Trading.

New York, May 11.—The closing hour of a strong day on the stock exchange a sudden bear raid sent leading issues tumbling to losses touching nearly 4 points this afternoon.

American Telephone & Telegraph yielded 3 1/2 on the raid to a low of 116 1/2 and Western Union followed suit with a loss of 2 1/2 from the high of the day.

The whole list with a few exceptions developed weakness. United States Steel sold down 1 1/2 from the day's high.

NEW YORK SUN REVIEW.

New York, May 11.—The New York Evening Sun financial review today said:

Today's stock market promised well at the outset but soon developed into a milk and water affair. The opening was at generally higher levels, with more or less narrow limits. By mid-day trading had died down.

There was a gradual crumbling of values all along the line in the after-

noon session, with particular weakness in public utilities and rails. American Telephone & Telegraph lost nearly 4 points and Western Union, Consolidated Gas and so on, yielded a point or more elsewhere in the industrial list, with a few exceptions among the specialties. Losses were mainly fractional. The rails sold down from 1 to 2 points.

GRAIN MARKETS CHICAGO.

Chicago, May 11.—The wheat market was featured today by a 10-cent advance in September wheat over yesterday's close. Ordinarily there is about a 20-cent difference between the July and September futures, but at yesterday's close July was quoted 35 1/2 higher. Traders evidently believed this margin was too wide. September opened 1/4 lower than yesterday's close at 2.09, but later gained 10 1/2. May opened 3 higher at 3.18, and subsequently went to 3.20, a new high record. July opened unchanged, advanced 6 1/2 to 2.54 1/2.

Corn opened slightly higher in the near months and the entire market advanced a shade on the later wheat rise. May opened up 1, later advanced 1/4 to 1.59 1/2. July was up 1/4 at the opening and later gained 1 1/2 at 1.49 1/2. September opened 1/4 lower but later gained 1 1/2 at 1.40 1/2.

Oats gained slightly with the other grains. May opened 1/4 higher and later gained 1 1/2 more, closing at 71 1/2. July was up 1/4 at the opening and later went to 66 1/2, a gain of 1 1/2. September opened down 1/4, but later advanced 1 1/2 to 57 1/2.

LICENSES FOR ALL DEALERS IN FOODS MAY BE REQUIRED

Chicago, May 11.—That legislation which will compel dealers in food products to be licensed by the government, will be sought of congress by Carl S. Vrooman, assistant secretary of agriculture, on his return to Washington, it was stated in the department of justice here today.

This action had been decided upon, in a conference held between Vrooman, Charles F. Clynne, district attorney, and Robert W. Childs, special assistant attorney general, in charge of the food investigation. Wholesalers, jobbers, brokers and retailers will be included in the proposed act.

It is planned to place a price on food commodities—to vary according to the conditions. Any one speculator who corners a food market will have his license revoked and suffer a heavy penalty.

ANOTHER ALLEGED GERMAN AGENT PLACED IN PRISON.

Des Moines, Ia., May 11.—The third arrest of alleged German agents here within 24 hours was made today when secret service men took into custody J. Zacharia, traveling engineer for the Bell Telephone company. Hermann Kirch and A. E. Hartung were snared yesterday afternoon. The trio will be taken to Leavenworth prison without trial and will be detained there for the duration of the war, local authorities announced.
