

IDAHO FALLS TO HAVE AUTOSHOW FOR FIVE DAYS

Nearly One Hundred Fine Cars to Be Exhibited at the Second Annual State Event.

Amusement Program Arranged to Help Make Things Merry at Southeastern City—Under Auspices State Association.

Idaho Falls, Sept. 29.—The second annual state automobile show, to be held this year in Idaho Falls, will open next Tuesday morning and will continue for five days. Conducted under the auspices of the Idaho Falls Automobile Dealers' association, and with the sanction of the Idaho State Automobile Dealers' association, those in charge declare the exposition will be the greatest event ever held in motoring annals of the intermountain country.

The handsome, new \$75,000 Browning garage, just completed, will serve as the home of the auto show and will afford ample room for the display of nearly 100 of the finest pleasure and commercial cars ever brought to this section for display. Most of these cars are arriving direct from the factory and will be in charge of factory experts, who will remain here during the show to make demonstrations and explain the mechanism of their machines.


WEEK OF ENTERTAINMENT.
In addition to the display of cars itself, the management has arranged for a program of entertainment that seems to assure a week of lively fun. Spanish troubadours, ukulele dancing girls and cabaret entertainers have been engaged to make things merry. Two fine quartets will give vocal programs every afternoon and evening; the Idaho Falls Club of Commerce band will whoop things up in parades and a fine orchestra will be at the show to render dancing music so that spectators who enjoy tripping the light fantastic can do so to their heart's content. It is planned that there shall not be a dull moment during the entire week, and judging by the preparations, these plans will not miscarry.

The Idaho Falls dealers have proven themselves unsurpassable as boosters. Accompanied by the band and two quartets, and traveling more than 100 stroms, they have taken excursions to all parts of southeastern Idaho to herald the show and the success of these trips is shown by the assurances which have come from every point of big crowds arranging to take in the show next week.

The show will open next Tuesday morning with a big parade and will close next Saturday with a Mardi Gras celebration, in which thousands are expected to participate.

ECONOMY DRIVER EXPLAINS METHODS USED IN MAXWELL

Any Car Owner Can Get Big Mileage if He Follows Instructions Declares Portland Man.

Many people comment on the big mileage that Maxwell cars obtain in day after day performances. There are thousands of automobile drivers who do not understand how the Max-

well drivers get from 20 to 50 miles on one gallon.
The method of economy driving as told by D. E. Larkin of Portland, Ore., who made more than 46 miles on one gallon in the recent Maxwell Liberty bond contest is as follows:
In order to get the greatest gasoline efficiency from a Maxwell car, according to Larkin, is to first keep the motor in perfect working order. Clean oil is necessary.
The carburetor is to be adjusted so as thin a mixture as possible is obtained. The bearings should be kept clean, free and properly lubricated.
Another important feature is the oiling of all parts of the springs. Particular attention is to be paid to this as 20 per cent greater efficiency may be had if it is done.
Tires are to be filled to full capacity, about 65 pounds pressure being required.
BREAKS MUST NOT DRAG.
When driving the windshield is best

tilted back so as to offer as little resistance as possible to the wind. Brakes are not to be allowed to drag. It is best to maintain a speed of about 20 miles an hour, or thereabouts. The driver in keeping the feed pressure even and steady assures greater economy as fluctuation uses up more gasoline than a steady flow.
Coasting is legitimate and is highly important in the saving of fuel. Where the grade is long it is best to shut the engine entirely off. If the grade is short better results are had if the engine is kept barely turning over. The gasoline consumption is not as great by this as it is in starting the engine.
Evening is the best time to make long drives as the gasoline lasts longer than during the day time hours.
By following rules which have proved efficient any Maxwell driver may make big mileage. It is necessary to take the best of care of a car at all times to gain the benefits of gasoline con-

sumption. If the directions are followed any driver will get results that will be a surprise to him.

SAYS THE FARMERS WILL LOSE MONEY

St. Paul, Sept. 29.—Northwest farmers will get only \$1.90 a bushel for wheat which cost \$4.06 to grow, according to figures compiled by President A. C. Townley of the national Non-Partisan league here today.
It was his answer to charges that farmers are "profiteering" and demanding higher wheat prices. Townley said few farmers would get the \$2.20 price set by the government, as practically none of their wheat would grade number one and transportation charges to Chicago are deducted, bringing the price down to \$1.90 for many farmers in the northwest.
"In North Dakota the average yield for acreage sown will not be over six bushels per acre," Townley declared. "The cost of an acre wheat crop this year will be \$24.41, according to figures compiled by crop experts, making the cost per bushel \$4.06."


