

MILLION TO BE RAISED IN ADA COUNTY ALONE

County Allotments Based on Bank Deposits and General Business and Financial Conditions.

Shoshone County Close Second, With \$960,000—Figures Announced by State Committee—Ada County Chairman Busy.

Ada county must buy liberty bonds to the amount of \$1,000,000, if Idaho is to subscribe its full quota. After going over the matter for several days with members of the state committee, Chairman Davis decided to base county allotments chiefly on bank deposits. General conditions were, however, taken into consideration in arriving at the final conclusions. Ada county has the highest quota in the state. Shoshone county, the rich mining district, comes next with an allotment of \$960,000.

Chairman W. T. Wallace, of the Ada county campaign was prepared for a big apportionment. The tentative figure for his county was fixed several days ago at between \$800,000 and \$900,000. The extra \$100,000 has made him put on additional steam and his organization is going into the field Monday morning fully determined to have the allotment of Ada county over-subscribed before the end of the week.

BIG LIBERTY BOND MEETING TO BE HELD ON SATURDAY NIGHT

Arrangements are being made for a big liberty bond meeting at the First Methodist church Saturday night. Curtis Pierce, well known San Francisco investment banker, will be the speaker. Mr. Pierce has been holding meetings in a number of Idaho towns and has stirred up much enthusiasm. He not only points out the patriotic duty that devolves upon everyone in financing the war, but explains the second liberty bond issue as one of the best investments ever put before the people of Idaho. Plans will be made to have special music for the Saturday night meeting.

While the state campaign is on in full blast, Senator Borah will be in Boise for a big rally. The state committee has invited him to address a public meeting in Boise some night next week.

Rev. Willise Martin will be in Star Friday afternoon to address the Parents-Teachers' association on liberty bonds. The meeting will be attended by State Administrator R. F. Bicknell, who will speak on the need of conserving the food supply.

Ex-Governor Hawley will start on a flying trip Monday. His first stop will be in Mountain Home Monday night where a big meeting is being arranged. Tuesday night he will be the speaker at a big liberty bond meeting in Gooding. Wednesday he will address meetings in Edon, Hazelton and Paul, and at night he will speak in Rupert.

DEFENSE WILL OPEN ITS CASE ON FRIDAY

Witnesses for the defense will testify in the murder trial of Dong Sing and Lo Ming Friday. The state has taken up more time than was expected. This has been due to the fact that many of the witnesses were Chinese and the services of an interpreter were required.

The first witness to testify today was Henry Koll. He was put on the stand Wednesday and was recalled this morning. Andy Robinson, W. F. Donnan, E. Buchanan, E. P. Johnson and Prosecuting Attorney E. S. Delana were called this morning. Captain Charles Van Dorn, of the Boise police, was the first witness called this afternoon. E. P. Johnson was recalled and was given a severe cross examination by Attorney Edwards, counsel for Lo Ming.

Wong Chow is the only witness who has testified to seeing the shooting. He was recalled Wednesday evening and again identified Dong Sing and Lo Ming as the two Chinamen who came into the laundry on Ninth street and shot Wong Bock Sing. Testimony given by other state witnesses was to support the statements made by Wong Chow. It is believed the case will go to the jury some time Saturday.
