

INVASION OF ITALY GRAVE MENACE TO CAUSE OF ALLIES

Pro-Germans In Boise May Be Pointed Out to the Public View

PRO-KAISER PEOPLE IN BOISE; CALL FOR ACTION

Food Pledge Campaign Chairmen Declare Steps Should Be Taken to Keep Tab on Them.

Assert That Their Names Should Be Published in the Newspapers, but Fail to Reveal Their Identity in Official Report.

EXCERPTS FROM REPORT.
In some instances, the refusals were based upon downright pro-German feelings and motives.

Some * * * were made with such unpatriotic and disloyal statements that there is absolutely no doubt about where such people stand.

* * * Their names should be published in the newspapers and lists of their names should be posted in many public places.

The movements of these people should be watched by their neighbors and all with whom they deal.

Where these people are in business * * * then we think that Americans should not deal with those who would ruin our country if they could.

They deserve very little and if they are loyal to a country and a people who countenance and perform such barbarities as their dear fatherland has performed, then it is difficult to say what treatment should be given those who believe in such barbarities.

LOCATED IN BOISE, ENJOYING THE FREEDOM ALLOWED BY THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES, REPRESENTING THEMSELVES TO BE CITIZENS, ARE FRIENDS OF THE KAISER, so pro-German in their sentiments and disloyal in their utterances that they should be singled out, definitely classified and so handled that in the future they be known and shut off from the privileges law abiding citizens now have. That is in brief the startling findings of Craig C. Coffin, chairman and Paris Martin, acting city chairman, in their report on the Boise food pledge campaign to R. F. Bicknell, federal food commissioner for Idaho. The foes of America should be publicly branded, they believe. A total of 4464 names were secured to pledge cards.

TAMMANY LEADING RACE BUT ANTI-WAR CANDIDATE STRONG

New York Mayoralty Race Strenuous as the Election Draws Near—East Side Is Hotbed for the Socialist Nominee.

New York, Nov. 3.—With John F. Hyland, Democrat, running favorite in the betting in the New York mayoralty campaign, four candidates confidently claiming victory, an anti-war Socialist, Hillquit, showing unexpected strength with the cry of "votes for women" ringing over the city, America's metropolis tonight stood at the threshold of one of the most important elections in its history.

Mayor Mitchell, fusionist, his voice reduced to a whisper by constant speaking, stood beside a "reader" in his meetings tonight and listened to his speeches being declaimed by this orator.

SOCIALIST MAY WIN.
Morris Hillquit, a Russian Jew, was picked by many politicians as being the probable winner. He showed great strength on the east side. His anti-war rallies have been attended by big crowds.

SUFFRAGISTS ACTIVE.
The suffragists reached the climax of their fight tonight with a torchlight parade and a mass meeting. Secretary McAdoo, scheduled to address this meeting, found at the last minute that he could not attend and instead sent a message strongly supporting suffrage. Former Ambassador to Germany Gerard, State Senator Owen and Dr. Anna Howard Shaw were to address the suffrage rally.

FROZEN POTATOES IN THE RAILROAD YARDS AT CHICAGO

Five Hundred Carloads Are Found, Most of Them Unfit for Consumption—Destinations Tags Removed.

Chicago, Nov. 3.—More than five hundred carloads of potatoes, most of them frozen, rotted and unfit for consumption, were discovered in various Chicago freight yards late today, according to police reports.

FROM ALL OVER COUNTRY.
Most of the potatoes were found in the yards of the Chicago and Northwestern and the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroads. They were shipped from all parts of the country, the largest consignments being from Oklahoma and California.

TWO KILLED AND ONE SERIOUSLY INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Twin Falls, Nov. 3.—Mrs. W. L. Puckett of Shoshone and W. T. Puckett were instantly killed and W. L. Puckett seriously injured when an auto containing the party fell over Shoshone grade near the Great Shoshone falls at 3 o'clock this afternoon, following the breaking of the steering gear from an unknown cause. All concerned were prominent southern Idaho people. It is thought that W. L. Puckett, who is now in a local hospital, will recover.

SOLDIERS GUARDING TEXAS OIL FIELDS

Houston, Tex., Nov. 3.—United States regulars and Chicago guardsmen were today guarding the oil fields at Sour Lake, Humble, Goose Creek, and Damon Mound. All of these fields are affected by the oil laborers strike, but it was said "alien enemies and not the strikers caused the guard to be placed in the oil districts."

TROOPS OF THE ALLIES RUSHED TO HELP ITALY

United States Looks Upon the Italian Situation as a Grave Peril to the Cause of the Allied Nations.

French High Command Also Announces That the Advance of the Teutons in North Italy Must Be Checked.

Washington, Nov. 3.—Behind the censored 'Tagliamento river operations in northern Italy lies the crisis of the war, officials here believed tonight. Not only does the United States government look upon the Italian situation as the greatest peril to the allied cause today, but an official statement by the French high command, admitted the German advance "must absolutely be checked."

The great battle of Italy's Marne apparently is in its first critical stage, with General Cadorna's retreat to his river defenses a "complete success." Allied reinforcements are arriving to his support. Confidence is felt here that the Teutons will be stopped. Advances to the state department corroborated this.

ENVELOPING MOVEMENT.
Meantime press reports indicate the Teutons are attempting the feared enveloping movement from the north. To create a diversion and possibly force withdrawal of some of General Mackensen's troops to the Flanders front, violent operations against the Germans on the west front were announced by the French commission here.

FEAR OF THE ALLIES.
The anxiety lest the Italians receive a blow which would crush their morale is based on the following feared results of an Italian collapse:

The three million Austrian and German troops released from the Italian front might be thrown against the Anglo-French-American line. Elimination of Italy would also release sufficient Teuton artillery to give the enemy supremacy in guns on the west front, enabling the Germans to double the ferocity of their Verdun attack on any chosen sector. Allied troops on the Macedonian front and the Greek forces preparing to enter the fighting will be helpless after an Italian debacle.
