

# MUST HAVE CARS TO SAVE APPLE CROP IN VALLEY

Survey Shows 275 Cars Will Be Lost Unless Refrigerators Can Be Hurried Into This Territory.

State Council of Defense Chairman and Secretary Hold Conference With the Utilities Commission and Shippers.

It is imperative that there be delivered to the Boise valley and western Idaho immediately 275 cars to take out the early apple crop, or growers and shippers will suffer a total loss to that extent.

This fact was laid before a joint conference of representatives of the state council of defense, public utilities commission, shippers and growers. The conclusion reached was to send representatives of the commission and council to Pocatello to make a check on empty refrigerators in the yards there and to then lay before Oregon Short Line officials a request that the cars checked be rushed to this section of the state.

**SURVEY IS MADE.**  
A. L. Freehafer of the public utilities commission and Joseph Hansen, secretary of the state council, will probably make the checking trip, leaving tonight for the southeast with that object in view.

State Horticultural Inspector Guy Graham and Commissioner Freehafer made a careful survey of the apple situation in this section of the state Thursday. By automobile they visited the various shipping points and took a tally on the cars. They discovered between 250 and 275 cars of Jonathans and other early varieties of apples ready to be shipped to eastern markets if cars can be secured; if not the apples will be frozen or spoil on the hands of growers and shippers.

## DECIDE ON CONFERENCE.

It was decided to hold a general conference today on the situation. With that idea in view, Dr. E. A. Bryan, state commissioner of education and chairman of the state defense council, Joseph Hansen, secretary of the council, Guy Graham state horticultural inspector, Commissioner Freehafer of the public utilities commission and Messrs. Yost, Sewell and others met and went over the situation. They decided to make a strong plea to the Short Line to rush its empty refrigerators now standing in its yards to the shipping point.

To get accurate information as to the number of these cars a personal check is to be made on them.

Short Line Thursday and were divided as follows: Twenty-five to the Idaho-Montana division, 25 to the Twin Falls division and 25 to the Fourth district.

"To save the early apples we must have the cars immediately," said one of those attending the conference today. "It has come down to a question as to whether or not the cars are going to be forthcoming and the fruit be shipped to a market awaiting it or whether the fruit shall be a total loss. We certainly hope to prevail upon the railroad to prevent the latter calamity."

## ANARCHISTS AT WORK IN CITIES OF IOWA

Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 16.—A secret organization of anarchists, which so far has eluded efforts of officials to run down its leaders, appears to be operating in Des Moines and other Iowa cities.

Reports received here this afternoon reveal that threats directed at the mayor of Tulsa, Okla., following the I. W. W. war and leather party last Friday night, originated in Des Moines. The threats sent south follow within a few days' receipt of an anonymous black hand message by Ralph Faxon, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce. There is no doubt that both were of the same inspiration.

The postal card threat to Faxon was signed the "local Bolshevik." The threat sent to Tulsa, in the shape of a telegram filed here, read: "The Bolshevik has an eye on your brand of democracy and will act."

It was signed by the "civil liberty bureau." Federal secret service agents and postoffice inspectors, with local police all profess to know nothing of the "bureau."

## DRAMATIC SUICIDE OF DENVER WOMAN

Denver, Colo., Nov. 16.—Police here were today seeking a clue to the identity of a woman known only as "Margaret Mannik," who dramatically ended her life yesterday afternoon with a single revolver shot in the office of James M. Gingrich, president of a local creamery.

Gingrich told the police that the woman had been following him and harassing him for several months and said she attempted to murder him by decoying him to her room with a fake telephone message recently. Yesterday she telephoned him, according to his story, telling him she was coming to his office. Gingrich arranged for a deputy sheriff to remain on duty at his office to eject the woman if she appeared. After the officer had gone, when she failed to appear, the woman entered and Gingrich, with his wife who was in the office, went in search of the officer. When they returned with him the Manning woman produced a revolver and killed herself, turning to Gingrich as she fired, saying: "Have me arrested now if you want to."

Gingrich denied any knowledge of her motive or of her real identity. A card in her handbag bore the name: "Mrs. J. Forbes Manning."

## LIEUT. VON BRINCKEN MILITARY PRISONER

San Francisco, Nov. 16.—Lieutenant Wilhelm von Brincken, former military attaché of the German consulate here, was transferred to the Alcatraz disciplinary barracks today, thereby probably establishing permanently his status as a military instead of a civil prisoner. He was convicted last spring of conspiracy to set afoot a military expedition against Canada.

# STATE REPORTS \$55,000 RAISED FOR WAR FUND

Good Progress Made in the Campaign for Money for the Y. M. C. A. Work in Army Camps.

Boise Has Practically Reached Its Goal—Boys Have Raised Their Quota and Push the "Tank" to State Headquarters.

At the luncheon for workers at Y. M. C. A. today Henri Scott, the Metropolitan basso, entertained the men assembled. He left early to take the 12:15 train east. He was cheered lustily.

The reports of the teams show that Boise has practically reached its goal and by the assistance of the remainder of the county will put Ada county past the \$18,000 quota Saturday. All workers for the county start at 9 a. m. tomorrow. No luncheon will be served on Saturday. The men will work straight through and report at headquarters tomorrow evening.

"We have the chance to get in and make Ada county safe with its quota," said Frank Newhouse, county manager, at today's luncheon.

The last reports from state headquarters show that the state has subscribed \$55,000, with little in from the north end of the state. If the northern counties have done what was expected of them, Idaho's \$85,000 is assured.

## BOYS OVER THE TOP.

Today at noon the boys of Boise who have had a part in making the boys' campaign for \$5000 for the army Y. M. C. A., moved the "tank" to the state headquarters at the Empire building. The last \$1000 has been raised which makes it possible to move the engine of war the remaining two blocks.

One of the boys who was proudest in this progress of the "tank" was William Krummes, 10-year-old boy who, after paying for his liberty bond, has now assumed the liability of a \$10 certificate to help the army boys.

It is now the hope of the state manager to double the apportionment given the boys. The boys continue their work without any indication of slackers.

## HEALTH OFFICERS OF CHICAGO INDORSE 'DRUGGING OF BABY'

Chicago, Nov. 16.—The city of Chicago today officially indorsed the death sentence pronounced upon Paul Hodzima, two-year-old defective, whose sufferings are being relieved—and life shortened—through "God-given drugs" prescribed by Dr. Harry Haiselden.

Dr. Archibald L. Hoyne and Dr. Herman Spalding of the health board reported to Dr. John Dill Robertson, health commissioner, that an investigation had disclosed "nothing on which to criticize Dr. Haiselden." Dr. Robertson announced that so far as he is concerned the case is closed.

The child, which was close to death late yesterday, rallied today and Dr. Haiselden said it might live two months. He added, however, that the nature of the baby's afflictions might cause its death at any time within that period.

A ten-hour bill for domestic servants is now before the California legislature, while a bill has been introduced in the Oregon legislature making an eight-hour day for working women.

## LOSS OF AMERICAN STEAMER FEARED

Washington, Nov. 16.—The American steamer Kansas City is believed to have been lost at sea, the navy department announced today. She has been missing since Sept. 5.

The department's statement said: "The navy department has received no information of the steamer Kansas City, since she was reported separated from convoy Sept. 5."

"She is now believed to have been lost at sea."

"J. H. Muir, first class signalman, assigned to duty on the Kansas City, was the only navy man aboard. His father is John Allison Muir, Roland Park, Maryland."

## MANY DESERTIONS FROM THE RANKS OF THE GERMAN ARMY

Washington, Nov. 16.—The American government is matching Teuton propaganda here with efforts to influence public opinion in the central powers. All the allies are doing the same, it was semi-officially learned today.

Besides hundreds of German soldiers who have used the password "republic" similar French efforts since the opening of the war have cost Germany 30,000 Alsatians, deserters from the Teuton ranks, according to a member of the French high command.

Through pamphlets dropped from aeroplanes by German republicans operating from Switzerland and in ways of the censorship forbids telling the truth of the American and allied side is slowly seeping through the enemy countries.

## CAN FIND NO MARKET FOR MEXICAN CATTLE

San Francisco, Nov. 16.—Fifty thousand head of Mexican cattle, 2,000,000 pounds of dressed medium and prime beef and 10,000 horse and burro hides are without a market, according to D. B. Eastman, representing Mexican cattle interests, who is in San Francisco today. And at the same time Americans are observing meatless days and shoes are selling at record prices.


"I am offering 50,000 head of cattle at 6 cents delivered in Los Angeles or San Francisco," Eastman declared, "and the dealers tell me they don't want them; that their storage rooms and feed lots are full. Two different export concerns have turned down 2,000,000 pounds of frozen, inspected beef at 11 cents and there is no market for 10,000 hides."

## COAL MINERS WILL NOT CALL STRIKE

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 16.—Delegates representing coal miners of Oklahoma, Missouri, Kansas and Arkansas, voted 188 to 166 last night against calling a strike in the southwest district, because Fuel Administrator Garfield had insisted on retaining the "automatic" clauses in the new agreement with the operators.

The convention on Wednesday night had expressed itself as being opposed to the penalty clause but after 12 hours' debate, this decision was reversed and the convention was adjourned. Officials of the various districts were instructed to return and draft agreements with the operators of their districts, embodying in the agreements the new wage increase.

## THREE VICTIMS OF AXE MURDER FOUND

Virginia, Minn., Nov. 16.—Three victims of an axe murder were discovered today when police found the bodies of Paul Adarm, his wife and a boarder, Peter Treplich, in their home here splattered with blood, their skulls crushed.

The bodies were found in the shadow of a crubifix. They had been slain as they slept. The murderer and his possible accomplices after their brutal deed, went into the kitchen and wrote a note in an unwavering hand. The writing is Austrian.

Possible motive was seen in the patriotism of the slain persons who had purchased liberty bonds with their savings. The fact that the note is in Austrian strengthened this theory.

Bitter feeling among miners and others here over the war has been prevalent for weeks. The latest murder may be a result of this, in the opinion of police.

## FOOD SHIPMENTS FOR TEXAS CATTLE

Houston, Tex., Nov. 16.—The million hold of stock on the drought-parched ranges of west Texas were practically assured today of enough cotton seed oil cakes to keep them from perishing and to make them ready for shipment.

As soon as the national food administration at Washington approves the action taken here late yesterday at a mass meeting of cotton seed crushers and cattle raisers, the cattle and other west Texas stock will have feed, shipments to start as soon as the railroads can furnish equipment.

The conference adopted a resolution calling upon the food administration to take over all cake and meal held at various ports for export to foreign countries and after milling, sell to stock raisers at a price to be fixed by the food administration.

The conference was called by the state food administrator.
