

UP TO DRAFT MEN TO KNOW ORDER NUMBER

Must Keep Themselves Posted Under Second Draft or Suffer Consequences Is Warning.

Provost Marshal Points Out Men Must Be Responsible—Questionnaires to Be Mailed—Change Made in Boise Board.

With the rapid approach of the second draft soon to be effective in Idaho, those directing it are anxious to make it clear to registrants they are charged with the full knowledge of the law and must ascertain their order number and keep it in mind so that when they are called for examination they can respond promptly. Provost Marshal General Crowder is anxious that this be impressed on registrants and has so informed the adjutant general of the state.

Under the second draft both the county and Boise boards become operative. Under the first draft only the county board was called upon to supply men, Boise being exempted having

supplied its quota to the National Guard. Registrants in both the city and county will therefore receive the questionnaires. They will be mailed Dec. 15.

CHANGE IN CITY BOARD.
Dr. F. A. Pittenger having been called to the colors, will be unable to serve on the board and Dr. R. E. Schurtz, county physician, has been called in by the Boise City board to perform his duties. His name has been forwarded to Washington with the recommendation that he be appointed in place of Dr. Pittenger. The other members of the city board are Oliver Day and Councilman Herrington. The board has been active the past two weeks classifying its cards and preparing the questionnaires for mailing.

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.
Every possible effort will be made by local boards to acquaint registrants with their order of liability. It is absolutely necessary that each registrant know his "order number." The new filing system of the local board will enable the clerk to instantly locate any name on his list, and the process of examination and selection of registrants, under these rules and regulations, shall begin by the posting of notice in the offices of the local boards on Form 1002 and by mailing a questionnaire to every registrant included within such posted notice, and notice of every subsequent action taken by either the local or district board in respect of each registrant shall be given by entering a minute or date of such action on the classification list in the office of the local board, and in addition to such entries by mailing to the registrant (and in some cases to other claimants) a notice of such action.

MAILING OF NOTICES.
Whenever a duty is to be performed or a period of time begins to run within which any duty is to be performed by any such registrant or within which any right or privilege may be claimed or exercised by or in respect of any

such registrant, a notice of the day upon which such duty is to be performed or such time begins to run shall be mailed to the registrant, and the date of such mailing of notice shall be entered opposite the name of such registrant on the classification list, which is always open to inspection by the public at the office of the local board.

In addition to the mailing of such notice to registrants, notice of the disposition of claims of other persons in respect of registrants shall be mailed to such other persons.

DEFINITE OFFER TO BURNS PEOPLE ON NEW RAILROAD

If the Burns people accept the proposition put up to them by W. E. Pierce and associations, a standard gauge steam road from Crane to Burns, 30 miles, giving direct connection with the Oregon Eastern, will likely be started next year.

The Burns committee, James E. Weston, I. S. Geer, F. Francis, C. M. Salisbury and J. E. Logan left for home this morning satisfied that the people of their town would accept the proposition made to them.

For two days the committee has been in session with Mr. Pierce and his associates and the cost of building and other details in connection with the road generally discussed. It is believed by all parties that a definite agreement will be signed for the road within a few months.



Recipe for TEA BISCUIT

- 2 cups flour
- 4 level tablespoons Cottolene
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 level teaspoons baking powder
