

IDAHO RAISED \$148,000 FOR THE Y. M. C. A.

State Exceeds Quota 70 Per Cent—Ada County Leads With \$18,000 and Shoshone Second With \$13,903.

Report by the Counties Received by R. E. Randall, State Manager, Exceedingly Gratifying—Small Cost of Campaign.

The final report by counties in the great Y. M. C. A. war work fund campaign, has been received by R. E. Randall, state manager. It shows Idaho more than made good. Its citizens gave \$148,000, 70 per cent above the apportionment of \$85,000. The cost of collecting this sum was less than one and one-half cent on the dollar. With such a large territory to cover and many places remote, Mr. Randall feels the expenses here have been kept at the minimum, but believes they will be less in other states more thickly populated, where traveling will be much less.

The total expenses of traveling for the state manager, district and county managers was \$594. The other expenses were for stenographic work, rent for headquarters, paper, printing, etc. All the workers in the campaign gave their services free, even to the office manager.
