

FEDERAL BANK IS ACTIVELY ENGAGED COMPLETING LOANS

Placing About \$2,000,000 Per Month in Four Northwestern States--Appraiser Returns to Boise.

The Federal Land bank of Spokane which serves the states of Idaho, Montana, Washington and Oregon is now completing loans at the rate of about two million dollars a month. This bank is doing a larger business than any other of the twelve Federal Land banks and at a much less proportionate expense.

C. E. B. Roberts who returned Thursday from a trip to Spokane on business connected with the bank reports a larger proportion of applications filled from Idaho than from any other state in the district. The Spokane bank has placed more loans than any other land bank with the possible exception of one and has filled a larger proportion of its applications than any except two.

The farm loan board at Washington has recently raised the interest rate on new business all over the United States. This increase from 5 per cent to 5 1/2 per cent will not effect those whose applications have been approved by the bank unless they have been dilatory in accepting the loan or completing their papers. This increase has been thought necessary for several reasons. The farm loan boards, which are exempted from taxation and draw 4 1/2 per cent interest, are still selling at par but the condition of the bond market renders it impossible to depend on selling bonds at that figure in the increasingly large quantities demanded by the business. The service to the applicants for loans can be increased also by increasing the expense.

Applications for loans are reaching the bank in overwhelming amounts and in spite of the wonderful development of the institution this bank has unfilled applications on hand totaling nearly \$25,000,000. It can readily be seen that loans will be delayed in many instances but uniform methods in the local associations, careful compliance with instructions and attention to details will lessen correspondence and greatly facilitate the work. Mr. Roberts reports the officers working nights and holidays and all hands from President O'Shea down to the office boys taking a deep interest in this great work for the cause of agriculture.
